






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Sample Script for Safer Sex


- If Your Partner Says:** What's that?

Advice For Condom Users

- Open an individual packet only when ready to use the condom. And open it gently, to avoid tearing the contents. If the rubber feels brittle or sticky or looks discoloured, discard the condom. It's spoiled.
- Don the condom when the penis is erect but before sexual contact. Place the tip of the rolled-up condom over the penis. If there is a reservoir tip, first squeeze out the air. If there is no tip, leave a half-inch space at the end for semen and squeeze the air out.
- Unroll the condom down the entire length of the penis (uncircumcised men should first pull back the foreskin).
- Right after ejaculation, grasp the condom firmly at the ring and withdraw before losing the erection, to prevent spillage.
- Make sure condoms are available and conveniently located. If no condoms are handy at the time of a sexual encounter, you may be tempted to have intercourse without one.
- Do not carry condoms in your wallet for long periods of time. Replace them every once in a while. Friction from opening and clos-

ing your wallet, and from walking (if you carry your wallet in your pocket) can cause tiny holes to develop in the condom. Nevertheless, it is better to use a condom that has been in

your wallet for a long time than to not use one at all.

• Don't use a condom that is brittle, sticky or discoloured. These are signs of age, and old condoms are more likely to break.

• If a condom package is damaged, don't use the condom because it may be damaged also.

• Use each condom only once.

• Do not use a petroleum based substance such as Vaseline as a lubricant. These substances break down latex. (They also promote yeast infections in women.)

• If you feel a condom break during intercourse, stop immediately and put a new one on. Remember,

ejaculation does not have to occur for pregnancy to result (pre-ejaculatory fluids can contain active sperm), or for a disease to be transmitted.

• Store condoms in a cool, dry place. Heat, light and air pollution can all hasten deterioration.

Condom Tips

Before Sex use a new condom every time you have sex—before foreplay, before your penis gets anywhere near any body opening to avoid exposure (to any body fluid that can carry infection). Handle the condom gently.

Put condom on as soon as penis is hard. Be sure rolled-up ring is on the outside. And leave space at the tip to hold semen when you come.

Squeeze tip gently so no air is trapped inside. Hold tip while you unroll condom...all the way down to the hair. If condom doesn't unroll, it's on wrong. Throw it away. Start over with a new one.

After Sex pull out slowly right after you come, while penis is still hard. Hold condom in place on penis to avoid spilling semen. Turn and move completely away before you let go of condom. Dispose of used condom properly, NOT in the toilet. And no more sex without a new condom.

Condom Top 10

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
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

Prevention and Treatment of Sexually Transmitted Diseases as an HIV Prevention Strategy

The interconnectedness of HIV and other sexually transmitted diseases (STDs) grows increasingly apparent as biomedical and behavioral scientists learn more about people's susceptibility and risks. CDC is applying new research to the prevention of all major STDs, including HIV infection, and is working to ensure communities have the information they need to design, implement, and evaluate comprehensive approaches to HIV and STD prevention.

The Parallel Epidemics of HIV Infection and Other STDs

Globally, an estimated 333 million new cases of curable STDs(1) occur each year among adults, according to 1995 estimates by the World Health Organization. STDs in the United States have reached epidemic proportions with an estimated 12 million new cases each year.(2) Of these, 3 million occur among teenagers, 13 to 19 years old. STDs are the most common reportable diseases in the United States.(3) The sexual spread of HIV in the United States has paralleled that of other STDs. For example, the geographic distribution of heterosexual

HIV transmission closely parallels that of other STDs. Most of the health districts with the highest syphilis and gonorrhea rates in the United States are concentrated in the South, the same part of the nation with the highest HIV prevalence among childbearing women. Researchers have long recognized that the risk behaviors which place individuals at risk for other STDs also increase a person's risk of becoming infected with HIV. STD surveillance can provide important indications of where HIV infection may spread, and where efforts to promote safer sexual behaviors should be targeted.

Other STDs Facilitate HIV Transmission

There is now strong evidence that other STDs increase the risk of HIV transmission and, conversely, that STD treatment reduces the spread of HIV.

Epidemiological studies: Studies have repeatedly demonstrated that people are 2-5 times more likely to become infected with HIV when other STDs are present.

Biological studies: Biological studies suggest both increased susceptibility to HIV

infection and increased likelihood of infecting other people when other STDs are present.

a) **Increased susceptibility** - STDs that cause genital lesions can create a portal of entry for HIV. And even without lesions, STDs increase the number of HIV target cells (CD4 cells) in cervical secretions, thereby likely increasing HIV susceptibility in women.

b) **Increased infectiousness** - Studies have demonstrated that co-infection with HIV and other STDs results both in more shedding of HIV and in greater concentrations of HIV being shed. For example, in African studies, co-infection with gonorrhea and HIV more than doubles the proportion of HIV-infected individuals with HIV RNA detectable in genital secretions.

Furthermore, the median concentration of HIV RNA in semen is dramatically increased in co-infected men compared with men infected with HIV alone.

New Evidence of the Effectiveness of STD Treatment in HIV Prevention

Intervention studies: New evidence indi-

cates that STD detection and treatment can substantially reduce HIV transmission.

For example:

a) STD treatment reduces the prevalence and magnitude of HIV shedding -- Treatment of gonorrhea in HIV-infected men resulted in a reduction in the number of men who shed HIV, as well as a lower concentration of HIV shed. With STD treatment, the level of shedding among co-infected men returns to the level seen in men who are not co-infected.

b) STD treatment reduces the spread of HIV infection in communities -- A community-level, randomized trial in a rural African community in Tanzania demonstrated a 42% decrease in new, heterosexually transmitted HIV infections in communities with improved STD treatment. An ongoing study in Uganda is further exploring the impact of mass STD treatment in slowing the spread of HIV. These studies will be critical in more clearly defining the role STD treatment can play in HIV prevention efforts in the developing world and in industrialized nations

CDC Gives Straight Talk on Condoms

Condoms users have product options!

There are several types of condoms. Nearly all types offer protection against HIV and other STDs.

Latex condoms for men. Latex condoms are made of a particular kind of rubber. Laboratory studies show that intact latex condoms provide a highly effective barrier to sperm and micro-organisms, including HIV and the much smaller hepatitis B virus. Their effectiveness has been proven over many years.

Synthetic condoms. For people who are allergic to latex, several new types of materials are being used to make condoms. One new type is polyurethane, a soft plastic. Another new type is Tactylon TM*, a synthetic latex. Lab tests have shown that both these materials provide an effective barrier against sperm, bacteria, and viruses such as HIV.

Polyurethane condoms for women. The female condom (Reality TM*) fits inside the vagina and covers some of the area outside of the vagina. It also is made of polyurethane. When a male condom cannot be used, couples should consider using a female condom.

Unlike latex condoms, synthetic condoms such as male and female polyurethane condoms can be used with either water-based or oil-based lubricants.

Although not as thoroughly tested as latex condoms, synthetic condoms likely provide similar protection.

Lambskin condoms. These condoms are made from animal membranes that contain tiny holes. While they can prevent pregnancy, they should not be used for STD or HIV prevention because viruses may be able to pass

through these holes.

Novelty condoms. Novelty (play) condoms are for sexual amusement only. The FDA does not allow them to be labeled as condoms, and they should never be used for STD/HIV or pregnancy prevention.

Spermicides. Although studies indicate that nonoxonyl-9, a spermicide, kills HIV in laboratory testing, it is not clear whether spermicides used alone or with condoms during intercourse provide protection against HIV. Therefore, latex condoms with or without spermicides should be used to prevent sexual transmission of HIV.

