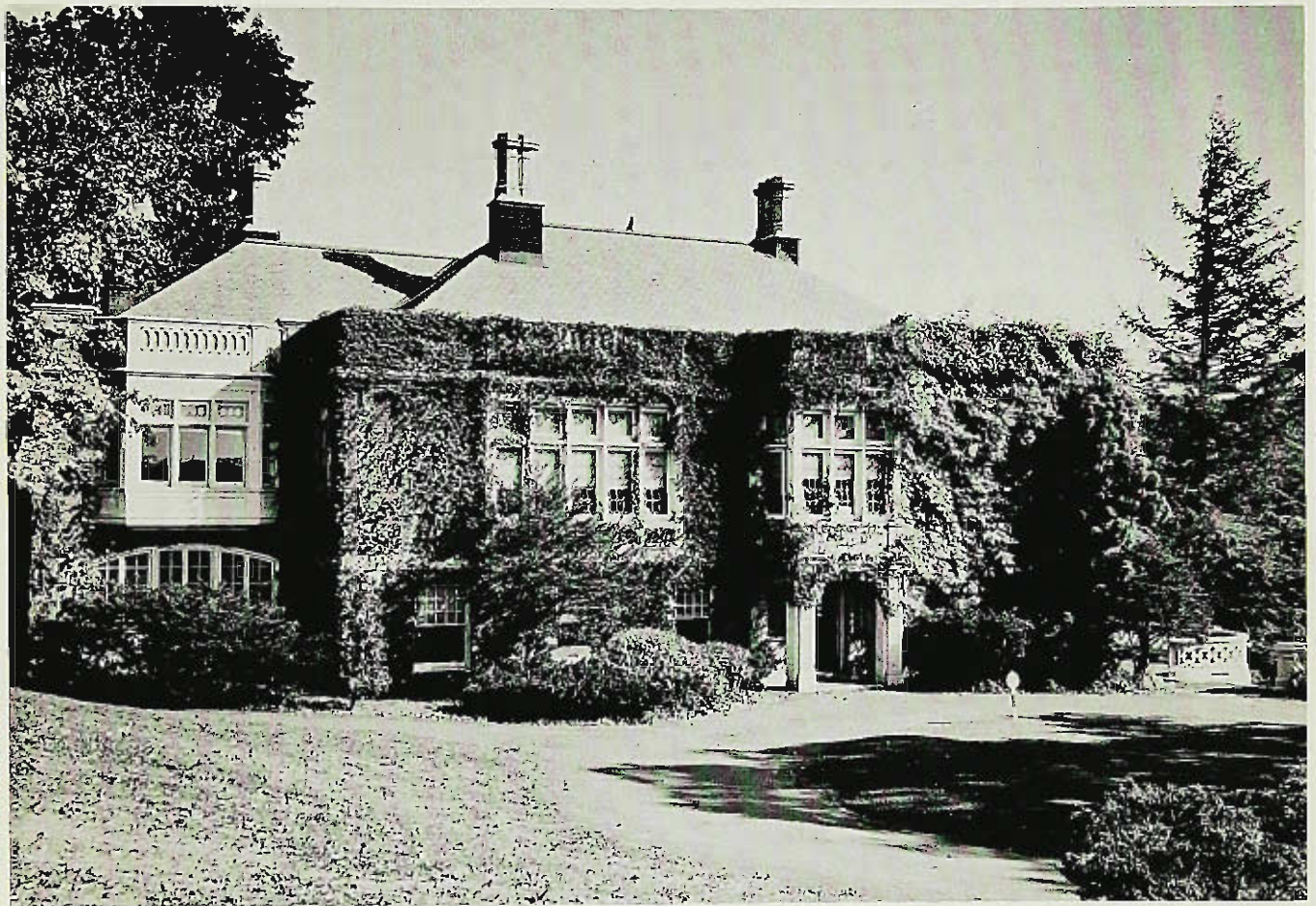

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Preface

1958 Is it too late to consider what college represents in these modern times?

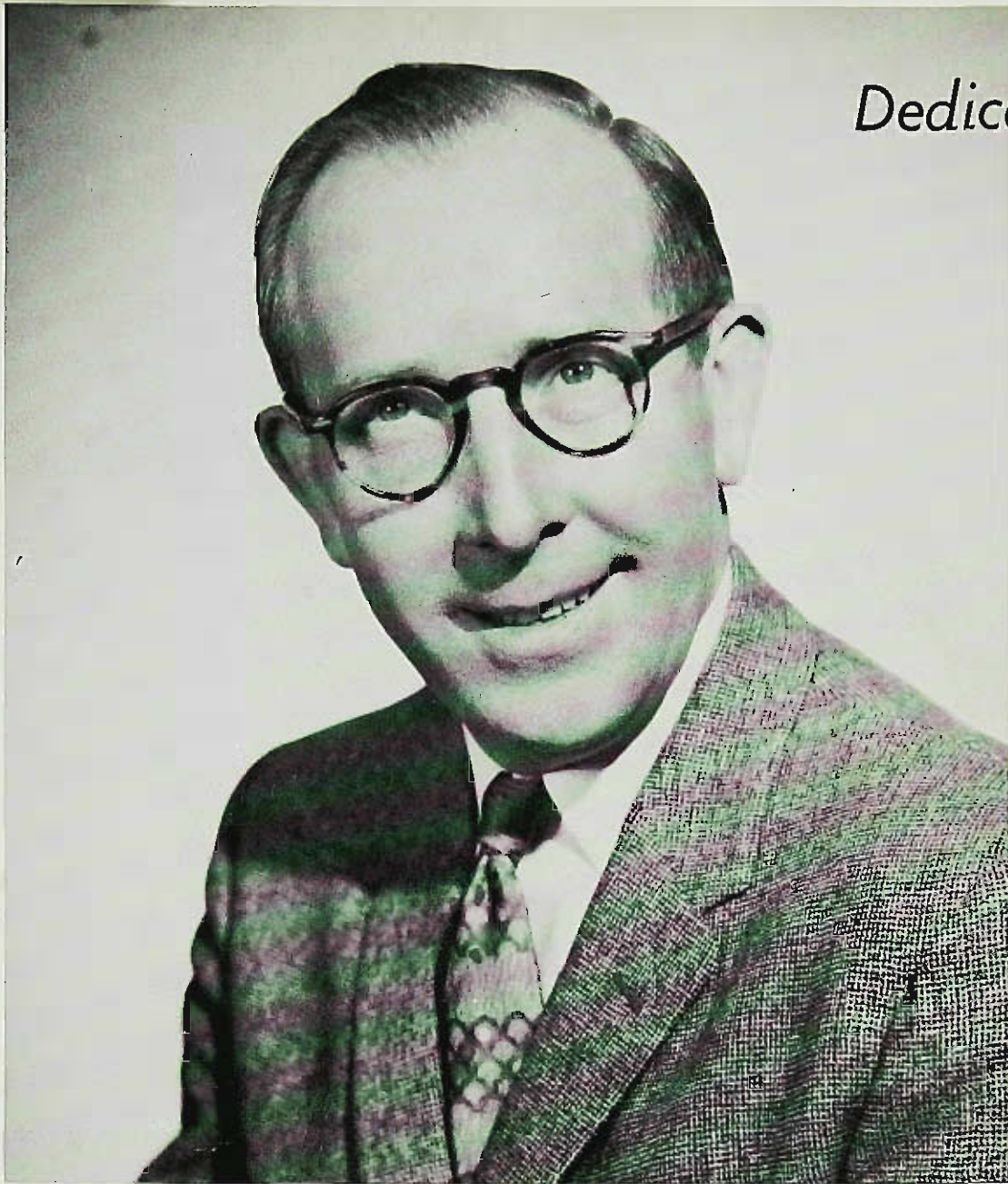
To the contemporary American student the term higher education usually connotes further study in either a university or a college.

These institutions of higher learning, which had their birth during the Middle Ages, were not, at first, accorded the recognition they are today. In the beginning of the eleventh century there appeared a class of well-educated and well-versed men who were both willing and able to devote their lives to teaching. These masters journeyed from one place to another lecturing and thus passing on their knowledge to others. Scholars came from all parts of the world to listen and to learn. Gradually, these MAGISTRI and their pupils found themselves together in various centers — Bologna, Montpellier, Paris — and, since conditions and outlooks were conducive to education there, they remained. In time, certain buildings were set aside for these people so that they might have a definite place to concentrate on studying the universal subjects. These places then began to be known as universities, (from the Latin UNIVERSITAS meaning groups of students and teachers.) Later on, students interested in one specific body of knowledge gradually banded together and these departments of the university became known as colleges.

