Hobart, the twenty-fourth Vice President of the United States, was held here this afternoon at Ailsa Farms, the home of her son, Passaic County Park Commissioner, Garret A. Hobart Jr. Mrs. Hobart died on Wednesday at the age of 91.

The brief rites were conducted by the Rev. Robert R. Bryan, pastor of the Church of the Messiah, Paterson. Among those attending the service besides members of the family were Vice Chancellor and Mrs. James F. Fielder of Montclair, N. J.; Representative Donald McLean of Elizabeth and United States Senator Wallace H. White of Auburn, Me.