Oral protection. Even though their risk is less than with unprotected anal and vaginal sex, people who engage in oral sex can reduce their risk of getting HIV or another STD by placing a barrier over the vagina or anus. In addition to the male condom, a product designed to reduce the risk of acquiring an STD during oral sex is now being sold in the United States. The Sheer Glyde Dam TM* is a 10" x 6" latex sheet that the FDA has authorized for marketing in the United States. Plastic food wrap, dental dams (pieces of latex used by dentists), and condoms that have been cut open all have been used to cover the vagina or anus during oral sex, although there is no information about how well these materials work.

Education about condom efficacy does not promote sexual activity

Five U.S. studies of specific sex education programs have demonstrated that HIV education and sex education that included condom information either had no effect

upon the initiation of intercourse or resulted in delayed onset of intercourse; five studies of specific programs found that HIV/sex education did not increase frequency of intercourse, and a program that included development of skills to negotiate safer sexual behaviors actually resulted in a decrease in the number of youth who initiated sex. In addition, a World Health Organization (WHO) review cited 19 studies of sex education programs that found no evidence that sex education leads to earlier or increased sexual activity in young people. In fact, five of the studies cited by WHO showed that such programs can lead to a delay or decrease in sexual activity. In a recent study of youth in Los Angeles, an HIV prevention program focusing on condom use did not increase sexual activity or the number of sex partners. But condom use did increase among those who were already sexually active. A 1987 study of young U.S. men who were sent a pamphlet discussing STDs with an offer of free condoms also did not find any increase in the youths' reported sexual activity.

Prevention is cost-effective

In summary, STDs, including HIV infection, are preventable, and condoms represent an effective prevention tool. A recent analysis estimated that, for high-risk heterosexual men, the societal savings (in health care costs and productivity) per condom was \$27, and for men who have sex with men, the savings per condom was more than \$530 when condoms were used consistently and correctly with multiple partners.

Smoke Condition Evacuates White Hall

Wayne, NJ—It was no fire drill—no false alarm. When the fire alarm horns sounded shortly before midnight on November 29 in the White Hall Dormitory at William Paterson University, students were surprised to realize that something in the building was on fire.

"We heard the alarm and we went to open the door to evacuate. As soon as we opened

the door, we saw smoke," said Jennifer Fanning, a resident on the 3rd floor. "I said 'holy shit, there's a fire!'"

University police officers responded to the alarm within minutes, said students standing outside the dormitory in the cold night air.

The North Haledon and Wayne Fire Departments responded to the "smoke condition." According to fire officials, the cause of the smoke condition was burnt food left in a microwave oven "for an extended peri-

od of time."

Information on the specific room and student(s) involved where the incident occurred was not immediately available at press time, but residence life officials said that no one was injured as a result of the smoke or evacuation.

Residents of White Hall (an academic-oriented, adult living community) were evacuated for a little more than half an hour. Some were relocated to the nearby Towers Dormitory Complex and Matelson Hall,

where they waited for an all clear.

Robert Arano was a visitor at the time of the evacuation.

"I heard the alarm and I said 'Jesus Christ, a fucking fire drill.' Then we opened the door and smelled smoke...it smelled like really badly burnt popcorn. We got the hell out of there."

Resident Assistants at the time of the alarm checked each room to make sure that all occupants were evacuated. No students were found in the building.

AIDS patient speaks at WPU

Wayne, NJ—If you look at the way she makes an entrance, you'd think Dawn Breedon was just the same self-proclaimed diva she was ten years ago.

She recalls how her now short, dreaded hair was once long and straight, how she had a horde of diamond jewelry, a fur coat and two new cars, all bought by her \$100,000 a year salary as a hairdresser.

"I looked like Donna Summer,"

Breedon recalled.

But it was during a hairdressing class that Breedon remembers feeling the ignorance that even her closest friends have shown her. "A woman next to me said she didn't like a certain client because she knew he had AIDS," Breedon said. "Well, I wanted to laugh because she was sitting next to me."

In October of '91, Breedon was diagnosed with HIV, the virus that causes AIDS. She contracted it through her boyfriend at the time, who didn't tell her he was infected.

"People don't tell and don't want

to know because of psychosocial issues," Breedon explained. "I tell people unless you know everything about your partner, would you trust them with you life?"

She spoke to students last Wednesday at William Paterson University as part of World Aids Week on campus, created as a way for students to learn about prevention and the effects AIDS has on people.

Breedon wants to give hope to people who feel their life is over when they are diagnosed with the virus.

"When people find out, they reject you," Breedon said. "And it's one thing to be rejected, but it's another thing for everyone else to know, but when people don't tell, that's dangerous...HIV was not a death notice, it was a wake up call to deal with my body."

"Every time I speak to kids they always ask me, 'Aren't you afraid you're going to die?' But I tell them every one will die someday...but just like them, I don't know when, and my choice was I can die sooner or later."

Breedon continues to speak with

people about the personal stigmas she continues to face. Her most important challenge has been trying to change the face of a person living with HIV and kill all the stereotypes.

"My message is faith and that life doesn't stop here," Breedon said in her greatest diva voice. "Remember that I never thought I could get HIV, but I did...And I still look good."

would be.



Marilyn Manson, meet J.S. Bach

In the annals of music history, Marilyn Manson won't even warrant a footnote. But the freakish shock rocker released a new album this month that has some religious groups understandably up in arms. The cover of "Holy Wood" depicts Manson in a Christ-like pose, wearing a crown of thorns and sporting crucifixion marks in his hands and torso. The lyrics of one song taunt: "Dear God, if you were alive, you know we'd kill you."

Manson fashions himself a musical revolutionary teeming with profound thoughts and unappreciated works (such as "Antichrist Superstar") that will one day be

embraced and immortalized. In an interview with USA Today this week, Manson offered this deep meditation: "Art, by nature, has to be evil because it challenges the status quo and what the mainstream defines as beautiful or moral or ideal."

People of faith needn't be alarmed. Marilyn Manson is an inconsequential speck in the artistic universe. His godless "music" and message possess a shorter half-life than an order of McDonald's french fries. Manson's dark cult of nihilism sinks even deeper into the abyss of cultural irrelevance when viewed in light of this year's commemoration of the 250th anniversary of Johann Sebastian Bach's death.

The devoutly religious composer's impact is timeless, global, and truly revolutionary. Celebrations of Bach's work are taking place around the world, from Leipzig to Tokyo to Des Moines. In his 65 years on earth, the German-born Bach produced an astonishing amount of music — enough to fill 153 CDs. Bach was a rebel of a different sort, cranking out whole forests of Baroque compositions that were considered outdated in his own time. He was no slave to fashion. He was, first and foremost, a servant of God.

Bach often signed his manuscripts with Latin expressions of faith — "J.J.," for "Jesu Juva (Help me, Jesus)" at the beginning of a piece;

"S.D.G.," for "Soli Deo Gloria (To God alone, the glory)" at the end. Christoph Wolff, famed Harvard music scholar and author of the newly published "Johann Sebastian Bach: The Learned Musician," writes that Bach was thoroughly committed to pursuing "true music" — that is, music whose "ultimate end or final goal" was "the honor of God and the recreation of the soul."

Bach used his intellectual gifts, with which he believed he had been endowed by his Creator, to build the foundations of what Professor Wolff calls a "musical science." His work was an enlightened

search for truth, a lifelong exercise to reveal God's harmonious ordering of the universe. His use of counterpoint, one admirer wrote, provided "the humble bricks and mortar with which he builds cathedrals and heavens to praise God and the

angels, and a tool to plumb the innermost recesses of the sensitive heart, all through mere notes and their carefully controlled interactions."