Today, Paterson State Teachers College is one of these groups. Its students are all bound together by the desire to learn and to learn not only that they might know but that they might also inform others.

While it is true that the atmosphere and surroundings of today's colleges and universities are not identical with those of earlier times, men and women still do attend them for the primary purpose of learning. Only today's learning is not confined strictly to academic subjects; it also embraces many other activities which all blend together in opening new horizons and creating new interests for the individuals in society.

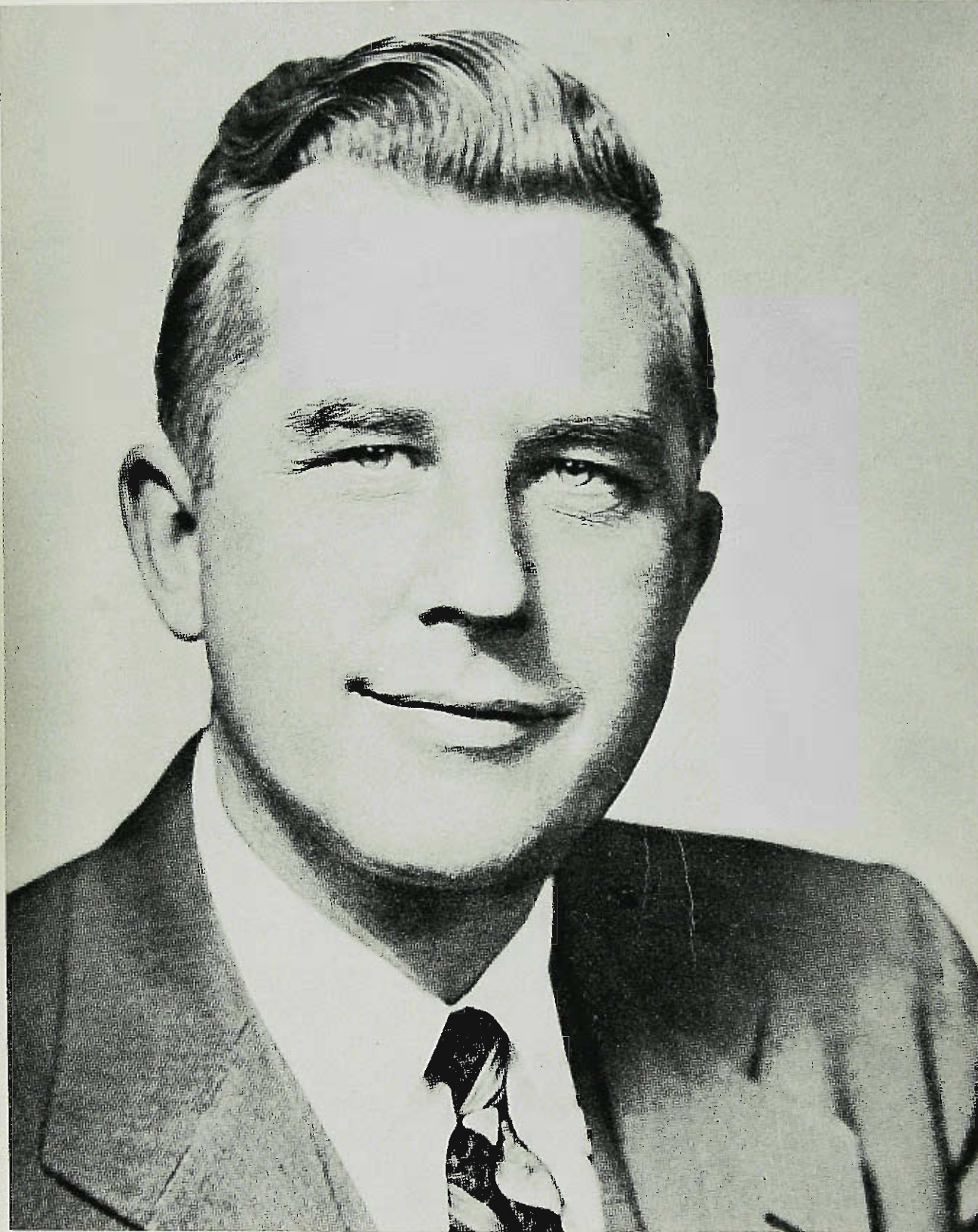

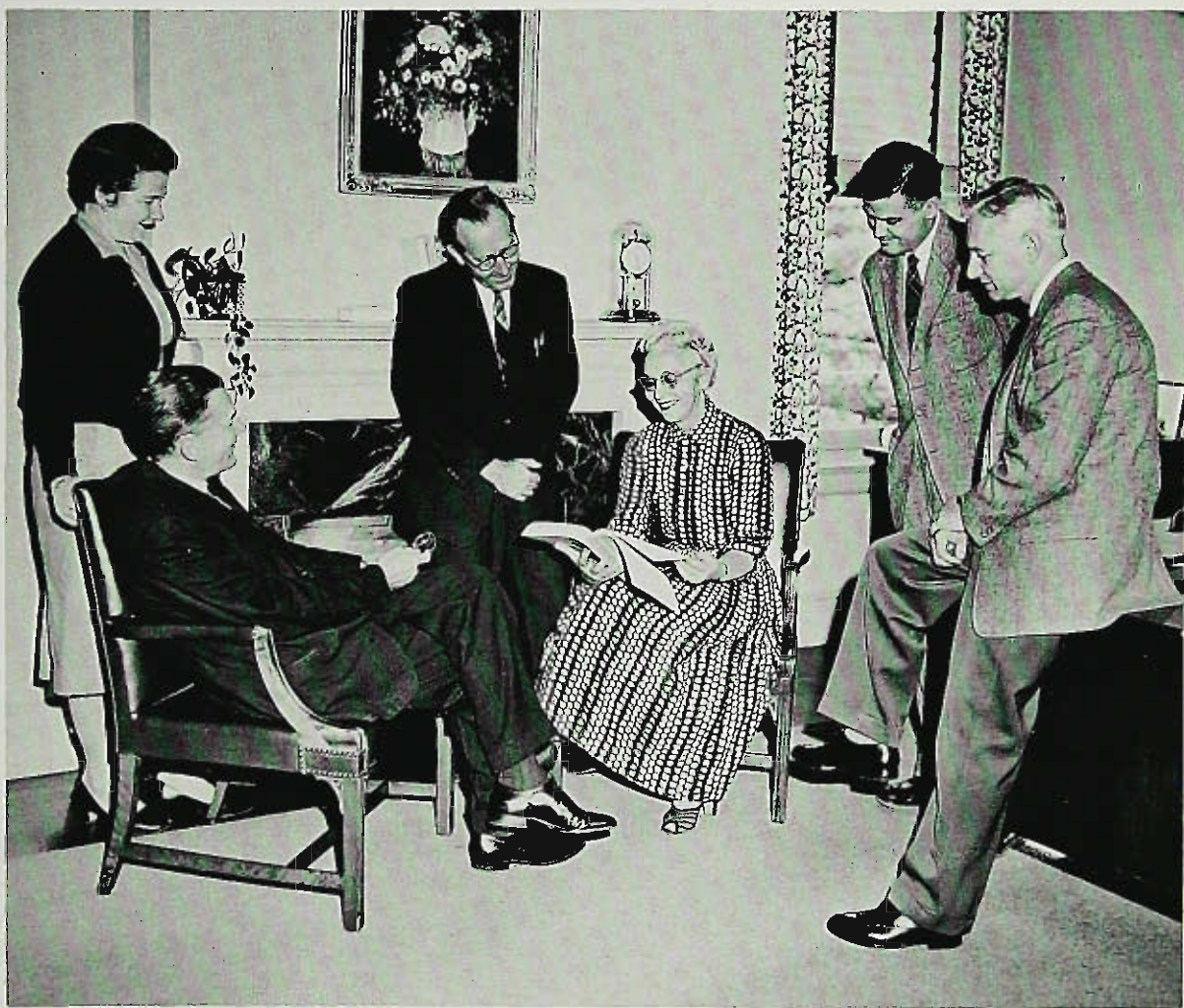
It appears evident then, that the teacher must con-

Every full time student at P. S. T. C. is issued a copy of the yearbook which is financed by a general yearbook fund.

