### Dr. Shea, GSTC Alumnus Of '58

President of Paterson State Teschers College, Dr. Marion E. Shea, received the outstanding Alumnus of 1958 award from her Alma Mater, Glassboro State Teachers College. Dr. Shea was graduated from Glassboro State Normal School in the class of "24" and received her bachelor and master's degree from New York University.

Dr. Shes has done some advanced work in education at the University of Pennsylvania and Ratgers University. Appointed to the presidency of Paterson State in September of 1954, Dr. Shea has the distinction of being the first woman to head a state college in New Jersey.