Popular music today is often aimed at doing the exact opposite — blaspheming God's name and tearing down those who worship Him. Christian music is marginalized as a quaint oddity; Christians are portrayed in the mainstream media and on MTV as dull and uncreative followers of the church.

The endurance of Bach's music and the universal recognition of his genius transcend modern contempt for divinely inspired art. It's not just his masses and chorales and cantatas, but also his intricate inventions and fugues and concertos that resonate across cultures and religions. Only the most unreconstructed atheist will not be moved by the soaring strains of "Jesu, Joy of Man's Desire" or the simple spirituality of the Prelude No. 1 in C major or the aching beauty of the Mass in B minor or any of the unaccompanied cello suites.

The Marilyn Mansons of the world can bask in their vulgar 15 minutes' worth of fame. But "art" inspired by nothing fades to nothingness soon enough. For lovers of true music, gloriously dedicated, Bach rocks on.

New Jersey ranks fifth in the nation in reported AIDS cases, and third in reported pediatric AIDS cases.

• Women are the fastest growing group of people with HIV/AIDS. The NJ Department of Health estimates 20,000 women could be infected with HIV. As of

June 30, 1993, 4,091 New Jersey women had been diagnosed with AIDS.

• Women account for 24 percent of all reported AIDS cases in New Jersey, compared to 11 percent nationally. It is the highest proportion of women with AIDS in the United States. They account for 36 percent of all reported HIV-positive residents.

• Since 1981, transmission from injection drug use has accounted for 57% of AIDS cases among women, and heterosexual transmission has accounted for 35%. From July 1, 1992 to June 30, 1993, transmission from injection drug use decreased to 47% of AIDS cases among women and heterosexual transmission increased to 42%.

Women with AIDS are undercounted because the

Centers for Disease Control definition of AIDS does not include most women-specific infections and cancers

Facts about women and AIDS

(for example, chronic vaginal candidiasis, pelvic inflammatory disease, and cervical dysplasia), although cases of invasive cervical cancer have been included since January 1, 1993.

In New Jersey, among new cases of AIDS in women, 64% were African-American, 21% were white and 14% were Latina. From the beginning of the epidemic, the breakdown is 67% African-American, 21% white and 12% Latina.

The average maternal-fetal transmission rate is 30%, but in the City of Newark the rate is 18-22%.

AIDS is the leading cause of death in New Jersey for African-American women between

the ages of 15-44, and the second most prevalent cause of death for all women.

The New Jersey Women and AIDS Network is an independent, multicultural, statewide organization of over 500 agencies and individuals. Members are women with HIV, service providers, educators, health, legal, medical professionals, women's advocates, policy-makers, and community members. Established in May 1988, NJWAN initiated the urgent and vital campaign to safeguard the rights of HIV-infected women and


to prevent further transmission of HIV. The Network makes it possible for people concerned about the invisibility of women with AIDS to come together to work toward:

- Insuring appropriate, sufficient, and effective resources and services to reduce the spread of AIDS and HIV infection among women;
- Promoting the prevention of AIDS and HIV infection through culturally sensitive, class-oriented, non-heterosexist, and gender-specific education;
- Protecting the legal and human rights of women and their children and safeguarding against the premature termination of those rights.

On the morning of November 18 my family and I left our house and took part in the most grueling day of travel that has been known to man, in order to get to our destination—


Guadeloupe.

but I actually got a lot of exercise.



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



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There's no denying that December holds in its hands something magical. Children whisper about it, families plan for it, and advertisers fairly shove it down our all-too-eager throats.

At some point before the Electoral College votes on Dec. 17, the presidential result will be determined.

That said, there's a lot of misplaced commentary that whoever wins

will "not be able to govern." Nonsense. After Jack Kennedy was inaugurated in 1961, no one doubted that he was president, even though he had won by a doubtful sliver of votes.

An abiding question about the presidential race is why Gore chose to swing to the left, at least rhetorically. His entire political history has been marked by caution and by the moderation typical of a border-state politician. In 1988, in

his failed bid for the Democratic Party nomination, he attacked Michael Dukakis from the right. He even pioneered the Willie Horton issue.

So why did Gore emerge after the Democratic National Convention this year howling about the "big drug companies," the "special interests" and so on, attacking the "rich" (i.e., the 20 percent who pay 80 percent of the federal income tax) and vowing to "fight" so often that one felt like a spectator at a boxing match?

My guess is that he pulled the rhetoric of the Gore campaign to the left, to the great disadvantage of the campaign.

The darkest nightmare for Republicans is that they might not have gotten rid of Clinton after all. In this scenario, Hillary Clinton wins the Senate seat for New York. Then, if Gore loses, she runs for president in 2004 -- or else 2008 -- Bill Clinton runs for vice president of her ticket, and then they are back in the White House again!

Well, Hillary scored a solid win over Rep. Rick Lazio, a little-known congressman from suburban

high-school debater, pulling that silly trick in the first debate of striding toward Hillary's podium and demanding that she sign a paper renouncing soft money.

Lazio followed up this maneuver with a clumsy attempt to pin the bombing of the destroyer Cole on Hillary (no kidding) because she had received contributions from an Arab-American group allegedly "linked" to the terrorist organization Hamas.

On top of all that, his statewide strategy was poor. Everyone, except apparently Lazio and his campaign manager, knows that to win statewide in New York, a Republican has to score big upstate.

The Lazio campaign paid only disorganized attention to the upstate voters, and the candidate himself was eerily upbeat about the economy there.

In the end, the large vote he did pick up was merely anti-Hillary, not pro-Lazio.



Wealthy women, however, whether debutantes or movie stars, were shown as having sleek, slim, almost serpentine figures which were often posed languidly over an overstuffed chair. 
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CAPONE-N-NOREAGA REUNITE

Tommy Boy records and they released the monumental 1997 album, *The War Report*. Despite critical acclaim and high sales, CNN weren't able to bask in glory for too long, as Capone was sent back to prison. Talk about "Keeping it Real."

During the 2 1/2 years that Capone spent in prison, Noreaga released two solo albums, but let the world know that CNN was still alive. He said, "I didn't come to this game to do it by myself. It was always in the back of my mind, I want my man to shine, I want my man to be happy." And their new album, *The Reunion*, is the culmination of that statement. This disc finds the duo returning to the style that got attention back in 97, dropping streetwise rhymes about real life over sick beats. And by far, the most biographical and emotional track on the album, which is also the first single, is "Phonetime."

Some of the other standout tracks on *The Reunion* are "Bang Bang," which features Foxy Brown's vicious dis of Lil' Kim, and "Straight Like That," which sounds like it came out of Dr. Dre's hit factory, with classical strings and features guest rhymer Algado & Shoballotti (Final Chapter.) Some other guests on *The Reunion* include Carl Thomas, who sings the disc's opener, "Change is Gonna Come," Nas and Mobb Deep. All in all, *The Reunion* serves as a positive chapter in the "Keep it Real" story of Capone-N-Noreaga.

"Keep it real." No doubt, if you are a hip-hop fan you have heard this street credo numerous times, on records and in magazines, and you might have even said it yourself. But rarely does the motto mean much more than an easy way to sound like you're "down." For Queens hip-hop team Capone-N-Noreaga (CNN) however, the term "Keep it Real" means a lot more than that. It describes a life that they actually lead, unlike most of their hip-hop peers. According to Noreaga, "We got the illest struggle. There's nobody in the street that's been through what we've been through." And he's right too.

News of Taproot's live shows spread through word of mouth. They put out another CD, *Mentobe*. By 1999 Taproot's website jumped from 200 hits a day the year before, to 30,000 in 1999.

