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Campus Police announce new security initiatives *Dispatch office coming to Towers is most recent safety effort on campus*

The William Paterson University police department has many new crime fighting initiatives to improve the safety and security on campus, which will add to the regular policing already in progress.

One of the new additions is the

Community Policing Satellite Office, which will open Dec. 3 in the South Tower D130. According to Campus Police Chief Byrd, this office "brings police service to the great majority of residents."

However, some students disagree with that decision.

"They shouldn't have an office in the Towers. Nothing major happens there," said Michelle

Warrington, freshman resident of the Towers.

Phil Randazzo, also a freshman resident of the Towers, agreed. "I really don't think there should be campus police in the Towers. There's enough security already," said Randazzo.

On the other hand, Jason Morroni, freshman resident of Hillside, said, "I don't see what it

can hurt. The more security, the better. Our women need to feel secure."

According to Byrd, the purpose of the satellite office is to lend assistance to the resident community. Students who have private issues, problems with noise, complaints, concerns about safety and security, need to request an escort, or have questions about careers in criminal justice can utilize the new facility, rather than walk to the campus police station.

Byrd said he believes that this will develop a community relationship between the officers and the residents.

"It becomes a place where you

know you can come. Some students feel that police are unapproachable," said Byrd. "It becomes a place in the community where they can get information," he added.

According to Byrd, the satellite office will not be staffed 24 hours a day. There will be afternoon and evening hours seven days a week, which will fluctuate based on the ability to staff. Byrd said that some student security will work in the office.

Seminars will be offered at the office toward the end of the fall semester and in the early spring semester. Here, security in the res-

Campus radio station opens good airways, looks for volunteers

Ever since the campus radio station WPSC FM has changed format, covering sports has become a major part of their program. In the past, WPSC was unable to devote a lot of time to covering sports, but now many of William Paterson University games will be broadcasted.

So far this year, WPSC FM has broadcasted every football game home and away. Coverage of basketball games will begin Nov. 21, and in the spring Baseball will be included as well.

A new "High School Spotlight" show airs on Thursday nights from 9 p.m. to 10 p.m. It is co-hosted by Ira Thor and Justin Siesta. The first portion of the program usually profiles a North Jersey athlete or team, and recaps the previous week in sports. The second portion of the show allows sports fans to call in and talk about sports issues and converse with the athletes.

Thor, who is the sports director for WPSC said, "on average we do one to three games a week. "We've got some good people covering the games. It's high quality."

Siesta said that the show, "is going amazingly well. Ira and I work well together, and the show just keeps getting better."

"All of the people here are working their butts off to make the radio station the best it can be," he

added.

There are also two new shows included in the station's programming. One that is currently airing called "The High School Spotlight" show and the other that will air during basketball season and be hosted by the basketball coach called "The Jose Reimbus Show."

"The Jose Reimbus Show," which is in its final preparations, will also air on Thursday nights. Its time slot is tentatively set for 5:30 p.m. to 6 p.m. This show will feature profiles of basketball teams along with guest athletes.

Thor is very excited about these two new shows especially "High School Spotlight," since this type of show highlighting high school athletes has never been done before. He would also like the WPU community to know that schedules will be posted so that people can have the opportunity to catch their games live on 98.8 FM.

Dana Protrano, the WPSC program director, believes the shows are a "great way" to give recognition to high school teams, and positive for the station in terms of increasing audience size.

"Our radius is very decent with the surrounding counties, and the new sport shows will make people more aware of us," she said.

Guest speakers to kick off new master's degree program

The new Master's Degree Program in History at William Paterson University will be hosting a forum entitled "Russia in Crisis: A Historical Perspective", on Thursday, Nov. 19 at 2 p.m. in the Library Auditorium.

The guest speakers scheduled to attend will be, Stephen Kotkin, Director of Russian Studies at Princeton University and Mark Van Hagen, director of the prestigious Harriman Institute at Columbia University.

