










This younger generation seemed to be very interested in sports. One of their favorites was basketball.

Most of the home games in the past few years have been played at Schools 5, 18, or 25. There were never very large crowds at the game but their enthusiasm made up for the limited numbers.










When a young student's fancy turns to thoughts of relaxation, the beauties of nature, and many days of vacation. How many times have we rested on this green carpet de-

the beauties of nature. Spring always meant classes on the lawn.



It was pretty tough to keep up with these modern Staters as field trips carried them hither and yon.







The doors of Paterson State Normal School were first opened back in 1885, when young men and women were first admitted to prepare for a teaching career. Classes met late in the afternoon and on Saturdays until the year 1862 when regular day sessions were inaugurated in courses that were extended to a year's duration. In 1929 the curriculum was lengthened to three years and finally in 1934 to four years.

April 1937 was the year our college finally received recognition as being a New Jersey State Teachers College. It was with pride that we became a member of the American Association of Teachers' College in 1939. The establishment of the Kindergarten-Primary and Business Education curriculums took place in 1943 and in 1952 the Junior High program was formed.

Within one century society and its institutions change and Paterson State realizes that the survival of free men and representative government depends on an educated public.

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
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