"We are not selling out to redefine music but to apply our own technique to make honest music that will affect people the way the music of other artists has affected us," said bassist Phil Elcorrum. They were picked up by Atlantic Records, which caused some conflict with Limp Bizkit, who were in talks with the band about producing them. Over the summer Taproot promoted their single, "Again and Again," during a club tour with Papa Roach and (Head) Her.

White Pony, the Deftones third effort, was released on October 3 with new CD cover art and a new song so powerful they named their current tour after it. Vocalist, Chino Moreno explained the phenomena known as "Back to School (Mini-Maggon)," saying that the band originally wanted to put the song on the album, but never completed it. "When we were in Los Angeles last month, we went into the studio and finished it. We took it to Maverick and they were so blown away they wanted to release it as our next single and re-release the album with it added," he concluded.

The Back to School tour kicked off October 13 in Seattle, after the original release of the CD on October 3. However, it was over the summer that the search for bands to tour with began. The Deftones and Incubus both expressed interest in going on the road together during visits to MTV's Total Request Live. Thus, a sell out tour was born, after Incubus completed touring with 311.

Taproot completes the line up, supporting Gift, their debut album on a major label. The rap-core band formed in 1997 in Ann Arbor, Michigan. In 1998, Taproot self-released, produced and distributed a full length CD. Reporter for the Michigan Daily,

also gained a spot on *Cizizest*. The Back to School tour almost didn't stop at NYC's Roseland Ballroom Nov. 19 and 20. Two previous shows in Ontario and Pennsylvania were canceled due to Moreno's bruised vocal pipes. However, he recovered and was able to meet the fans before the show, who won backstage passes from their website, in Asbury Park one night earlier. Guitarist, Mike DeWolf, was the only member not present when I asked the band to pose for pictures. A band on a major tour taking time out right after their set to meet fans is almost unheard of these days. It's cool to see a band, after they make it big, still take the time out for the people that gave them their fame.

"This is a song we don't usually play live, but what the fuck," said Boyd before "I Miss You." They also took an audience request and played "Nower's Feet." "When it Comes," "Clean," and "Drive."

During "Pardon Me," with which they ended, someone's foot missed my face by centimeters. I decided I got more than I came to the concert for, including Boyd removing his shirt, and called it a night. In Oct. 1999, *Metal Hammer* magazine said, "Make Yourself is a mature, inventive and invigorating record, proof that you can wear your pants and still make great music. If only all metal albums were made this way." Only all metal bands were this good live and secure enough in their music to cover Big Pun's "Still Not A Player."

Bon Jovi Makes Triumphant Homecoming at Meadowlands

As a frequent concert goer, I've never seen a show as captivating as the one that was put on by Bon Jovi on November 16th at the Continental Airlines Area in East Rutherford. Bon Jovi, known for their energetic live shows, was the last band to walk off the stage at London's Wembley Stadium before it closed. This was after two performances, each of which had sold out its 72,000 seats. That's a long way from playing in the basement of guitarist Richie Sambora's house on Harlet Street in Woodbridge, New Jersey. So how did the band return to its home late arena after seven years? Here's a by-the-set-list description of the show and all of its surprises.

Ska band, Less Than Jake opened the show. The lead singer came out dressed as a rocker and in a long, black wig and shiny black pants. While the band played songs like, "History of a Boy in Town," a guy in a skull mask danced around the stage and mingled with those in the front row. They threw blow-up guitars to the crowd and dedicated their version of the Partridge Family's theme song, "I Think I Love You," to a woman in the crowd. "This next song is for the lady with her arms crossed who thinks we suck," said the singer. They told the crowd, "If you still like Rock 'N' Roll," buy their new CD, so they can have money for Jack Daniels. After their set they thanked Bon Jovi for having them.

The stage for Bon Jovi was set up to look like the outside of a brick building, complete with a power in, lights, a staircase and an elevator. Tico Torres's drum set and Dave Brya's keyboard were on elevated platforms. Behind the Marshall amp-lined stage was the largest video screen ever used for a concert. When the arena lights went out, a voice saying "Stand by" came over the

intercom and announced that the band was leaving its dressing room. The video screen showed images of a satellite and the cartoonish opening riffs to "One Wild Night" played. The screen showed the band inside the elevator, whose doors opened to reveal Bon Jovi. They emerged and walked onto the stage, on which they stood silently for a few moments. It was a magical sight. Every person in the enormous crowd was on his feet as Jon Bon Jovi, in shiny gold pants and a black leather jacket, sang the opening lyrics. When the song was finished Jon addressed the crowd. He asked if they had had it with politics and sports and said, "All you gotta do is believe. He then told the crowd to put their hands in the air as Bon Jovi performed a single from Slippery When Wet, which is still one of the biggest selling rock albums of all time. Jon let the audience

finish the last words on "You Give Love A Bad Name," before he said, "Good evening Meadowlands, New Jersey. Long time, no see, my friends." He announced that there were several Rap and Rock stars, including some E-Streeters, in addition to the band's families, roaming the halls backstage. There were also some players from the Giants and the Jets (Wayne Chrebet sat a row away from me). Next he put his hand on his forehead, searching the crowd. He called over bassist, Hugh McDonald, as a couple appeared in spotlights on the screen. He said that Captain Crash, a character about whom he had written a song on, "Crush" about, was in the audience. He was MTV's Jesse Camp, with a Cindy Lauper look-alike. During the song, "Captain Crash and the Beauty Queen From Mars," Bon Jovi sang about famous couples, including Sid and Nancy, Fred and Ginger, Bonnie and Clyde, Liz and Richard, Kurt and Courtney, Bogie and Bacall, Jolita' Joe and Miss Monroe, all flashed across the screen as Jon said their names. After the song was over, he said, "Ricky Martin, eat your heart out baby."

Bon Jovi brought out maracas and made jungle sounds as they played "Keep the Faith." It was a touching moment as various images flashed across the screen. They included disabled people, signs with "we shall overcome" written on them, war scenes, athletes, images of the Holocaust, Martin Luther King, Jr. and Princess Diana. Richie, wearing license plate patterned

video were shown. Dave's shirt was soaked by now and Jon's hair was dripping wet. The lights went out, Jon grabbed a guitar and candles appeared on the monitor to set the mood for the first ballad of the evening, "Thank

You For Loving Me." The song was inspired by the movie "Meet Joe Black." Jon's eyes were closed as he sang with his arms

wide open. He licked his lips as sweat poured off his head onto his face.

"Blaze of Glory" was next. On the screen, scenes from the movie "Young Guns II," starring Christian Slater and Emilio Estevez played. The spotlight shone on Richie and Jon made the sign of the cross. Next, Jon got the audience clapping as he stamped his feet and played solo on the guitar. Richie came back onto the stage and the band played "Blood On Blood."

Donning a black beret, Jon continued to work the stage with his moves as he sang "Someday I'll Be Saturday Night." On the screen, scenes of people on dates, Times Square, and a man winning the lottery with a dollar he finds on the ground, were shown. "Are you still with me out there?" Jon asked the crowd. Richie changed his jacket, for the third time, into a red blazer and added a hat to complete his thrift store look.

Tico and Dave started the music for "Lay Your Hands On Me," until Richie, Hugh and Jon, in a tight black turtle neck, came back on stage. Jon said, "Here at Jonnie's Church of Rock 'N' Roll we ain't got no sinners. All we got are preachers and the newly converted." He edged the audience on by saying, "Come on, move" and "You can lay your hands anywhere you want baby." "You got your dancing shoes on?" Jon asked before "I'll Sleep When I'm Dead." "I think it's about time you move your feet. The band's on fire tonight," he continued. He then said a lot has happened since the return of Bon Jovi. He commented on all the boy bands and said, "You got a man band here."