Both speakers have many credits to their names. Stephen Kotkin is the author of *Magnetic Mountain: Stalinism as a Civilization* and *Steeltown, USSR: Soviet Society in the Gorbachev Era*. Most recently, he

has focused his attention on the Russian Far East working on the history of Siberia since 1500. Mark Van Hagen book *Soldiers in the Proletarian Dictatorship*, has earned him a reputation as a scholar of the Red army and civil-military relations.

Presently he is working on Ukrainian history and on state-buildings and ethnicity in the Russian and Soviet Empires.

Russia is a country that has seen many changes throughout the centuries. This summer and early this fall the news was filled with stories of the capitalistic problems in post-Communist Russia. It is not uncommon that one reads or hears daily of Boris Yeltsin's prolonged illnesses as well as his inability to provide effective political and economical leadership.

According to Dr. Isabel Tirado,

Chairperson of the History Department and sponsor of this forum, "This is a very special and important event. The provost wanted to celebrate the beginning of the new history master's program with this event."

The forum will be sponsored by the History Department in conjunction with The Office of the Provost and Executive Vice President.

All students are invited to attend the inaugural event. After the forum there will be a brief question and answer period where anyone can ask the two guests about Russia's changing roles.

There will also be a reception in the Library's Paterson Room at 3:30 immediately following the Forum.

University to host scholars in math and physics

Two renowned scholars, Dr. John H. Conway, the von Neumann Professor of Mathematics at Princeton University, and Dr. Michio Kaku, the Henry Semat Professor in Theoretical Physics at City College, City University of New York, will lecture at William Paterson University during the week of Nov. 16.

Dr. Conway, whose visit to the university coincides with William Paterson's annual Math Fair, will speak on Tuesday, Nov. 17 at noon in Science 200A. More than 150 New Jersey high school students are expected to attend.

One of the pre-eminent theorists in the study of finite groups, Conway is the author of more than 10 books and 130 journal articles on a wide variety of mathematical subjects.

Beyond the academic world he is widely known as the inventor of "Game of Life," a computer simulation of simple cellular life. He is the recipient of the 1998 Frederic Esser Nemmers Prize in Mathematics.

Kaku will speak on Friday, Nov. 20 at 9:30 a.m. as part of the university's annual Chemistry Day for high school students.

His address, "Visions: How Science Will Revolutionize the 21st Century," will be held in Science 200A on campus. His audience will include more than 350 high school students from throughout the state.

An internationally recognized authority on theoretical physics, Kaku's goal is to complete Einstein's dream of a "theory of everything," a single equation which would unify all the fundamental forces in the universe.

He has written nine books, including "Hyperspace," which was voted one of the best science books of 1994 by The New York Times. Kaku has lectured around the world, appeared on the "Larry King Show," "60 Minutes," "Nova," and the Discovery Channel's "Science of the Impossible," among other television and radio appearances.

idence halls and ways to reduce the chances of becoming a victim of crime will be discussed.

Byrd said he would like to remind students that the satellite office is not a dispatch center and is not to be used as a substitute for regular police headquarters. If any student encounters a serious problem, he or she should call the campus police station at extension 2300.

Some other new parts of campus police are the blue light phone system, which was put in this past spring semester and the bike patrol, which began this semester. Byrd said that the bikes are used at specific times and are good for the campus because they can go where cars cannot go. Byrd said he thinks that these initiatives will improve the feeling of safety on campus.

"I think they have great potential for being useful and will increase safety in the atmosphere. How they will actually be implemented and what they will be like, we'll have to see. Only time will tell," said Paul MacCracken, junior.

Recently, a non-student was stabbed on campus as a result of what "would appear to be" a dispute over a female, said Byrd. A student's car was also stolen that same evening.

"Unfortunately, we live in a day and age where this happens all too often," said Byrd. "The opportunity for crime is always there. We try to reduce those opportunities," he added.