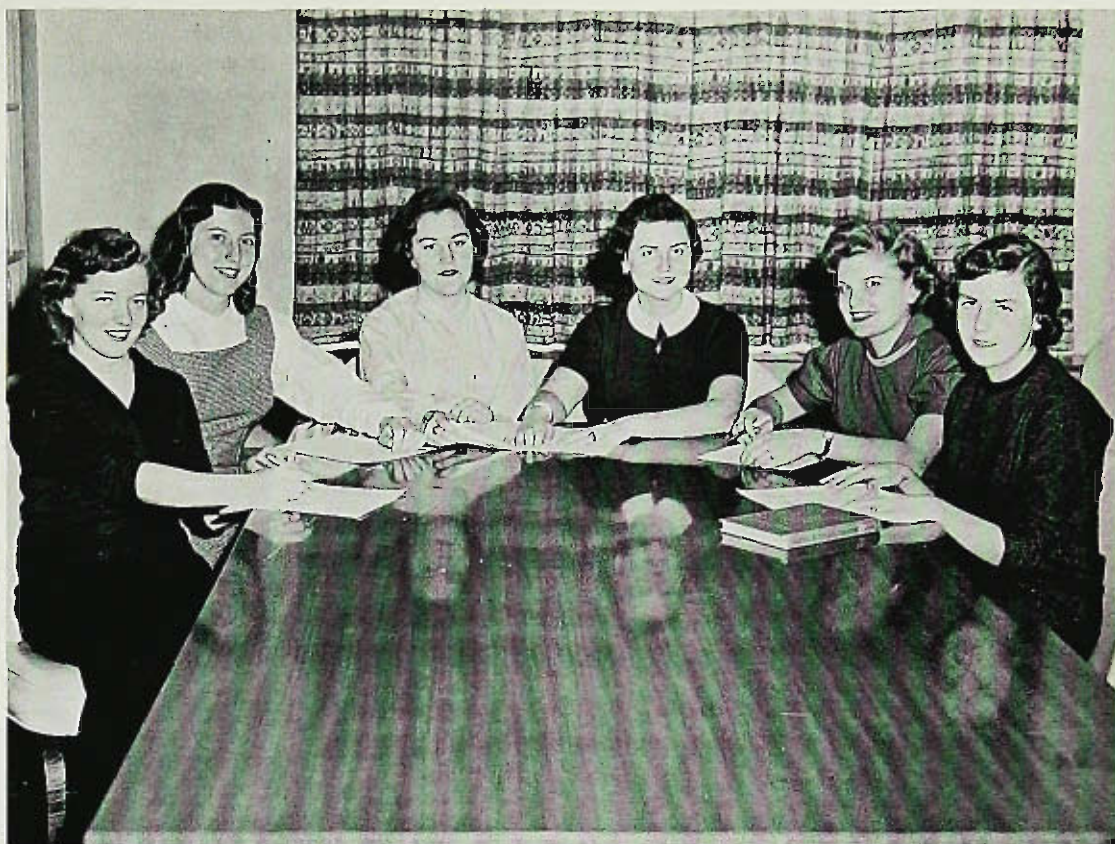
... From the Editors

Band

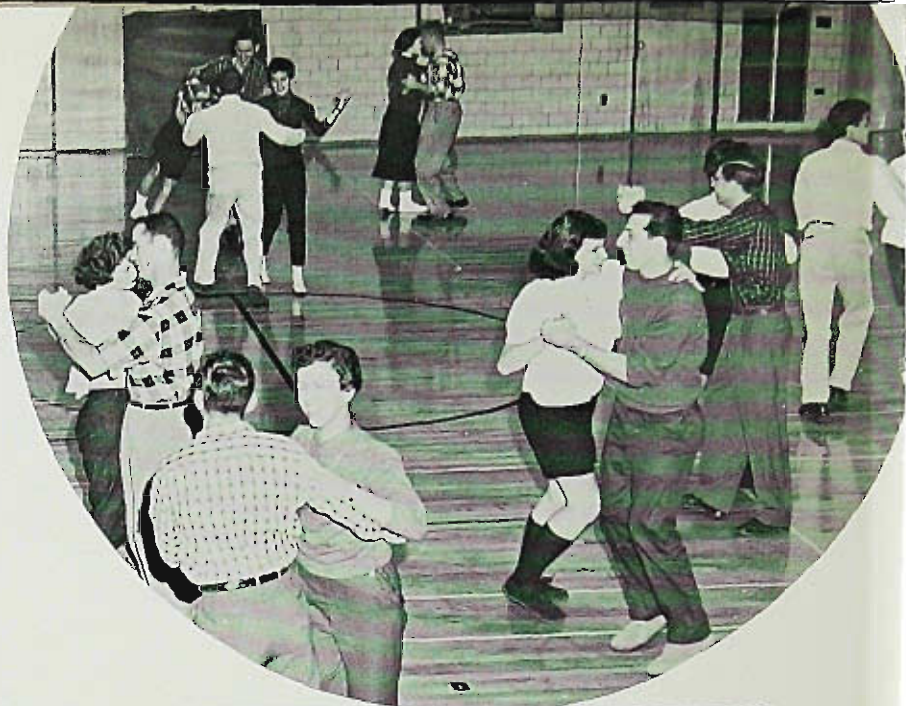
A newly-formed but well organized club is the Band directed by Mr. Stanley Opalach.

