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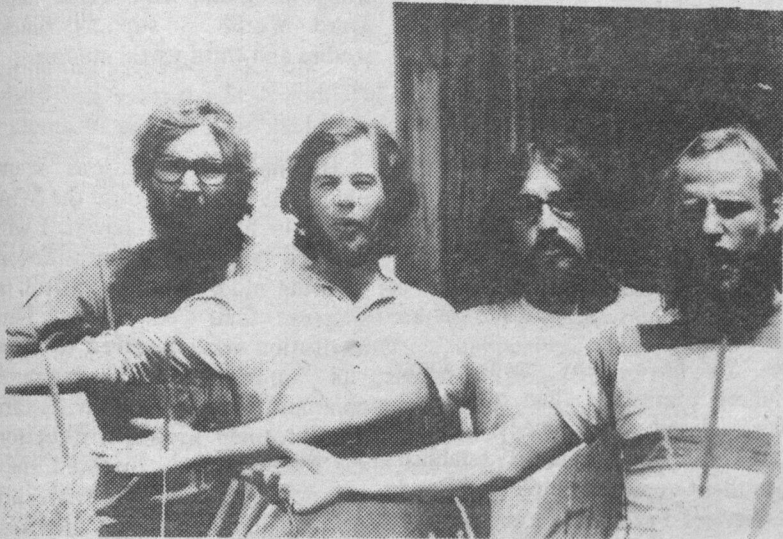

Spring, Miles To Perform This Sunday at WPC

A two part rock concert sponsored by the SGA Assembly Committee will be held Sunday, April 25 at 8 and 11 p.m. in the Shea Center for Performing Arts featuring Buddy Miles and McKendree Spring.

The Buddy Miles Band includes Andre Lewis, clarinet and organ; Marlo Henderson, guitar; Lee Allen, trumpet; Phil Wood, flugelhorn; Mark Williams, tenor saxophone; Bob Hogins, trombone and electric piano; Charlie Karp, lead guitar, and Dave Hull, bass.

Miles' most recent recording is "Them Changes," made last spring. Since then, the group has been playing in Los Angeles, New York, New Orleans, and Boston.

Formerly with Mike Bloomfield's Electric Flag, Miles has also played with Jimi Hendrix and Wilson Pickett.

The McKendree Spring group includes Fran McKendree, lead singer; Marty Slutsky, lead guitar; Larry Tucker, bass; and Mike Dreyfuss, violin.

The group plays a blend of rock, folk, country and classical music and have recorded "Second Thoughts" with Decca Records. They have performed in Carnegie Hall, New York's Fillmore East, and a number of colleges.

Advanced reserved seats are \$3.00 for the public and \$2.00 for William Paterson students and can

be purchased at the Student Activities Office in the College Center. Tickets purchased at the door will be 50 cents higher in each category.

Several students at William Paterson College are spreading word of appeal among area residents who might be interested in donating an unused bike to the camp, which will begin its 33rd season in June.

The camp handles about 800 children during the summer. The campers, who are from 6 to 12 years old, sleep in cabins and engage in such activities as swimming, arts and crafts, nature study, boating, fishing, and athletics. They generally remain at the camp from 14 to 16 days.

Eason Selected Head Coach For Football Team

Arthur Eason has been appointed head coach of the William Paterson College football team for the 1971 season.

Mr. Eason, former backfield coach and assistant for Paterson Eastside High School, will be heading a squad that finished 9-2 in its first season last year and was ranked fourth nationally among club football teams. Among last year's victims were Army's B team and St. John's, a national power in club football.

Eason joined the College staff for the 1970-71 year as assistant director of financial aid. He coached at Eastside from 1965-69.

He played high school football at Eastside where he was voted Most Valuable Player and became an All-Conference back in his senior year. He ran track and played football at Montclair State and was a member of Coach Jerry Edwards' undefeated 1960 squad.

The new William Paterson coach has been serving as coach of the National Youth Games track team and a member of the Passaic County Coaches Association and the Passaic County Officials Association. In non-athletic activities, he is a member of the Board of Directors of the Paterson Task Force and Neighborhood House in Paterson.

The appointment was made by the WPC Student Government Association on the recommendation of the Football Club.

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Civil Rights Priest To Lecture Tonight

Father James Groppi, militant civil rights priest, will lecture tonight (April 20) at 8:00 p.m. in the Marion E. Shea Center for Performing Arts. The program is being sponsored by the SGA Cultural Affairs Committee, and admission for WPC students is 50 cents.

Father Groppi, a graduate of St. Lawrence and St. Francis Seminaries in Wisconsin, has long been an outspoken proponent and participant in demonstrations for fair housing, welfare increases and equality for both black and white poor people.

He participated in the 1963 Civil Rights March on Washington, the Selma-Montgomery March in 1965, and the Poor People's Campaign in 1968.

In 1965, he became an advisor to the Milwaukee NAACP Youth Council. During this same year he became vice-chairman of the

Milwaukee United School Integration Committee and was twice arrested in connection with school issues.

With the Milwaukee Youth Council, he led a protest against