Byrd said that because the WPU campus is an open society where anyone can come and go, sometimes these incidents will occur. However, "we can deter it by good law enforcement techniques and a responsive community," Byrd added.

Byrd said that from what he's seen, most students feel safe on campus but he would like to "let students know that we're here; we're available. That impacts how safe you feel, if I'm available."

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



Pioneers finish 1998 with record breaking 52-45 win

The Pioneers football team climbed on the back of freshman tailback Alsiene Washington and rode him all the way to 225 yards rushing and 4 touchdowns, sparking a 52-45 win over Salisbury State University Friday night, Nov. 13 at Wightman field.

The Pioneers, subsequently end a treacherous seven-game losing streak, and finish the 1998 campaign on the bright side, with an overall record of 3 and 7; 3 and 2 at the newly refurbished Wightman Field.

The 97 combined points breaks the school record of 83 combined points set Oct. 24, 1980, in a 42-41 win over Ramapo.

From the spectator's vantage point, it looked like it would be a dogfight from the get go.

On the first play from scrimmage, Salisbury (Maryland) quarterback Matt Main connected with wideout Ryan Lambert for 44-yards. Salisbury would end up with a field goal. The Pioneers quickly tied the ballgame at three, courtesy of senior kicker Art Czech.

Salisbury would answer right back, when Tony Hill return the ensuing kickoff 97 yards, for a 10-3 lead. Salisbury dominated the first quarter, leading by two scores 17-3 at the end of the first period.

But the Pioneers would not lay down and let their season end on a negative. In the second quarter, Washington took over. The 6-1, 195-pound freshman from Pleasantville pounded one in from 24-yards out, to close the scoring to 17-10. Salisbury answered back to take a 24-10 lead.

William Paterson stared adversi-

ty in the face, again trailing by two scores approaching the half. The many seniors on this team-quarterback Jamie Golden, wide receiver Dan Carney, offensive linemen Omar Rackley and George Anderson, among others, would not go out on a sour note. The offensive line was brilliant, as was Golden. Washington answered the Salisbury challenge scampering 12 yards with 1:33 remaining in the first half. The point after was blocked; William Paterson trailed at the half 24-16.

"Alsiene took a lot of the load off my back," Golden said.

"He came in as a freshman, and did a hell of a job. I gave him my game ball, because he deserved it, as well as the offensive line, because we could not have done it without them," he added.

Golden, who had a great day in his final game at the helm of this team, passed for 147 yards on 6 of 14, and two touchdowns. He did not throw an interception. Golden also showed his fleet feet off one last time, rushing for 84 yards and one vital score on 16 carries.

William Paterson wasted no time out of the locker room to narrow the gap to two points. In took the Pioneers 2:09 to storm down the field, adding six more on a yard run by Washington; the point after was botched.

The entire drive was made possible thanks to a 59-yard bomb from Golden to junior receiver Donnie Seymour, who had three catches for 93 yards and the game winning score.

Seymour will enter his senior season third all time in career receptions at William Paterson, with 68. Lance Sisco, who is in the William Paterson Hall of Fame had 86 receptions from 1975-

1978. Seymour is 18 catches off the pace.

When Brooks caught his second touchdown of the day for the Seagulls, the Pioneers were tested; and once again they responded. Golden hit big freshman tight end Derek Nobles (6-6 260) from 17-yards out with 8:04 left in the third. The score was 31-29 after Czech's kick.

With 3:47 seconds remaining in the period, Brooks tried to break the hearts of the Pioneers faithful, pulling in a 19 yard pass from Main, to give Salisbury a 38-29 lead heading to the final quarter of the season. Main had his best career performance.

Main, a sophomore from Middletown, Maryland, entered the game with only four touchdown throws, while having been picked off 15 times. Main would shine, in a losing cause, tossing 19 of 28 for 329 yards and five trips to endzoneville. Main was not intercepted.

