

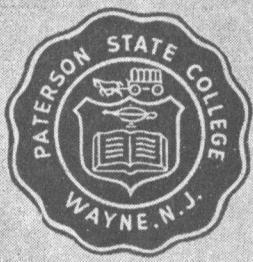

ART SUPERVISOR MUNNO ADDRESSES ART STUDENTS

Mr. Stephen J. Munno, Art Supervisor at Rutherford High School, recently addressed a group of 50 art students at Paterson State College on the subject of "Cubism." Mr. Munno brings to his understanding of this specialized subject a background of study at the New York School of Industrial Arts, at the Art Students League, the Ecole des Beaux-Arts and Ossip Zadkine's School in Paris, and study at New York University, The New School, and the Gilbea School in New York.

Mr. Munno told the students that at the turn of the century, painters began to reexamine the nature of art, and to experiment with the recording of a natural object on a flat-two-dimensional surface like a canvas, in a new way. He commented on the relation existing between Realism and Cubism in painting, showing that they are not as far apart as a superficial understanding would indicate.

AMERICAN CHILDHOOD EDUCATION ASSOCIATION

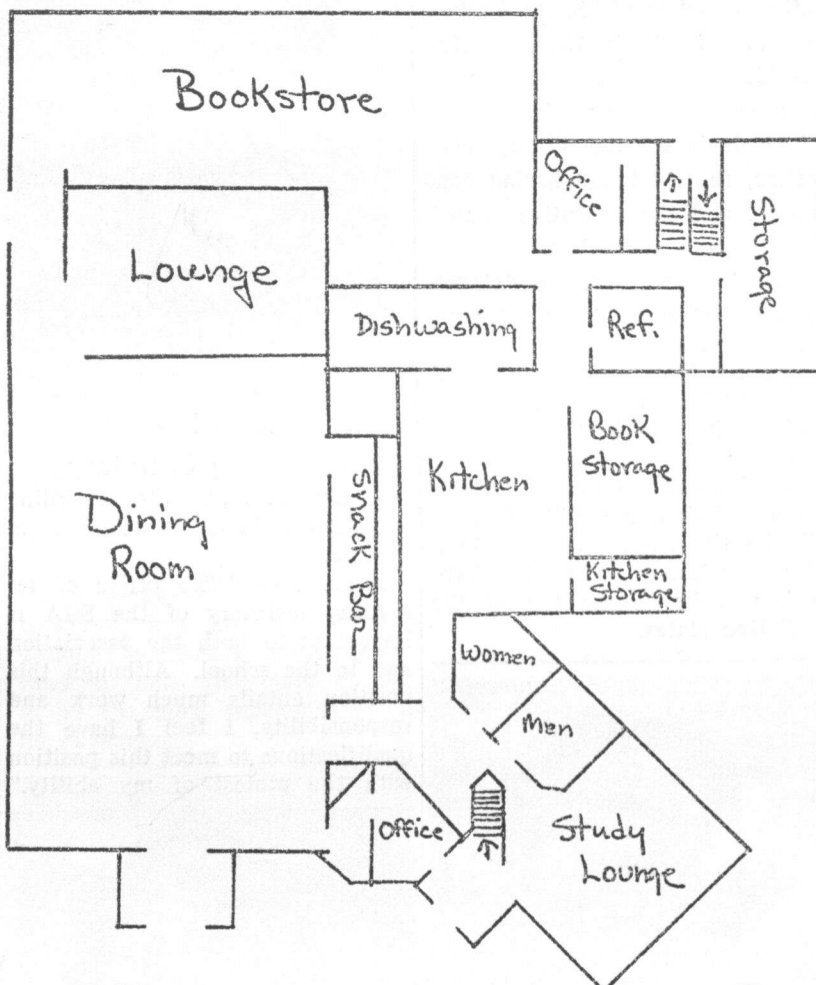

From College Carnival To College Center



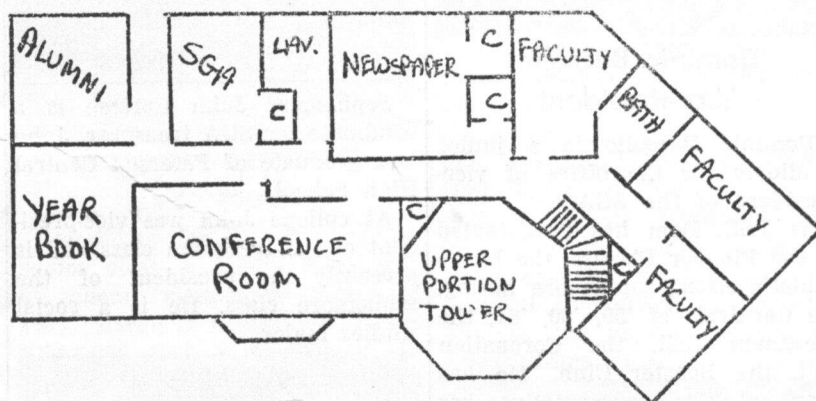
This is the year! Early this fall the College Center—re-modeled from the present Cafeteria — will be a reality.

