

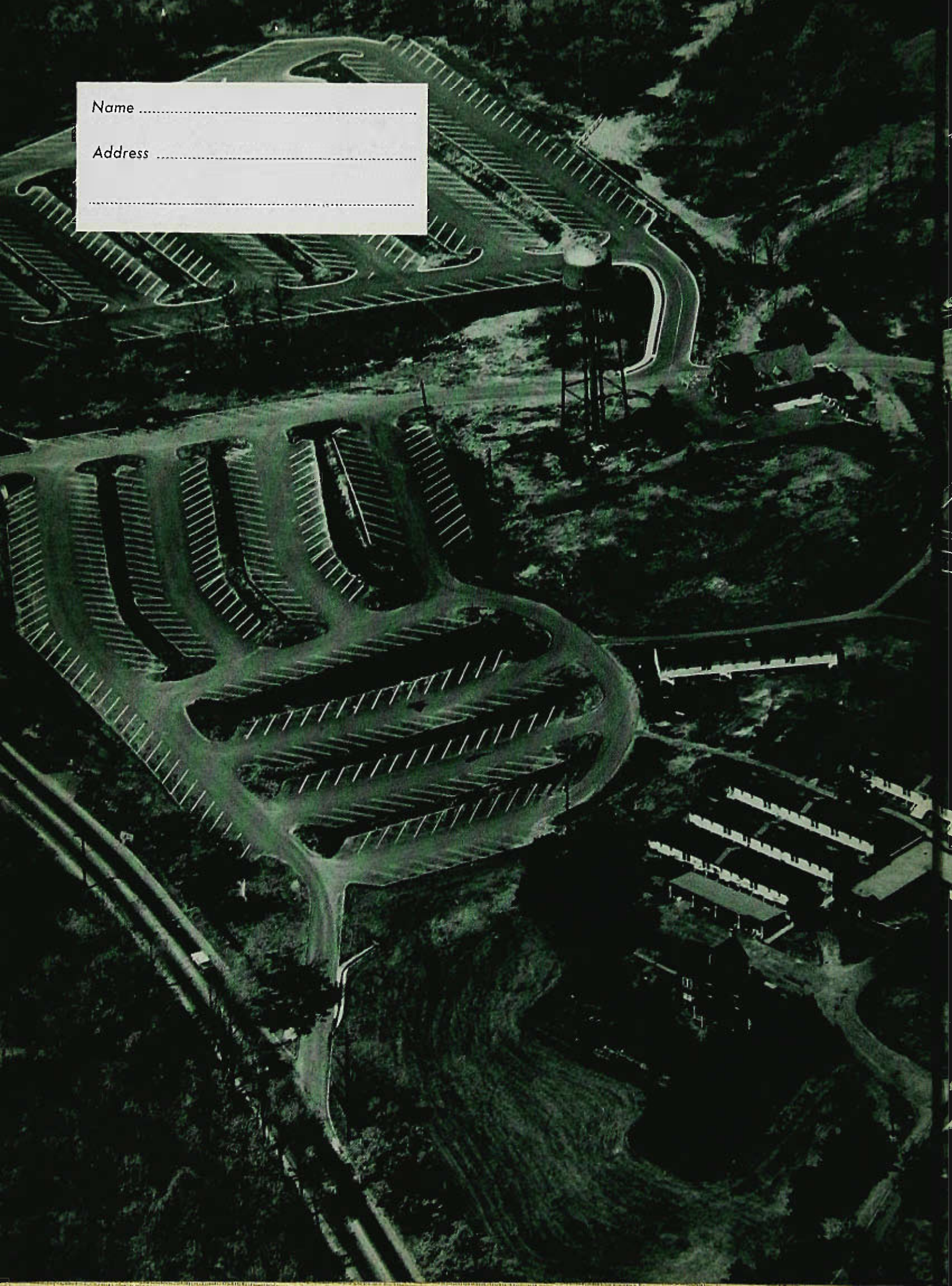