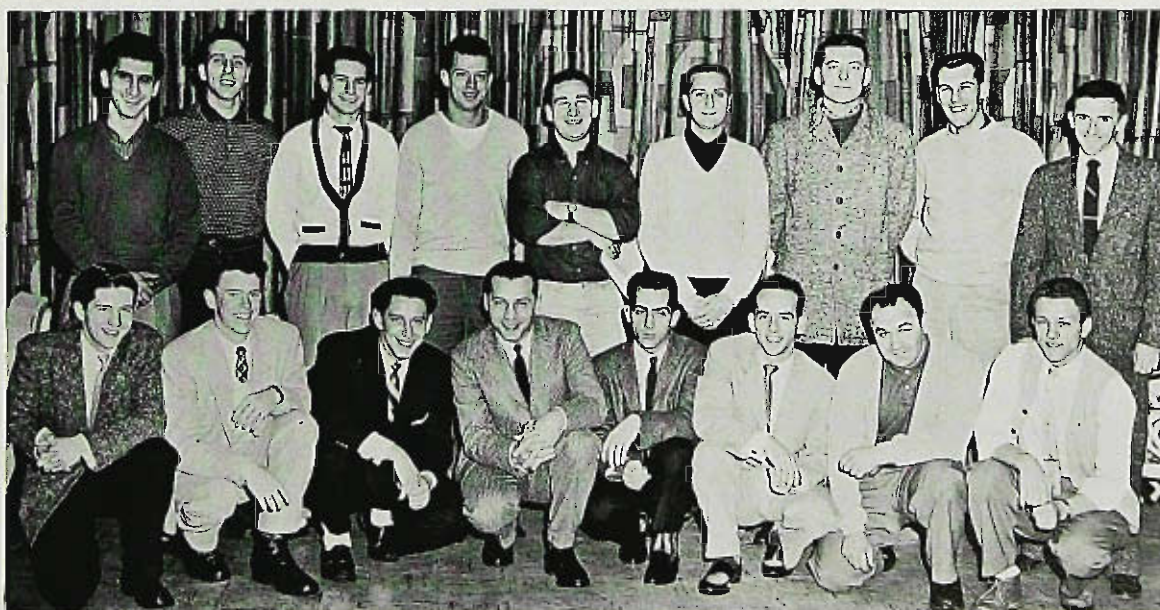

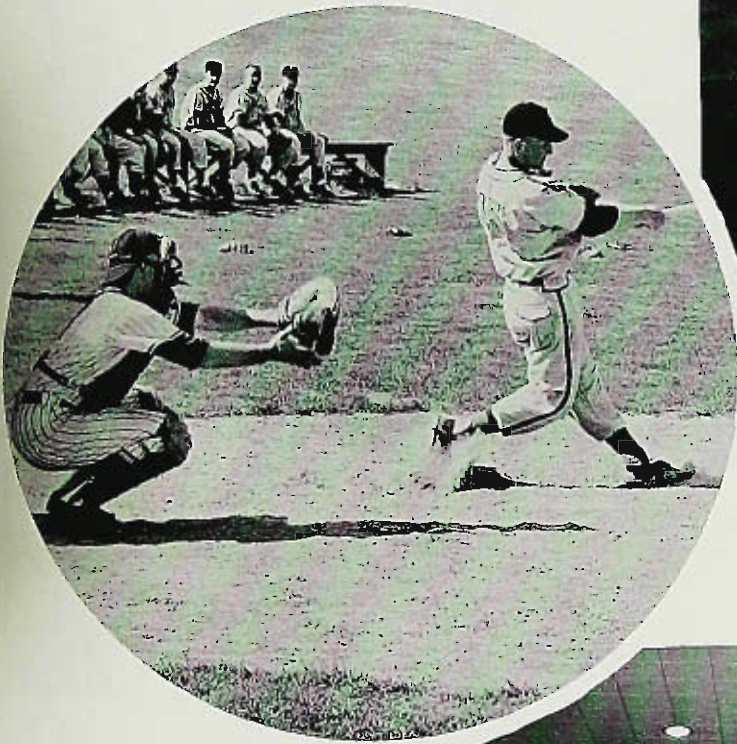

low .500.

