

Today in North Africa there is a man from Paterson State who is in great danger. As a navigator of a fiying fortress he has been in many perilous engagements. Although he is many years older than most of the men at Paterson State, he writes frequently about his return to the States and the time he will come back to our college to finish the work for his degree. He may be living on borrowed time, but he has learned to live each day the lesson found in "Julius Caesar": "Cowards die many times before their death; the valiant never taste of death but once. Of all the wonders that I yet have heard, it seems most strange to me that men must fear, seeing that death, a necessary end, will come when it will come."


Letters from other men in service reveal the courage and confidence of pioneers. To some of you it may appear that there are no great opportunities today, but I affirm that breath-taking opportunities exist for pioneering in the field of human relations. What a challenge to you young women and young men who have accepted the responsibility of teaching.
