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
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

Although students at WPC must pay fines on overdue books and audio visual materials, the college faculty does not. Faculty have one semester to return library material. In addition, they do not have to pay fines for any overdue material.

Alexis Kurjian, a senior, said, "The purpose of fines is to force and allow everyone a fair chance at getting all the needed research material on time. We deserve a chance at getting all the needed books, on time, and we get penalized if we don't return them on time. It's for everyone's benefit. So, why should the faculty not be held responsible for returning needed material on time?"





Another issue discussed was the Math Endorsement Program. According to Susan McNamara, interim provost and vice president for Academic Affairs, "the endorsement program is for people who are not ready to get a master's degree but want a teaching certificate."

According to the Provost's office, "This program is aimed for teachers who already have a teaching certification, have some teaching experience, and want the K-12 endorsement in mathematics."

The Paterson School District is one of the districts that has made a request for such a program to be established. "We needed to honor our commitment to the Paterson School District," stated McNamara. "We couldn't afford to wait another semester."

The requirement for the admission to the program are a bachelor's degree, a standard New Jersey teaching certificate, and a 2.75 GPA on a 4.00 scale.

Speaking of the Faculty Senate meeting, McNamara said, "The most important thing on the agenda, for me, was the curriculum. It goes to the heart of what we really are, as an institution of higher education."



Life of Agony's latest, Ugly, is a departure from the more upbeat, jagged riffs that were prominent on its more primitive debut, River Runs Red, though the haunting, tortured vocals of Keith Caputo remain constant.

Many of the songs deal with Caputo's deceased mother and his estranged relationship with his father. The opening track, "Seasons," defines the new, more melodic L.O.A. Caputo says the song "is a peace offering to my Dad, because I was so harsh to him." The chugging riffs of guitarist Joey Z. on "Other

Side of the River" give a glimpse of the old L.O.A. but with its updated, slowed-down sound. Others, such as "Drained," demonstrate how the group has

advanced stylistically while clinging to its roots, forcing the listener to bop his head up and down. On Ugly, Caputo bears his soul, forcing even the most hardened individual to sympathize on "Let's Pretend" and "How it Would Be," both about his fam-

However, drummer Sal Abruscato, who along with the band's bassist and main songwriter Alan Robert maintains the tightly packed rhythm section, says there are still songs on the new album that "will literally tear your head off," including "Damned if I Do," and "I Regret."

Perhaps the last track, a cover of Simple Minds' "Don't You Forget About Me," best symbolizes the progressive sounds of L.O.A. Ugly is a reminder that a band can decrease its heaviness and become better at the same time.





Wow! That's what I said for at least ten ninutes just staring at the screen. "Toy Story," the first full-length computer animated motion picture, opened last weekend for the holiday season and you can add this to the list of Disney hits as the biggest.

Having heard about the epic from friends, instructors and media reports, my expectations were high. Nevertheless, the wizards at Pixar, the computer animation studio that made "Toy Story," dazzled me with not its breakthrough techonology and most importantly the story

The film begins with a boy named Andy who owns a pull-string cowboy doll, Woody (voice of Tom Hanks). Woody is Andy's favorite toy and is the ruler of the toy kingdom. Life is fine until Andy's sixth birthday, a new toy, Buzz Lightyear: the space ranger (Tim Allen) crash lands into Woody's kingdom and slowly takes

Now, some critics thought the movie would better if the humans looked more realistic, but making the human characters look "cartoonish" works with the premise of the plot where the toys become more real than humans.

The plot is a human story. Love, betrayal, lost of friendship and going back home again. "Toy Story" wasn't a movie about how techonology has advanced and can make the toys come to life. It was about the story, not the techonology, and that makes a tremendous amout of difference if it was a movie or a demo wheel for some computer software.

I won't give anything away since this is kind of movie where you can see it over and over again and still catch little things you never notice before. (and believe me, you will.) And if you think this is a kids movie and you are "too old" to see it, well. just rent a kid for a day. It's worth every penny of your seven dollars. It may be the biggest hit you'll have this holiday season. (They even have a "Toy Story" plaza in California)

British PM supports Bosnia treaty LONDON - President Clinton and British Prime Minister John Major offered suppor Wednesday for the U.S.-brokered peace treaty in Bosnia and an unexpected breakthrough in a man who accidentally donated a Northern Ireland.

"This time is full of possibility," Clintor said. NATO selects Solana to lead mission

BRUSSELS, Belgium - NATO gave the goahead Friday for sending advance units of ; 60,000-strong international army to Bosnia, and finally picked a new secretary general to lead the mission. After more than a month of teer supervisor said he overheard wrangling over NATO's top civilian job, the 16-nation alliance chose Spanish Foreign Minister Javier Solana to guide NATO as i sends an army into harm's way for the first State quietly calling time in its 46-year history. UN unveils new AIDS program

UNITED NATIONS - The United Nations marked World AIDS Day on Friday with a new program coordinating its efforts to fight the disease and a commitment to end discrimination against victims.

