This increase which the students are asking for will add a little more than \$2,000.00 per year to the student budget to be spent on the spending agencies of this school. These spending agencies are: Women's Athletic Association, Men's Athletic Association, BEACON, Fencing Team, Cheerleaders, S.G.A. Social Committee, Assembly Committee, Masque and Masquers.

This increase in spending money will, if adopted, do much for the BEACON. At present we are publishing one issue a month, composed of four pages, and printing an average of five pietures per issue. With the extra money we will be able to increase the number of pietures in each issue, add some extra pages throughout the year, and print one or two extra issues each year.

Thank you for expressing your desire to increase the student fees in order to better and to increase the student activities at State. We of the BEACON especially thank you and want you to feel assured that if this increase comes into being we will do our best to increase and further, for your enjoyment and enlightment, this publication.