In his rock star voice, Jon talked about the band's break after These Days, during which they recorded solo albums, had children, exhibited art, worked in musical theater and became movie stars. "I have been bitten by the bug," Jon said. He then spoke about how there are no football teams in California, but there are parties with celebrities. He also said how anyone can knock on the door asking to buy you a beer and that

he has run away from home, but don't tell his wife and kids. "I was shackled up in La La Land," said Jon. That is, until one day he answered a knock on his door and saw Richie, Hugh, Dave and Tico standing on

Bounce saved by Affleck and Paltrow's Stellar Acting

For those tired of witnessing movie stars repeatedly turning up as the same character with only slight variations on previous roles (stand up, Bill Murray), Don Roos' "Bounce" provides moviegoers with the chance to watch two stars do notable work and overcome the shortcomings of Roos' script.

Ben Affleck plays Buddy Amaral, a smug executive at a Los Angeles advertising agency whose life takes a sharp turn after he lets Greg Janello (Tony Goldwyn), take his place on a flight so Greg can return to his family and Buddy can spend the night at an airport hotel with Mimi (Natasha Henstridge), whom Buddy has just met in an airport bar. The flight crashes, leaving no survivors, and Buddy shaken enough to slide into alcoholism, helped along by the guilt he feels when his agency creates the apologetic television spots used by the offending airline to restore their image.

Buddy eventually lands in a Palm Springs rehabilitation center, emerging ninety days later sober, but unreformed, until he is brought down to reality at his office's "Welcome Back" party, where he is tempted by an unfinished drink left on a bathroom counter and saved from downing it by his new assistant, Seth. The guidelines of Buddy's 12-step recovery program call for him to make reparations to those his behavior has hurt, so he tracks down Greg's widow, Abby (Gwyneth Paltrow), and personally helps her with both her career and her love life, without telling her about his giving Greg his flight ticket.

Affleck is just as square-jawed and handsome as the last time you may have seen him, and it's easy to believe Paltrow as Abby falls for him, though the pious, straight edge Buddy is a flatter character than the smirking womanizer of the movie's early scenes.

While Buddy misleads Abby about his intentions, she in turn lies to him by telling Buddy that she and Greg got divorced rather than admitting to his death and accepting the sympathy she has become sick of. Paltrow is utterly convincing as a young widow struggling to raise two sons and hold down a job, and it is particularly refreshing to see her as a harried woman with bags under her eyes and hair that often needs serious work, instead of the more glamorous roles in which one would expect to find a movie star of her stature.

As Abby and Buddy grow closer, he fails to take any of several chances to tell her about giving his ticket to Greg, leading to Mimi's turning up on Abby's doorstep with information for her about what happened at the airport and a very foreseeable confrontation between Abby and Buddy over his deception.

Where *Bounce* disappoints, besides in the predictable line it takes with an interesting story idea, is in some of the dialogue the stars are given to speak. Buddy has clearly fallen in love with Abby, but when she asks him what he wants from her, he only tells her that he needs someone to help him pick out videos to rent and a "Last call of the day," making him more like a careerist looking for someone to see in his off hours than a determined young man in love with an admirable, beautiful woman.

Of the supporting cast, Johnny Galecki stands out as Seth, Buddy's tart-tongued assistant who shares his alcoholism and becomes Buddy's conscience, putting through Abby's phone calls after Buddy, unable to confess to the truth to Abby and looking for an easy escape in the relationship's early days, has instructed Seth to help him to avoid Abby.

Bounce has none of the hip edge that made Roos' *The Opposite of Sex* such a pleasure, but watching its two lead actors, especially Affleck, stretch themselves while looking for all the nuances of their characters makes the movie worth a trip to the theater.

Backstreet Boys Still on Top of Boy-Bandwagon



Black and Blue, the Backstreet Boys' fourth effort, is a choreographer's dream. Its aggressive dance tracks will make it hard for listeners to keep their feet still. When first listening to the album, I was slightly taken back. This is not a traditional pop album and it is certainly not like any of the group's previous albums.

"The Call," will be released as the next single. I have to admit, the phone call before the song begins in a bit cheesy. No, but they have become comfortable enough with their place in the music industry to do their own thing. Since the release of the Grammy-nominated Millennium a year and a half ago, the band has publicly confessed to what many critics see as the kiss of death for all guy bands—they have girlfriends. Not only that, but both Kevin Richardson and Brian Littrell married their sweethearts this past year.

This has not stopped fans around the world from loving them. To promote Black and Blue, the band went on for a four day tour of the world, visiting six continents in 100 hours. They spent 55 hours on a 28 seat jet and 45 hours on the ground. They began in Sweden, where they performed at the MTV Europe Music Awards and won "Best Group." Then it was off to Sweden, Japan, Brazil, South Africa and Australia before landing in New York City. In Rio, 45,000 fans came out for an impromptu ten minute concert by the band and threw themselves in front of their bus as they arrived from the airport. At least ten people in Tokyo were injured when fans there tried the same thing. "It was crazy. You would have thought the President was here or Michael Jackson, not the Backstreet Boys," said band member Howie Dorough. Littrell confessed, "It was scary. I was worried

some of the fans were going to get seriously hurt." In Cape Town, a Cheetah interrupted their press conference. "It scared the hell out of me. But it was such a beautiful creature we couldn't stop ourselves from going over to say a quick hello," told Nick Carter.

All the fans that came out then and in the past were thanked by Richardson in the CD when he wrote, "To all the people that stood in line, slept in the rain and cold to see us in TRL or see our show or buy our records or just say hi." After all, the success of Black and Blue will depend on the fans. When Millennium was released, it broke all kinds of records

and sold 1.3 million copies in just the first week. They also have to deal with the imitation groups out there. "If we sat around when we were making the album and were worried about breaking somebody's sales

record, that wouldn't be the right state of mind. We're trying to make great music that we're proud of and if we break records that's just an added bonus," said Richardson. Dorough added, "This album, we're really proud of. I think this album, out of all the albums, probably represents us the best."

The album was recorded in Sweden, Los Angeles, Orlando, New Jersey and the Bahamas. Their vocals stand out on the ballads. On "How Did I Fall In Love With You," the music of a piano and strings is light. Dorough, who usually sings backup, was given lead vocals, along with Littrell. Dorough co-wrote the words to what is the most romantic track, and arranged the vocals and music. The song is about a guy realizing he loves a girl he's been friends with since childhood. He asks, "What can I do to make you mine? Falling so hard, so fast, this time. What did I say? What did you do? How did I fall in love with you?"

A more radio friendly ballad on the album is "Shape of My Heart," which went to the top of the charts as soon as it was released. So did the video, which was shot in blue tone. It focuses on lyrics like, "Hold me now, don't bother if every minute it makes me weaker. You can save me from the man I've become," which McLean, Littrell and Carter sing leads.

The music, not the band member's sex appeal, is the focus of Black and Blue. The CD cover doesn't have their pictures on it, just the title and vague shadows of the group. The music is also the focus of the upcoming tour. Unlike last year's tour, when the stage was in the round and the band sky-surfed to the stage, simplicity is the focus. "We're not really concerned about a look as to the way it sounds," said Littrell. They want to make sure a person sitting in the last row will be able to hear as well as a person sitting in the front row. They also want to keep the audience involved. The tour for Black and Blue will begin January 22 in Fort Lauderdale. They

will spend nine weeks in America. That includes East Rutherford, NJ. "We're going everywhere, all around the world," McLean said. They rehearse for a month in LA starting December 1.