Regardless of any of these stats, the fourth quarter belonged to the Pioneers. Four seconds into the quarter, Salisbury State was backed up to their own one-yard line, after Czech booted a beautiful 37-yard punt. Tony Ellis, who ran for 167 yards on 22 carries, could not get off his own doormat, being stopped for a safety by freshman linebacker sensation Bobby Fisher. The score was 38-31, and the Pioneers would capitalize on the ensuing drive.

The Pioneers needed five plays and 2:47 to tie the game at 38, after Washington rumbled for his fourth touchdown of the contest, from 17-yards out. The four scores was one shy of the school record. Washington would be instrumental later in the game.

"Washington most definitely is the future of this team at running back," Golden said. "He has a positive attitude, and he is enthusiastic about the game of football. He could be one of the best backs in the (New Jersey Athletic) conference in the future. Alsiene demonstrated tonight if he gets a fair shot what he can do."

The game remained tied until late in the fourth. The Pioneers began to drain the clock. They utilized 7:09, and 15 plays to drive 99 yards, polished off by a 14-yard run by Golden. With 1:37, it looked like the Pioneers would be celebrating a hard-fought 45-38 win.

"I was confident in myself. One on one against anyone, I can get the job done," Golden said explaining his touchdown run that gave the Pioneers the lead. "There was one man to beat, and I got a good block from Dan Carney. I got hit, but I gave the blow rather than taking the blow. My momentum carried me in to the endzone."

Salisbury State was not done. Salisbury would utilize 1:01, driving 65 yards capped by an 11-yard pass from Main to Ellis. The game was tied at 45 with 36 ticks remaining.

"Without a doubt, I was thinking overtime again," Golden added. "I did not want to go to overtime again. (William Paterson needed

three overtimes to beat Waynesburg 45-37 in Week 2). But when Alsiene took ran the kickoff back as far as he did, I knew we had a chance to win the game right there and then."

Washington did just that, returning the ensuing kickoff back 40 yards of pure speed and power. The Pioneers would burn some clock. With six seconds left, Golden, threw far corner towards the endzone. His pass was deflected in the endzone by Salisbury.

However, Seymour maintained his composure and made an incredible diving catch off the redirected pass to win the game. William Paterson win a game that had many fans on the edge of their seats from the get go, 52-45.

"I couldn't believe it," Golden continued. "We were ecstatic."

Seymour ran from sideline to sideline.

"I jumped into Rackley's arms, but he didn't move either because he couldn't believe it either," Golden finished.

Believe it! The Pioneers end on a winning note, setting the mood for the future of Pioneer football.

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Campus Police announce new security initiatives Dispatch office coming to Towers is most recent safety effort on campus

The William Paterson University police department has many new crime fighting initiatives to improve the safety and security on campus, which will add to the regular policing already in progress.

One of the new additions is the

Community Policing Satellite Office, which will open Dec. 3 in the South Tower D130. According to Campus Police Chief Byrd, this office "brings police service to the great majority of residents."

However, some students disagree with that decision.

"They shouldn't have an office in the Towers. Nothing major happens there," said Michelle

Warrington, freshman resident of the Towers.

Phil Randazzo, also a freshman resident of the Towers, agreed. "I really don't think there should be campus police in the Towers. There's enough security already," said Randazzo.

On the other hand, Jason Morroni, freshman resident of Hillside, said, "I don't see what it

can hurt. The more security, the better. Our women need to feel secure."

According to Byrd, the purpose of the satellite office is to lend assistance to the resident community. Students who have private issues, problems with noise, complaints, concerns about safety and security, need to request an escort, or have questions about careers in criminal justice can utilize the new facility, rather than walk to the campus police station.

Byrd said he believes that this will develop a community relationship between the officers and the residents.

"It becomes a place where you

know you can come. Some students feel that police are unapproachable," said Byrd. "It becomes a place in the community where they can get information," he added.

According to Byrd, the satellite office will not be staffed 24 hours a day. There will be afternoon and evening hours seven days a week, which will fluctuate based on the ability to staff. Byrd said that some student security will work in the office.

