William Paterson Becomes a University Historic Vote Sets Stage for 21st Century

It was affirmed at 11:05 am, Friday, June 27. The Commission on Higher Education voted to officially designate William Paterson College as The William Paterson University of New Jersey.

"We are now positioned to pursue our destiny as a dynamic center of educational excellence," declared University President Arnold Speert,

Gov. Whitman Delivers Commencement Address

Governor Christine Todd Whitman, New Jersey's first woman chief executive, arrived early commencement morning, May 12, a beautiful spring day, and made her way, surrounded by William Paterson officials and security police, into the Student Center, stopping often to smile and shake hands with arriving graduates and their families who clustered around her.

Two hours later, standing behind the speaker's podium on Wightman Field, she addressed the 860 graduates and the 6,000 family members, friends and visitors who had come to celebrate their achievements. A low-key demonstration planned by members of the campus Green Party Organization protesting the state's funding of higher education had turned the festive occasion into a media event and reporters and television camera

who termed the university a "vital resource for the state, the region and the nation."

Addressing the commissioners, media, and large crowd which filled the meeting room in Winants Hall at Rutgers University in New Brunswick, Speert paid tribute to the university's faculty and trustees. "I am proud of the strength and vigor the faculty has given to student success and the development of our programs," he said. "The trustees have given leadership in building an institution that is strong and fiscally conservative but experimental in academic programs."

Introducing U.S. Representative Bill Pascrell, former mayor of Paterson and former New Jersey Assemblyman, Speert pointed out "the fact that Representative Pascrell is here today epitomizes the university's dedication to our region."

"This is a great day for William Paterson and higher education in New Jersey," said Pascrell. "You have served our community and the state at the highest level."

In Washington, U.S. Senator Robert Torricelli issued a special statement: "The greatest tool we can provide our young people with is the very best education possible. I am certain William Paterson University will continue its fine tradition of academic excellence and continue to equip today's students for the challenging world of the 21st century with the best of training, instruction, and academic resources."

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Focus on William Paterson's Own Graduates


Patricia Williams, principal clerk stenographer in the office of affirmative action, traveled a long road to commencement. When she received her bachelor's degree in communication on May 12, it was the culmination of 14 years of juggling family, work and classes. An employee since 1980, she says that what kept her motivated was "a purpose and a vision and a commitment not only to

She plans to continue her education, has been accepted into the master's program at Rutgers University, and hopes to eventually use her education to help people, specifically in Paterson, where she was born and raised. One of nine children, she is the first to graduate from college. With her at commencement are Tyray and fiancé Bari Asante.

Jeffrey Jones, director of SCOPE (Schools and Communities Organized to Promote Education), a three-year federal grant awarded to William Paterson for work in Paterson's First Ward, received a master's degree in urban education on May 12. Jones, who worked in the admissions office, believes in helping people, and has served the city of Paterson as councilman since May of 1996. He received a bachelor's degree in criminal justice and sociology from William Paterson in 1985. Jones worked at IBM for

University Day Set for September 2



William Paterson will celebrate its new status as a university on Tuesday, September 2, the first day of the fall semester, with University Day, featuring a full slate of activities designed to highlight the institution's many strengths and successes. Classes will be cancelled for the day, which will become an annual tradition.

The event will kick off with an address by President Arnold Speert at 8:30 am in Science 200A. At 11 am, the Class of 2001 will be formally welcomed into the academic community during the annual Freshman Convocation in Shea Center.

Other activities will include "Point of View: Economics and Politics of the 21st Century," an opportunity for faculty and staff to air their opinions soap box-style; demonstrations of the "smart classroom" in the Atrium; musical and theatrical performances; events for children including a petting zoo, pony rides, and face painting; and an evening laser light show in Shea Center. Refreshments will be available. At 5 pm, everyone will gather on the lawn in front of the Student Center for a brief ceremony and birthday cake to celebrate the institution's new status.

will be working closely with the Faculty Senate general education committee, headed by Barbara Sandberg, professor of communication; and the Senate assessment committee, chaired by

Robert Kloss, professor of English.

"I am excited about serving as director of general education," said Wahrman, "because I see many unique features and strengths in the program, as well as areas where the program can be improved and made more effective."

Wahrman says that the William Paterson community will be encouraged to participate fully in the process of improving GE. Wahrman has developed and revised many courses at all levels, and is in the process of planning a general education cluster course for fall, 1997, together with Peter Stein, professor of sociology and Rochelle Kaplan, professor of curriculum and instruction.



Wayne Chamber Orchestra Season Features Outstanding Soloists

Lyric soprano Vicki Fisk, internationally acclaimed pianist Gary Kirkpatrick, virtuoso violinist Chin Kim and award-winning ballroom dancers Angela Aguirre and Meyer Kaplan will be featured during the Wayne Chamber Orchestra's 1997-98 concert season, its twelfth in residence at William Paterson.