Going back on the road is something Carter is looking forward to. "I miss the road. It's a great experience. A lot of energy, a lot of love." There are many high energy tracks from Black and Blue to anticipate seeing live. "Get Another Boyfriend," is one of them. McLean's raspy voice stands out, especially during his holler, which was made famous on "Everybody." The song is about a guy who's not worthy of his girlfriend. They warn her, "He's just another player, playing in the name of love."

Love is the subject of "Yes I Will," which McLean co-wrote. He shares the leads with Littrell, as they sing about wanting to share your life with someone you love. "Of all the things you've given to me, you're my heart, my soul, my everything," the song goes. The highlight is at the end of the song when Richardson is finally given somewhat of a lead. Maybe he isn't given stand out vocals, but he is writing them.

He wrote "Back to Your Heart," for Millennium, which would have quickly displaced any "boy band" comments if it was released as a single. For this album, he co-wrote "It's True." Fans became familiar with when it was released on a CD from Burger King. Littrell, McLean and Carter, the three strongest voices, sing leads as they ask for forgiveness. "Without you I would fall apart," is one lyric.

"This I Promise You (With Everything I Am)," features an orchestra. They sing, "I promise you as a lover and a friend, I will love you like I'll never love again."

All five members worked together on two songs. "The Answer to Our Life" is one of them. It's a softer dance track that Carter shares leads with McLean and Littrell. "This world is not at ease, we seem to hide the truth," they wrote, moving onto a subject other than love.

"Shining Star" was produced by Rodney Jerkins. Carter and Dorough co-wrote it. It's an upbeat, catchy tune with the lyric, "Angels everywhere, every time you're near."

"Everyone" is a more personal version of "Larger Than Life." It's an ode to everyone who has stood by the BSB. "They tried to pull us under but here we stand...We're standing stronger cause what you've done," explains it.

"Not For Me" has Carter's background vocals muffled in an experimental effect. It's got rhyme: "Cause if you think that's the way love should be, let me tell you it's not for me." Littrell and McLean sing lead.

"More Than That," is a soft ballad. The usual three sing lead as they to convince a girl not to say good-bye. Sample lyrics are, "Don't give loneliness a chance," and "I can't just be friends, knowing in the end, I will live you more than that."

One track on the album stands out. It's track nine, "Time." Babyface produced it and provided background vocals. He also played the keyboards and guitar, as well as the drum programming. All five members wrote the song. It's a diary of their existence as a group. They wrote about sharing dreams and getting to where they are now. It strolls down memory lane with, "There were days we used to sing at the drop of a dime." They say, "I know we've changed, but change can be so good. So let's not forget why it's understood. Time. Look where we are and what we've been through." That could refer to their split from their former manager, Lou Pearlman, and their move to Jive Records. Then they had to deal with their rivals, 'N Sync, doing the exact same thing. There's also the ABC TV series, Making the Band, Pearlman put together. Of that, Richardson says, "I try not to watch it. It kinda makes me nauseous. It's not how we came to be." Littrell agrees, "It's a total mockery of what we do for a living. The fans make us who we are and we continue to give back to them what they can give to us."

Orlando natives, the BSB have come a long way since they first formed in 1993. They joined Elton John on stage at the 42 Annual Grammy Awards, for his first performance on the show in 30 years. Afterwards, he said they were the best vocals he had ever sung with. With each album, they grow stronger. Maybe it comes from their personal traumas. Whatever it is, there's true passion in their voices and that's what makes them so enjoyable to listen to. The pictures included with this article are a look back at the BSB from their first concert in NYC, at the Hammerstein Ballroom, to McLean's solo tour as Johnny No Name for VH1's Save the Music and their most recent concert at the Continental Airlines Arena. As they wrote in "Time," "So here we are and you know we'll always stay together."

Gorillas: Going...Going...Gone?

The 1994 war in Rwanda (the most densely populated nation in Africa) left devastation. More than one million people were forced to resettle. They also needed more cropland, as well as timber for homes and cooking. This contributed to the number one threat against the area's mountain gorillas: habitat loss.

There are around 600 mountain gorillas in Central East Africa, all of which are endangered. Their territories spread throughout Rwanda, the Democratic Republic of Congo and Uganda. However, habitat destruction is not the only threat to the gorillas.

Poaching is also a problem. Gorillas are often caught in snares that are meant to capture other animals. For this reason, anti-poaching patrols have been organized. Guards cut down the snares and burn them. If animals are in the snares, they will be taken, whether they are dead or alive. This prevents poachers from profiting from them.

The Karisoke Research Center is dedicated to saving mountain gorillas. Work is done from the Virunga Conservation Area in Rwanda. The Dian Fossey Gorilla Fund International uses this site as a research base for scientists. Through educational programs, American students are offered opportunities to work along side the scientists. Together, they incorporate research findings and data joined



through field research.

The Fossey Fund is one of the largest private employers in Rwanda. It is also an important contributor to the local economy. It seeks to promote local development based on the conservation of Virunga's ecosystem, with the intent of minimizing impact on the gorillas. In the future, hopes are to expand conservation awareness in Rwandan schools.

"Our first goal is to use modern-day technology to bring new clout to field conservation, ecosystem management and endangered species protection," said Clare Richardson, president of the Atlanta based fund.

The fund combines geograph-

ic information and system data satellites with hyperspectral data from special area cameras and demographic information recorded on the ground. Combined, that tells how many gorillas an area can support. In addition, a baseline for future documentation is established.



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Animal Alert: Endangered in Kenya

The Grevy Zebra and the Black Rhino have made it to the year 2000, but all hopes of these species walking the earth during the next century are dim. Since 1990, Kenya has lost half of its wildlife from habitat destruction and conflict with the human population.

The Grevy Zebra is endangered everywhere in the wild, a result of competition with the plains zebra. The first wildlife conservancy in Kenya is the only reason why 400 of these animals are still alive. Located in central Kenya, The Lewa Wildlife Conservancy is

made up of 167 square kilometers of privately owned habitats. They include indigenous forest, savanna, grasslands and wetlands.

The Sweetwaters Black Rhino Reserve in Nanyuki, Kenya is a safe heaven for Black Rhinos. Over the past 30 years, poaching has caused the animal's population to drop from 20,000 to 400. Thanks to the reserve, the population has been brought up to 500. However, there are still problems facing these creatures. The reserve, which is 100 square kilometers, also acts as a sanctuary for giraffes and elephants. Both these species are a threat to rhinos.





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AIDS Facts

WHAT DOES "AIDS" MEAN?

AIDS stands for Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome:

- Acquired means you can catch it;
- Immune Deficiency means a weakness in the body's system that fights diseases.
- Syndrome means a group of health problems that make up a disease.

AIDS is caused by a virus called HIV: Human Immunodeficiency Virus. If you get infected with HIV, your body will try to fight the infection. It will make "antibodies", special molecules that are supposed to fight HIV.

When you get a blood test for HIV, the test is really looking for these antibodies. If you have them in your blood, it means that you have HIV infection. People who have the HIV antibodies are called "HIV-Positive".

Being HIV-positive, or having HIV disease, is not the same as having AIDS. Many people are HIV-positive but don't get sick for many years. As HIV disease continues, it slowly wears down the immune system. Viruses, parasites, fungi and bacteria that usually don't cause any problems can make you very sick if your immune system is damaged. These are called "opportunistic infections".

HOW DO YOU GET AIDS?

The blood, vaginal fluid, semen, and breast milk of people infected with HIV has enough of the virus in it to infect other people. You can get HIV from anyone who's infected, even if they don't look sick, even if they haven't tested positive (yet). Most people get the HIV virus by:

- Having sex with an infected person.
- Sharing a needle (shooting drugs) with someone who's infected
- Being born when the mother is infected, or drinking the breast milk of an infected woman.