Seminars will be offered at the office toward the end of the fall semester and in the early spring semester. Here, security in the res-

University to host scholars in math and physics

Two renowned scholars, Dr. John H. Conway, the von Neumann Professor of Mathematics at Princeton University, and Dr. Michio Kaku, the Henry Semat Professor in Theoretical Physics at City College, City University of New York, will lecture at William Paterson University during the week of Nov. 16.

Dr. Conway, whose visit to the university coincides with William Paterson's annual Math Fair, will speak on Tuesday, Nov. 17 at noon in Science 200A. More than 150 New Jersey high school students are expected to attend.

One of the pre-eminent theorists in the study of finite groups, Conway is the author of more than 10 books and 130 journal articles on a wide variety of mathematical subjects.

Beyond the academic world he is widely known as the inventor of "Game of Life," a computer simulation of simple cellular life. He is the recipient of the 1998 Frederic Esser Nemmers Prize in Mathematics.

Kaku will speak on Friday, Nov. 20 at 9:30 a.m. as part of the university's annual Chemistry Day for high school students.

His address, "Visions: How Science Will Revolutionize the 21st Century," will be held in Science 200A on campus. His audience will include more than 350 high school students from throughout the state.

An internationally recognized authority on theoretical physics, Kaku's goal is to complete Einstein's dream of a "theory of everything," a single equation which would unify all the fundamental forces in the universe.

He has written nine books, including "Hyperspace," which was voted one of the best science books of 1994 by The New York Times. Kaku has lectured around the world, appeared on the "Larry King Show," "60 Minutes," "Nova," and the Discovery Channel's "Science of the Impossible," among other television and radio appearances.


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

Pioneers finish 1998 with record breaking 52-45 win

The Pioneers football team climbed on the back of freshman tailback Alsiene Washington and rode him all the way to 225 yards rushing and 4 touchdowns, sparking a 52-45 win over Salisbury State University Friday night, Nov. 13 at Wightman field.

The Pioneers, subsequently end a treacherous seven-game losing streak, and finish the 1998 campaign on the bright side, with an overall record of 3 and 7; 3 and 2 at the newly refurbished Wightman Field.

The 97 combined points breaks the school record of 83 combined points set Oct. 24, 1980, in a 42-41 win over Ramapo.

From the spectator's vantage point, it looked like it would be a dogfight from the get go.

On the first play from scrimmage, Salisbury (Maryland) quarterback Matt Main connected with wideout Ryan Lambert for 44-yards. Salisbury would end up with a field goal. The Pioneers quickly tied the ballgame at three, courtesy of senior kicker Art Czech.

Salisbury would answer right back, when Tony Hill return the ensuing kickoff 97 yards, for a 10-3 lead. Salisbury dominated the first quarter, leading by two scores 17-3 at the end of the first period.

But the Pioneers would not lay down and let their season end on a negative. In the second quarter, Washington took over. The 6-1, 195-pound freshman from Pleasantville pounded one in from 24-yards out, to close the scoring to 17-10. Salisbury answered back to take a 24-10 lead.

William Paterson stared adversi-

ty in the face, again trailing by two scores approaching the half. The many seniors on this team-quarterback Jamie Golden, wide receiver Dan Carney, offensive linemen Omar Rackley and George Anderson, among others, would not go out on a sour note. The offensive line was brilliant, as was Golden. Washington answered the Salisbury challenge scampering 12 yards with 1:33 remaining in the first half. The point after was blocked; William Paterson trailed at the half 24-16.

"Alsiene took a lot of the load off my back," Golden said.

"He came in as a freshman, and did a hell of a job. I gave him my game ball, because he deserved it, as well as the offensive line, because we could not have done it without them," he added.

Golden, who had a great day in his final game at the helm of this team, passed for 147 yards on 6 of 14, and two touchdowns. He did not throw an interception. Golden also showed his fleet feet off one last time, rushing for 84 yards and one vital score on 16 carries.

