Dr. Shea, GSTC Alumnus Of '58

President of Paterson State Teachers College, Dr. Marion E. Shea, received the outstanding Alumnus of 1958 award from her Alma Mater, Glassboro State Teachers College. Dr. Shea was graduated from Glassboro State Normal School in the class of '24' and received her bachelor and master's degree from New York University.

Dr. Shea has done some advanced work in education at the University of Pennsylvania and Rutgers University. Appointed to the presidency of Paterson State in September of 1954, Dr. Shea has the distinction of being the first woman to head a state college in New Jersey.

Welcomes New President, Dr. Marion Shea Assumes Presidency"; Freshman Registration Tops Record, Total Class of 1958 Numbers 161; "The largest fall semester freshman class is going through what the sophomores hope to be the hardest two weeks of their lives."
