This increase which the students are asking for will add a little more than \$2,000.00 per year to the student budget to be spent on the spending agencies of this school. These spending agencies are: Women's Athletic Association, Men's Athletic Association, BEACON, Fencing Team, Cheerleaders, S.G.A. Social Committee, Assembly Committee, Masque and Masquers.

This increase in spending money will, if adopted, do much for the BEACON. At present we are publishing one issue a month, composed of four pages, and printing an average of five pictures per issue. With the extra money we will be able to increase the number of pictures in each issue, add some extra pages throughout the year, and print one or two extra issues each year.

Thank you for expressing your desire to increase the student fees in order to better and to increase the student activities at State. We of the BEACON especially thank you and want you to feel assured that if this increase comes into being we will do our best to increase and further, for your enjoyment and enlightenment, this publication.

The other matters, such as the budget and the planning of the rest of the social calendar will be taken care of at the remaining SGA meetings.

It was surprising to learn that only a slight majority of the student body was in favor of raising the student fee. In order to raise our budget allowance, we must raise our student fee. Our SGA fee is the lowest of all six same teacher colleges in New Jersey, and the increase that has been approved by the student council will add greatly to the budget allowance for each organization on campus. The fact that there were quite a few opposed to the idea only indicates that "quite" a few students just "take-off" at 2:00 P.M., Tuesdays and Thursdays and do not participate in club or even class activities. Is this the college spirit we have at Paterson? Let's hope not. It is only natural to conclude that if you do not belong to any club you really don't care what the financial situation is, and it is only natural that you would be opposed to paying a higher fee. If more people would join in the activities here at State they would better be able to appreciate the financial situation.

In conclusion, your SGA sincerely hopes that you will not let these college years go by without participating in activities that will benefit you socially, as well as educationally.

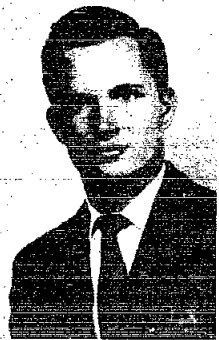

Students Asked To Consider Increase For Paid Up Alumni Membership

The Student Government Association is being asked to consider a \$1.00 increase per semester in the Student Government Association fee for the purpose of providing everyone with a paid-up membership in the Paterson State Teachers College Alumni Association.

Before the Student Government Association makes a decision on this request, the following information should be carefully considered:

1. The Alumni Association exists solely for the purpose of helping its Alma Mater. There is no other reason for its existence.

2. The Alumni Association is an integral part of the college community. You are active members of the student body and Student Government Association for four years, after which you become an alumnus for the rest of your life.

3. Large numbers of school teachers and administrators in this area are graduates of Paterson State Teachers College. Through an active Alumni Association you can avail yourself of the placement and advancement opportunities afforded by close contact within such an organization.

4. An active Alumni Association brings added prestige and recognition to the college. This prestige and recognition is an advantage which the entire student body also enjoys.

Now you may say, "This is all very theoretical, but just what has our Alumni Association accomplished?"

Let's look at the record:

1. The record shows that our Alumni Association responded in giving support to the move to obtain this beautiful campus.

2. Of the \$2,600 which was collected for the purchase of our carillon, the Alumni Association gave \$1,600. The Alumni Association did not say "Our members are no longer students. We won't hear the carillon very often. Let's forget about it."

3. The Alumni Association

joined with the student body, faculty and other friends of the college in raising funds, organizing speakers bureaus, distributing printed materials, and calling upon people to vote at the polls in support of the \$15,000,000 bond issue for the State Teachers College. It is significant to note the Passaic County passed the bond issue by an overwhelming majority.

4. The Alumni Association helped and supported the move to bring a graduate program to Paterson State Teachers College.

It is good business to increase the Student Government Association fee in order to provide ten-year paid membership into the Alumni Association. The same membership would cost \$10 if it were paid at the rate of \$1.00 per year. Secondly, the Alumni Association can spend every penny of it for worthwhile projects rather than spend several hundred dollars each year in an attempt to collect through the mails.

The collection of dues is the number one problem of most Alumni Associations. Experience shows that Associations which are meeting with success have adopted a variation of the plan which you are now considering. The final decision must, of course, rest with you. By an adoption of this plan, you will be investing in your future as an alumnus of Paterson State Teachers College and the future of your cherished college.

Bill Flynn, my catcher did most of the bunting. . . He bunts just about all the time . . . nice bunter.

Y. R. Coach, you mentioned that pitching was one of your main assets. Who did you have?

Female Fencers Triumph In 9 Matches To Place Second In 27th Annual Tourney

Paterson State's women's fencing team culminated its fine season of intercollegiate competition in the 27th Annual Intercollegiate Women's Fencing Championships held recently at Fairleigh Dickinson College. The team, Jane Dardia, Jean Moreck, and Joan Ulrickson, defeated the finest teams in the area and placed second with 9 wins out of 10 matches, losing only to the Rochester Institute of Technology team which took first place with 10 wins and no losses.