Getting a transfusion of blood from an infected blood donor used to be a way people got AIDS, but now the blood supply is screened very carefully and the risk is extremely low.

There are no documented cases of HIV being transmitted by tears or saliva, but it is possible to catch HIV through oral sex, especially if you have open sores in your mouth or bleeding gums.

In the United States, there are about 1 million people who are HIV-positive. Each year, there are 50,000 new infections, including 2,500 infants. AIDS is now the leading cause of death for men between the ages of 25 and 44, and the fourth highest cause of death for women between 25 and 44.

WHAT HAPPENS IF I'M HIV

POSITIVE?

You might not know if you get infected by HIV. Some people get fever, headache, sore muscles and joints, stomach ache, swollen lymph glands, or a skin rash for one or two weeks. Most people think it's the flu. Some people have no symptoms.

The virus will multiply in your body for a few weeks or even months before your immune system responds. During this time, you won't test positive for HIV, but you can infect other people.

When your immune system responds, it starts to make antibodies. When you start making antibodies, you will test positive for HIV.

After the first flu-like symptoms, some people with HIV stay healthy for ten years or longer. But during this time, HIV is damaging your immune system.

One way to measure the damage to your immune system is to see how many CD4+

cells you have. These cells, also called "T-helper" cells, are an important part of the immune system. Healthy people have between 500 and 1,500 CD4+ cells in milliliter of blood.

As your CD4+ cell count goes down, you might start having signs of HIV disease like fevers, night sweats, diarrhea, or swollen lymph nodes. If you have HIV disease, these problems will last more than a few days, and probably continue for several weeks.

IS THERE A CURE FOR AIDS?

There is no cure for AIDS. There are drugs that can slow down the HIV virus, and slow down the damage to your immune system. But there is no way to get all the HIV out of your body. Some researchers think that the new, strong anti-HIV drugs might kill off all the HIV if you can take them for several years, but it hasn't happened yet.

There are other drugs that you can take to prevent or to treat some of the opportunistic infections. In some cases, these drugs work very well. With other infections, there is still very little that doctors can do.

WHAT IS HIV TESTING?

HIV testing usually means the tests that determine whether or not you are infected with the Human

Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV) which causes AIDS. These tests look for "antibodies" to HIV. Antibodies are proteins produced by the immune system to fight a specific germ.

Other "HIV" tests are used when people already know that they are infected with HIV. These help measure how quickly the virus is multiplying (a viral load test) or the health of your immune system (a T-cell test).

infected with HIV. Continue to protect yourself from HIV infection.

HOW ACCURATE ARE THE TESTS?

Test results for HIV are accurate more than 99.5% of the time. Before you get the results, the test has usually been done two or more times. The first test uses enzymes to test for HIV antibodies. This test is called an "EIA" or "ELISA" test. The first versions of these tests were slow, and often gave false positive results. The newer versions are faster and more accurate.

Before a positive ELISA test result is reported, it is confirmed by another test called a "Western Blot". However, two special cases can lead to false results:

Children born to HIV-positive mothers may have false positive test results. This is because mothers pass on their infection-fighting antibodies to their newborn children. Even if the children are not infected with HIV, they have HIV antibodies and will test positive. Other tests, such as a viral load test, must be used.

People who were recently infected may have a false negative

result. It takes at least three weeks, and possibly as long as three months, to produce antibodies to HIV. You should wait for three months after you were exposed to HIV before being tested, or test right away and then again when three months have gone by. During this "window period" you can transmit the virus to others if you are infected.

THE BOTTOM LINE

HIV testing looks for antibodies in the blood, or saliva or urine. The immune system produces these antibodies to fight HIV, but it can take up to three months for them to show up. During this "window period" you will not test positive for HIV even if you are infected. Normal HIV tests don't work for children born to HIV-infected mothers.

A positive test result does not mean that you have AIDS. If you test positive, you should learn more about HIV and decide how to take care of your health.

The Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV) is not spread easily. You can only get HIV if you get infected blood or sexual fluids into your system. You can't get it from mosquito bites, coughing or sneezing, sharing household items, or swimming in the same pool as someone with HIV.

Some people talk about "shared

body fluids" being risky for HIV, but no documented cases of HIV have been caused by sweat, saliva or tears. However, even small amounts of blood in your mouth might transmit HIV during kissing or oral sex. Blood can come from flossing your teeth, or from sores caused by gum disease, or by eating very hot or sharp, pointed food.

To infect someone, the virus has to get past the body's defenses. These include skin and saliva. If your skin is not cut, it protects you against infection from blood or sexual fluids. Saliva contains chemicals that can help kill HIV in your mouth.

If HIV-infected blood or sexual fluid gets inside your body, you can get infected. This can happen through an open sore or wound, during sexual activity, or if you share equipment to inject drugs.

HIV can also be spread from a mother to her infant during pregnancy or delivery. This is called "vertical transmission." A baby can also be infected by drinking an infected woman's breast milk.

HOW CAN YOU PROTECT YOURSELF AND OTHERS?

Unless you are absolutely certain that you and the people you are with do not have HIV infection, you should take steps to prevent getting infected. This fact sheet provides an overview of HIV prevention, and refers you to other fact sheets for more details on specific topics.

Sexual Activity: You can avoid any risk of HIV if you practice abstinence (not having sex). You also won't get infected if your penis, mouth, vagina or rectum don't touch anyone else's penis, mouth, vagina, or rectum. Safe activities include kissing, erotic massage, masturbation or hand jobs (mutual masturbation).

Having sex in a monogamous (faithful) relationship is safe if:


- Both of you are uninfected (HIV-negative)
- You both have sex only with your partner
- Neither one of you gets exposed to HIV through drug use or other activities

Oral sex is very low risk if there are no open sores or blood in the mouth. Anal and vaginal sex are much more risky.

You can reduce the risk of infection with HIV and other sexually transmitted diseases by using barriers like condoms. Traditional condoms go on the penis, and a new type of condom goes in the vagina or in the rectum.

Some chemicals called spermicides can prevent pregnancy but they don't prevent HIV. They might even increase your risk of getting infected if they cause irritation or swelling.

TO YOUR GOOD HEALTH

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: My 28-year-old granddaughter was diagnosed at age 7 with neurofibromatosis. Through the years, she has suffered the growth of small and large tumors

all over her body. Twenty-one years is a long span of time, and I wonder if any new treatments have evolved. I am so anxious for her welfare. -- R.S.

ANSWER: Neurofibromatosis (NEW-row-fy-BRO-muh-TOE-suss) is a genetic disorder that strikes about one person in every 3,000. If you consider the population of North America, that makes for a sizable number of people.

Neurofibromas vary from small to large cauliflowerlike growths of nerves and fibrous tissue that sprout on the skin. They can also develop deep within the body and create problems by pressing on adjacent organs.

Usually neurofibromas make their appearance around puberty. Before that age, spots the color of coffee with cream appear on the skin. Youngsters with the neurofibromatosis gene have six or more such spots that measure about a quarter of an inch (0.5 cm). After puberty, the spots enlarge to three-quarters of an inch (1.5 cm), and neurofibromas appear.

Painful neurofibromas can be removed. Some people, however, have so many that removal is a daunting task, and often those people leave them alone. The above description is neurofibromatosis type 1, also called Von Recklinghausen's disease. The type 2 variety affects the hearing nerve.

There has been no breakthrough treatment, but there is a breakthrough support group,

the National Neurofibromatosis Foundation. Your granddaughter will benefit by contacting the foundation for information on the illness and on new treatments. The foundation's phone number is: (800) 323-7938. For those with access to a computer, check the foundation's Web site: www.nf.org.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: My mother, 82, has a very bad case of Alzheimer's disease. I am sad for her and fearful for myself. Am I genetically destined to come down with it, too? -- G.K.