The ensemble's four-concert season, under the baton of conductor Murray Colosimo, begins on Friday, October 17 as the lyric coloratura soprano Vicki Fisk joins the orchestra for Prokofiev's "The Ugly Duckling." Also featured will be Tchaikovsky's "Swan Lake Suite," as well as music by Respighi, Griffes and Mozart.

Gary Kirkpatrick, the William Paterson professor of music who has performed throughout the world, shines as soloist on Friday, December 5 when the orchestra performs "Fantasy Variations on a Theme of Youth" by American composer Howard Hanson. Works by Still, Sibelius, Tchaikovsky and Vaughan

Williams round out the program.

The season continues on Friday, February 27 with virtuoso violinist Chin Kim, who will solo on Samuel Barber's Concerto for Violin. In a first for the orchestra, the winner of a new Young Artist Competition sponsored by the ensemble will join Kim for Bach's Concerto for Two Violins. Pieces by Chabrier and Harbison complete the concert.

Ballroom dancers Angela Aguirre and Meyer Kaplan, both William Paterson professors, trade their chalk and erasers for dancing shoes as they tango and rumba in front of the orchestra in the season finale on April 24. The program will include music by Strauss, Copland, Piazzolla and Benjamin.

people added to the excitement of the day.

After receiving an honorary doctor of laws degree from President Arnold Speert, Whitman told the graduates to "always look at both sides of an issue and know there is still more that you don't see beyond what you read in the paper."

On a more personal note, she urged the graduates not to confuse the information superhighway with the road to enlightenment. "Just because you can reach someone on the other side of the globe doesn't mean you're excused from reaching out to those in closer proximity — your family, your neighbors, your classmates, your coworkers, or the person in trouble next to you.

"Only by bridging the gap between us will we make this world a better place. The Internet may help you snare unlimited data from around the world, but don't forget to catch up with those right in your own backyard," she said.

In addition to Whitman, honorary degrees were awarded to Senator John H. Ewing (NJ-Republican, 16th district), chair of the Senate Education Committee and chairman of the Joint Committee on Public Schools, who received an honorary doctor of laws degree for his 29 years of service in public office and commitment to education, and to David H. Cheng, a member of the Board of Trustees since 1990, who received an honorary doctor of humane letters degree for his service to the institution.

President Arnold Speert addressed the graduating class along with Senior Class President Anne Li, who delivered the statement for the class of 1997. A reception for the graduates was held in the Student Center Ballroom following the commencement exercises.

BOARD NOTES

The Board of Trustees held public meetings on April 5, 1997 and May 17, 1997 in the Board Room, College Hall.

At the April meeting, the trustees approved the conferring of degrees at the May commencement and the implementation of a four-day work week, where appropriate, for the period May 12 through August 29. Emeritus status was granted to Hugh Aitken, professor of music, "for his years of dedicated service to William Paterson."

Bid waivers were authorized for the college to enter into an agreement with the marketing firm of Art and Science Group, Inc. which conducted an external survey, analyzed the results and presented a recommendation for the appropriate name for William Paterson College "which reflected the significance of attaining university status." Waivers were also approved to retain the firm of Edgewater Design Associates for professional design services related to reconstruction of the football field and track and site improvements and landscaping in the area of Lots 3, 4 and the Atrium.

Laboratory fees of \$30 per semester were approved for four additional courses: Nursing 600, 604, 700 and 701. An administrative fee of \$10 per credit for the delivery of all off-campus Extended Learning Continuing Education courses was established. The Continuing Education non-credit withdrawal/refund policy was revised effective May 1, 1997. The new policy calls for a 100% refund less a \$30 administrative fee prior to the start of a program, no refund for any course of two or fewer sessions after the start of any course, a 50% or \$30 (whichever is greater) penalty if the request for withdrawal is received before the start of the second session, and no refund after the start of the second session for a course of three or more sessions.

At the May meeting, emeritus status was granted to Suzanne Hawes, professor of community health; Virginia Mollenkott, professor of English; and Joan Tuohy, professor of educational leadership.

The Board accepted the report of two independent consultants who conducted an on-site review and filed a report recommending university designation. The petition for university status was sent to the New Jersey Commission on Higher Education for its review and approval. The board approved an institutional name change from The William Paterson College of New Jersey to The William Paterson University of New Jersey, contingent on Commission approval granting William Paterson College university designation.

The trustees approved a contract with the firm of Syska and Hennessey for professional services related to design of a fire alarm system for the Towers Residence Hall, and with AT&T College and University Systems for the provision of administrative software and services related to resident student telephone service. A bid waiver was approved for design services relating to the renovation of 25 Power Avenue, Wayne, by the firm of Ronald Schmidt Associates.