"UNAIDS will strengthen and expand national capacities to respond to the epidemic whose dangers and dimensions are yet to be fully grasped in many parts of the world," said Secretary-General Boutros Boutros-Ghali.

The United Nations Program on HIV-AIDS, or UNAIDS, begins operating in Geneva on Jan. 1, replacing the World Health Organization's Global Program on AIDS.

Campbell's Soup means 'uh-oh' for **Texas family**

AUSTIN, Texas - Campbell's noodle soup meant "Uh-oh, bad" for can full of his family's jewels to a food drive.

Tom Cummins tossed in the jewelry safe - a fake Campbell's can - last month, but he didn't notice the mistake until about a week later and

He wouldn't estimate the value of the jewels inside but said the can was filled with irreplaceable items. He is offering a \$2,500 reward.

"I'm hopeful that somebody took it and discovered what's in there," he said. "I don't care who has it. I just want it returned."

Cummins said he reported the mistake to police but no crime was committed so they couldn't help.

Caritas, a social service agency, runs the food pantry that received Cummins' donation of the bogus "M'm! M'm! Good!" can. A volunsomeone talking about an empty soup can, but he told Cummins he wasn' sure what was done with it.

for recall of condoms

ALBANY, N.Y. - New York i quietly recalling thousands of defective condoms sent to community tribution to safe-sex programs.

Complaints about leaks and insuffi cient spermicide in the batch of 3 million Chinese-made Olympus brand condoms started surfacing soon after they were distributed last summer, Health Department spokeswoman Diane Mathis said Thursday.

The condoms were issued to 250 organizations to give to poor people to prevent AIDS.

Mathis said that she wasn't sure how many were distributed to the public but that most were held by the programs when several people complained about the leaks.

The state contacted all of the organizations and asked for the condoms back. It also urged them to contact people who received the condoms.

"I don't know why the decision was made not to make a public announcement," said Joyce Holly, education director for the AIDS

one of the groups that received the condoms.

The Health Department didn't see the need for a general announcement because the condoms were distributed to a select group and were not sold publicly, Mathis said.

Rapper shot dead exactly a year after **Tupac Shakur** wounded in shoot

NEW YORK - A rapper who escaped injury the night his friend Tupac Shakur was shot during a holdup exactly a year ago was himself ambushed and shot to death in his mother's van.

Randy Walker, 27, who used the stage name Stretch and sang with the band Live Squad, was chased by three people in another car and shot several times in the back, police said.

The van glanced off a tree, hit a parked car and flipped, said Officer Debra Kearns, a police spokeswoman.

"The shootings were one year and about five minutes apart," Lt. Vito R. Spano, commander of the detective squad in the 105th Precinct, told The New York Times.

The motive for the shooting early Thursday in the borough of Oueens was unclear, but police said they were investigating a possible connection between the attack and Shakur's shooting a year ago.

Shakur was shot five times and had \$40,000 worth of jewelry stolen after he and three others were confronted outside a Manhattan recording studio. His manager, Freddie Moore, was shot once in the abdomen. Both recovered.

Man dies after receiving wrong blood

DETROIT - A man died one day after receiving a transfusion of the wrong kind of blood at a hospital, a hospital spokesman said today.

Louis Burks, 54, of Arkansas was admitted to Grace Hospital on Nov 17, complaining of chest pains and spokesman John Courte.

The surgery was performed Nov.

"During surgery, Mr. Burks was administered blood that did not match his blood type. This was immediately recognized, actually during the surgery, and immediate corrective action taken," Courte said.

Burks died Nov. 22. The hospital was awaiting word from the Wayne

Council of Northeastern New York, | County Medical Examiner on his cause of death, Courte said.

> "The hospital is conducting an investigation to determine why the wrong blood type was administered to Mr. Burks," he added.

Courte declined to discuss how Burks' body reacted to the mismatched blood or what type of treatment he received after the mistake was discovered.

Burks reportedly was visiting relatives in the Detroit area. Courte said he didn't know where in Arkansas Burks was from.

A new cosby sitcom headed for CBS

NEW YORK - The Cos is back.

Bill Cosby is returning to TV with a new sitcom on CBS, industry sources said Thursday.

The comedian, who helped restore life to a moribund NBC in the 1980s. is the unnamed centerpiece of a CBS news conference set for Friday, the sources said.

In August, Cosby said he was developing a half-hour show loosely based on the British TV series, "One Foot in the Grave." Plans called for Cosby to portray a man between jobs fighting the frustrations of daily life.

He said he was being joined in his effort by the producers of his NBC hit comedy "The Cosby Show."

Cosby showed up with no explanation at Tuesday's news conference called by CBS and Westinghouse to unveil the management team for the newly merged companies.

Currently struggling in the ratings, CBS would clearly be looking for Cosby lightning to strike again. But his most recent series, "The Cosby Mysteries," was a flop last season on NBC.
