

Foreword



Now I repeat this statement but with a slight change. "I trust your work in the teaching profession will progress in harmony with your finest ideals."


Kappa Delta Pi

The Staters also handed losses to Newark Engineering, Bayonne Junior, Panzer, and Glassboro despite these teams' outstanding records.

Since the majority of the Pioneers' losses were by five points or less, more frequent smiles from Dame Fortune could easily have made this year's record really outstanding.

This year ended the college cage careers of Tom Donnelly and Norm Reichert after serving as mainstays of the team for four years. The outtook for next year is further dimmed by the fact that every other player has either been tapped for military service or is likely to be called.






With the close of this season, State will lose three of its ablest fencers, Canova, Hilton, and Reda, all of whom are being graduated.