The \$4000 profits from PSC Carnivals since 1957 have been put into a fund to help furnish this building. In fact, raising enough money to provide the Center with facilities has been the goal of these annual affairs since their inception.

Major remodeling jobs for the Center will be paid for by State monies. In other words, knocking down walls and putting up new ones, painting, and many basic furnishings will not be the students' responsibilities; however, those comforts which will make the Center more than just four walls and some tables and chairs will have to come from student or other sources.

\$4000 sounds like a good sum of money, but in these times, it will not go far towards adequate furnishings for a building. Therefore, chairman Peter Chabora urges that every student support this year's Carnival in some capacity — either as a worker or a contributor — in a final effort to have a respectable sum of money to work with in September.

Chabora stated, "If we all work, we can really make our College Center a place we can be proud of and enjoy. One of the things we can work for is a hi-fi or stereophonic music system. Student participation, however, cannot be stressed too highly, for without it, we will not reach our goal."

Notes On Curriculum Changes

1. Juniors or seniors making any changes in their curriculum must notify the office of Student Teaching immediately after any changes have been made by the registrar. Since all of the assignments are made this spring for next year's student teaching and practicum, it is impossible to can-

cel or change such assignments once they are made for the school district.

2. Dr. Henderson has emphasized that no changes will be made in curriculum after the deadline date set by the registrar. This date is May 15.

3. More than 700 Juniors and Seniors will be assigned for Junior Practicum and Student Teaching for the coming year, 1961-1962.

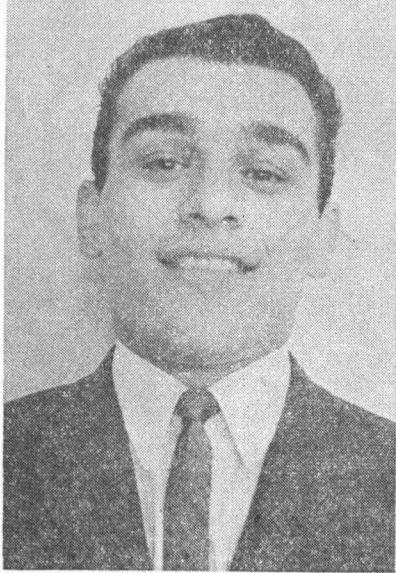


Kenneth Dow

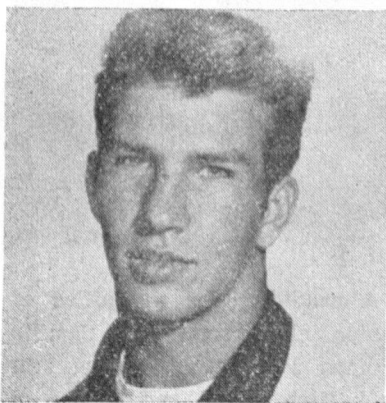

Letter To The Editor Don't Deny Equal Rights

Seeing how rapidly the cafeteria is being completed, one can take only a wild guess as to when PSC will ever have a third and much needed parking lot. This presents the problem of how to choose who may and who may not have the privilege of parking in whatever parking space is available for the college year 1961-1962. To give everyone equal rights, those students who were not allowed the privilege of parking on campus this year because they live in one of the twenty-one "selected" towns should be allowed to park on campus next year and twenty-one new towns should be selected thus allowing those students the privilege of parking off campus.

Everyone should be given the opportunity to pay two or three dollars a week to park in the many nearby places who are all too willing to take a student's money to allow him to park within at least one-half mile from the main building on the campus. Everyone should have the opportunity of walking one-half to one mile from his parked car while carrying heavy textbooks, art projects, gym uniforms, etc., while it is either raining, sleeting, snowing, or in sub-freezing weather, or in the darkness if he happens to have 5:30 classes. Beside this, he must, at the same time, dodge holes in the road, Sam Braen trucks, school busses equipped with water pistols, ditches, construction, cars with drivers who speed through puddles at 30 to 40 m.p.h., and the normal flow of traffic.

Why should the same group have these privileges again next year? Let others share in this rewarding experience. The students from the newly selected towns can park their cars at nearby businesses as the students from the present "selected" towns are doing this year. The bus situation is meaningless — some of the present "selected" towns have higher bus fares and require more busses to get to PSC than do many present unselected towns.

Why should the same group have to pay from sixty-six to ninety-nine dollars for 33 weeks parking again next year? Give others their right to pay a semester's tuition just for the privilege of parking their cars near the campus. Let those who are constantly complaining about the lighting in the parking lots, the long walk from the second parking lot to class, and the condition of the parking lots have the privilege of parking off campus next year.

Is it right to deprive them of their right to park off campus? Is it right to deprive the others of their right to park on campus? Everyone should be given an EQUAL opportunity for the privilege of paying and parking off campus.