ANSWER: Heredity plays a major role in "early onset" Alzheimer's disease -- Alzheimer's that makes its appearance before age 60. Only a small number of patients have this kind of Alzheimer's disease.

Genes also influence the more common kind of Alzheimer's disease, but their contribution to the illness is not so obvious and is less well-understood. Because your mother has Alzheimer's, you are not doomed to the same fate, by a long shot.

In ordinary Alzheimer's, the APOE-4 gene has attracted attention as a possible factor in this variety of the disease. That information is shaky, and no one advocates testing people for the gene to make predictions for the future.

Perhaps the Alzheimer's report can help you come to grips with this sad illness. I am sending you a copy. THE PAINFUL TRUTH: Migraines Sideline Millions of Americans New Treatment Option Available to Prevent Migraine Headaches

The two main categories of treatment include acute medications, which are taken after the onset of a migraine; and preventive medications, which are taken daily to prevent migraines. Selection of an appropriate drug treatment is dependent upon the number and severity of headaches, the patient's physical condition, and his or her responsiveness to a particular

medication.

Migraine sufferers who find that their headaches are interfering with their daily activities now can choose the convenience of a new, once-daily treatment option to prevent migraines.





AIDS Facts *continued*

Drug Use: If you're high on drugs, you might forget to use protection during sex. If you use someone else's equipment (needles, syringes, cookers, cotton or rinse water) you can get infected by tiny amounts of blood. The best way to avoid infection is to not use drugs.

If you use drugs, you can prevent infection by not injecting them. If you do inject, don't share equipment. If you must share, clean equipment with bleach and water before every use.

Some communities have started exchange programs that give free, clean syringes to people so they won't need to share.

Vertical Transmission: With no treatment, about 25% of the babies of HIV-infected women would be born infected. The risk drops to about 8% if a woman takes AZT during pregnancy and delivery, and then her newborn is given AZT. The risk is higher if labor lasts for a long time. An operation to remove a newborn surgically (a "C-section" or Caesarian section) can reduce the risk of infection if the labor goes on too long.

Babies can get infected if they drink breast milk from an HIV-infected woman. Women with HIV should use baby formulas or breast milk from a woman who is not infected to feed their babies.

Contact with Blood: HIV is one of many diseases that can be transmitted by blood. Be careful if you are helping someone who is bleeding. If your work exposes you to blood, be sure to protect any cuts or open sores on your skin, as well as your eyes and mouth. Your employer should provide gloves, facemasks and other protective equipment, plus training about how to avoid diseases that are spread by blood.

WHAT IF I'VE BEEN EXPOSED?

If you think you have been exposed to HIV, talk to your health care provider or the public health department, and get tested.

If you are sure that you have been exposed, call your doctor to discuss whether you should immediately start taking anti-HIV drugs. This is called "post exposure prophylaxis" or PEP. You would take two or three medications for several weeks. These drugs can decrease the risk of infection, but they have some serious side effects.

THE BOTTOM LINE

HIV does not spread easily from person to person. To catch HIV, infected blood, sexual fluid, or mother's milk has to get into your

body. HIV-infected pregnant women can pass the infection to their new babies.

To decrease the risk of spreading HIV:

- Use condoms during sexual activity
- Do not share drug injection equipment
- If you are HIV-infected and pregnant, talk with your doctor about taking anti-HIV drugs
- If you are an HIV-infected woman, don't breast feed any baby
- Protect cuts, open sores, and your eyes and your mouth from contact with blood.

If you think you've been exposed to HIV, get tested and ask your doctor about taking anti-HIV medications.

HOW DOES HIV SPREAD DURING SEX?

To spread HIV during sex, HIV infection in blood or sexual fluids must be transmitted to someone. Sexual fluids come from a man's penis or from a woman's vagina, either before, during, or after orgasm. HIV can be transmitted when infected fluid gets into someone's body.

You can't spread HIV if there is no HIV infection. If you and your partners are not infected with HIV, there is no risk. If there is no contact with blood or sexual fluids, there is no risk. HIV needs to get into the body for infection to occur.

Safer sex guidelines are ways to reduce the risk of spreading HIV during sexual activity.

HOW RISKY IS IT?

Safe activities have no risk for spreading HIV. Abstinence (never having sex) is totally safe. Sex with just one partner is safe as long as neither one of you is infected and if neither one of you ever has sex with anyone else.

Fantasy, masturbation or hand jobs (where you keep your fluids to yourself), sexy talk, and non-sexual massage are also safe. These activities avoid contact with blood or sexual fluids, so there is no risk of transmitting HIV.

To be safe, assume that your sex partners are infected with HIV. You can't tell if people are infected by how they look. They could be lying if they tell you they are not

infected, especially if they want to have sex with you. Some people got HIV from their steady partners who were unfaithful "just once".

Even people who got a negative test result might be infected. They might have been infected after they got tested, or they might have gotten the test too soon after they were exposed to HIV. Fact Sheet 102 has more information on HIV testing.

Unsafe Activities: Unsafe

Sex has a high risk of spreading HIV. The greatest risk is when blood or sexual fluid touches the soft, moist areas (mucous membrane) inside the rectum, vagina, mouth, nose, or at the tip of the penis. These can be damaged easily, which gives HIV a way to get into the body.

Vaginal or rectal intercourse without protection is very unsafe. Sexual fluids enter the body, and wherever a man's penis is inserted, it can cause small tears that make HIV infection more likely. The receptive partner is more likely to be infected, although HIV might be able to enter the penis, especially if it has contact with HIV-infected blood or vaginal fluids for a long time or if it has any open sores.

Safer Activities: Most sexual activity carries some risk of spreading HIV. To reduce the risk, make it more difficult for blood or sexual fluid to get into your body.

Be aware of your body and your partner's. Cuts, sores, or bleeding gums increase the risk of spreading HIV. Rough physical activity also increases the risk. Even small injuries give HIV a way to get into the body.

Use a barrier to prevent contact with blood or sexual fluid. Remember that the body's natural barrier is the skin. If you don't have any cuts or sores, your skin will protect you against infection. However, HIV can get into the body through mucous membranes.

The most common artificial barrier is a condom

for men. You can also use male condom to protect the vagina or rectum during intercourse

Lubricants can increase sexual stimulation. They also reduce the chance that condoms or other barriers will break. Oil-based lubricants like Vaseline, oils, ointments can damage condoms and other latex barriers. Be sure to use water-based lubricants.

SET YOUR LIMITS

Decide how much risk you are willing to take. Know how much protection you want to use during different kinds of sexual activities. Before you have sex,

- think about safer sex
- set your limits
- get a supply of lubricant and condoms or other barriers, and be sure they are easy to find when you need them
- talk to your partners so they know your limits.

Stick to your limits. Don't let alcohol, drugs or an attractive partner make you forget to protect yourself.

THE BOTTOM LINE

HIV infection can occur during sexual activity. Sex is safe only if there is no HIV, no blood or sexual fluids, or no way for HIV to get into the body.

You can reduce the risk of infection if you avoid unsafe activities or if you use barriers like condoms. Decide on your limits and stick to them.




Oral sex has some risk of transmitting HIV, especially if sexual fluids get in the mouth and there are bleeding gums or sores in the mouth. Pieces of latex or elastic wrap over the vagina, or condoms over the penis, can be used as barriers during oral sex. Condoms without lubricants are best for oral sex. Most lubricants taste awful.

WHAT IF BOTH PEOPLE ARE ALREADY INFECTED?

Some people who are HIV-infected don't see the need to follow safer sex guidelines when they

design a research study to find out for sure.