William Paterson wasted no time out of the locker room to narrow the gap to two points. In took the Pioneers 2:09 to storm down the field, adding six more on a yard run by Washington; the point after was botched.

The entire drive was made possible thanks to a 59-yard bomb from Golden to junior receiver Donnie Seymour, who had three catches for 93 yards and the game winning score.

Seymour will enter his senior season third all time in career receptions at William Paterson, with 68. Lance Sisco, who is in the William Paterson Hall of Fame had 86 receptions from 1975-

1978. Seymour is 18 catches off the pace.

When Brooks caught his second touchdown of the day for the Seagulls, the Pioneers were tested; and once again they responded. Golden hit big freshman tight end Derek Nobles (6-6 260) from 17-yards out with 8:04 left in the third. The score was 31-29 after Czech's kick.

With 3:47 seconds remaining in the period, Brooks tried to break the hearts of the Pioneers faithful, pulling in a 19 yard pass from Main, to give Salisbury a 38-29 lead heading to the final quarter of the season. Main had his best career performance.

Main, a sophomore from Middletown, Maryland, entered the game with only four touchdown throws, while having been picked off 15 times. Main would shine, in a losing cause, tossing 19 of 28 for 329 yards and five trips to endzoneville. Main was not intercepted.

Regardless of any of these stats, the fourth quarter belonged to the Pioneers. Four seconds into the quarter, Salisbury State was backed up to their own one-yard line, after Czech booted a beautiful 37-yard punt. Tony Ellis, who ran for 167 yards on 22 carries, could not get off his own doormat, being stopped for a safety by freshman linebacker sensation Bobby Fisher. The score was 38-31, and the Pioneers would capitalize on the ensuing drive.

The Pioneers needed five plays and 2:47 to tie the game at 38, after Washington rumbled for his fourth touchdown of the contest, from 17-yards out. The four scores was one shy of the school record. Washington would be instrumental later in the game.

"Washington most definitely is the future of this team at running back," Golden said. "He has a positive attitude, and he is enthusiastic about the game of football. He could be one of the best backs in the (New Jersey Athletic) conference in the future. Alsiene demonstrated tonight if he gets a fair shot what he can do."

The game remained tied until late in the fourth. The Pioneers began to drain the clock. They utilized 7:09, and 15 plays to drive 99 yards, polished off by a 14-yard run by Golden. With 1:37, it looked like the Pioneers would be celebrating a hard-fought 45-38 win.

"I was confident in myself. One on one against anyone, I can get the job done," Golden said explaining his touchdown run that gave the Pioneers the lead. "There was one man to beat, and I got a good block from Dan Carney. I got hit, but I gave the blow rather than taking the blow. My momentum carried me in to the endzone."

Salisbury State was not done. Salisbury would utilize 1:01, driving 65 yards capped by an 11-yard pass from Main to Ellis. The game was tied at 45 with 36 ticks remaining.

"Without a doubt, I was thinking overtime again," Golden added. "I did not want to go to overtime again. (William Paterson needed

three overtimes to beat Waynesburg 45-37 in Week 2). But when Alsiene took ran the kickoff back as far as he did, I knew we had a chance to win the game right there and then."

Washington did just that, returning the ensuing kickoff back 40 yards of pure speed and power. The Pioneers would burn some clock. With six seconds left, Golden, threw far corner towards the endzone. His pass was deflected in the endzone by Salisbury.

However, Seymour maintained his composure and made an incredible diving catch off the redirected pass to win the game. William Paterson win a game that had many fans on the edge of their seats from the get go, 52-45.

"I couldn't believe it," Golden continued. "We were ecstatic."

Seymour ran from sideline to sideline.

"I jumped into Rackley's arms, but he didn't move either because he couldn't believe it either," Golden finished.

Believe it! The Pioneers end on a winning note, setting the mood for the future of Pioneer football.