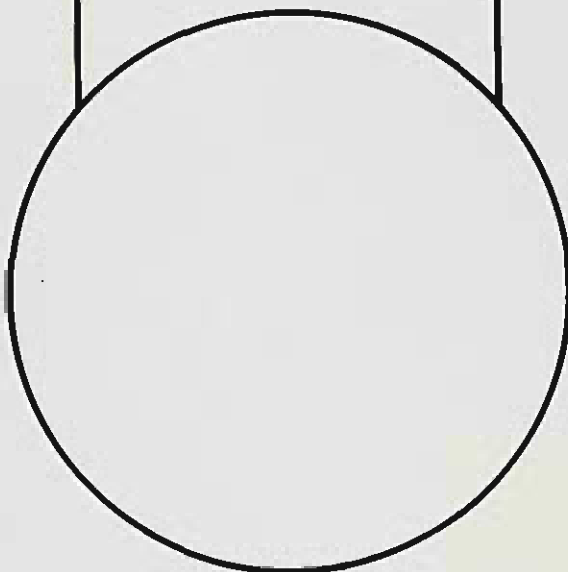

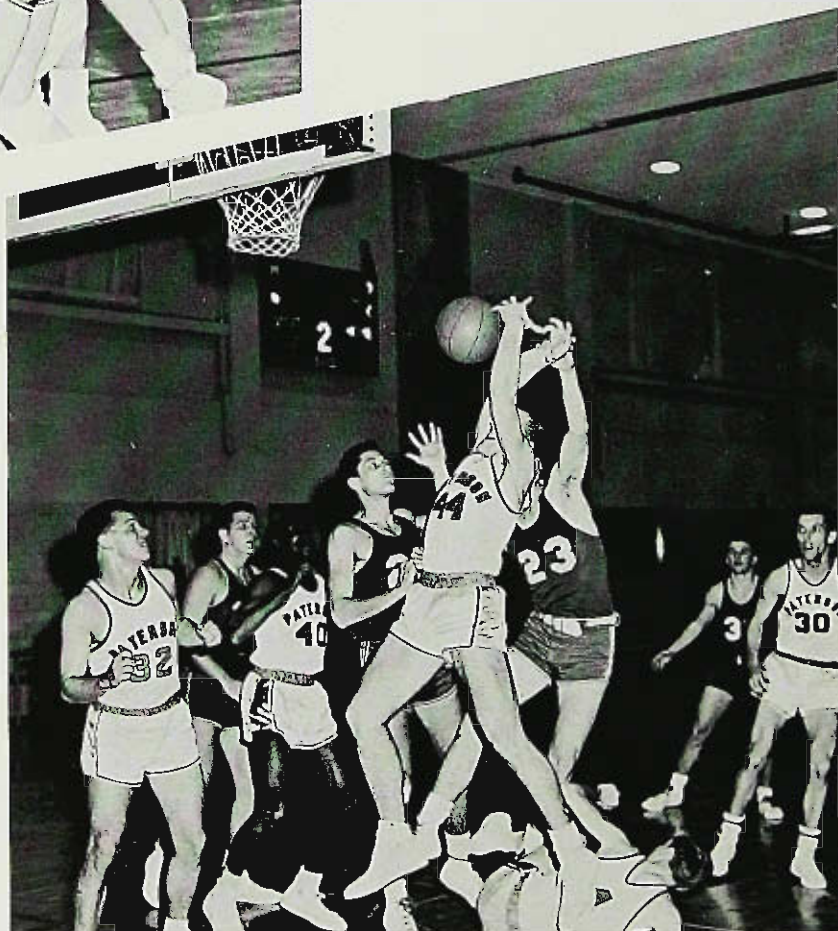