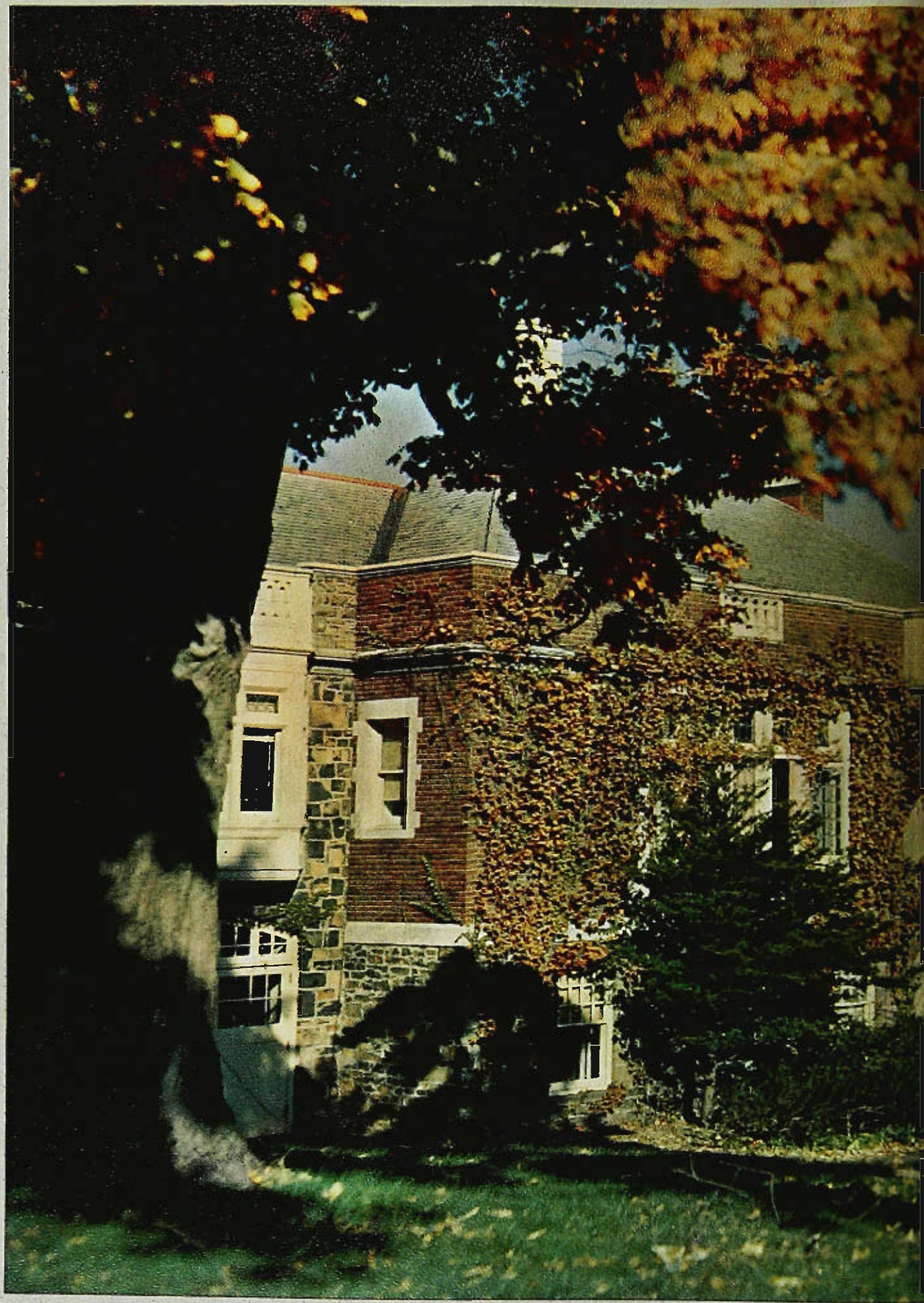

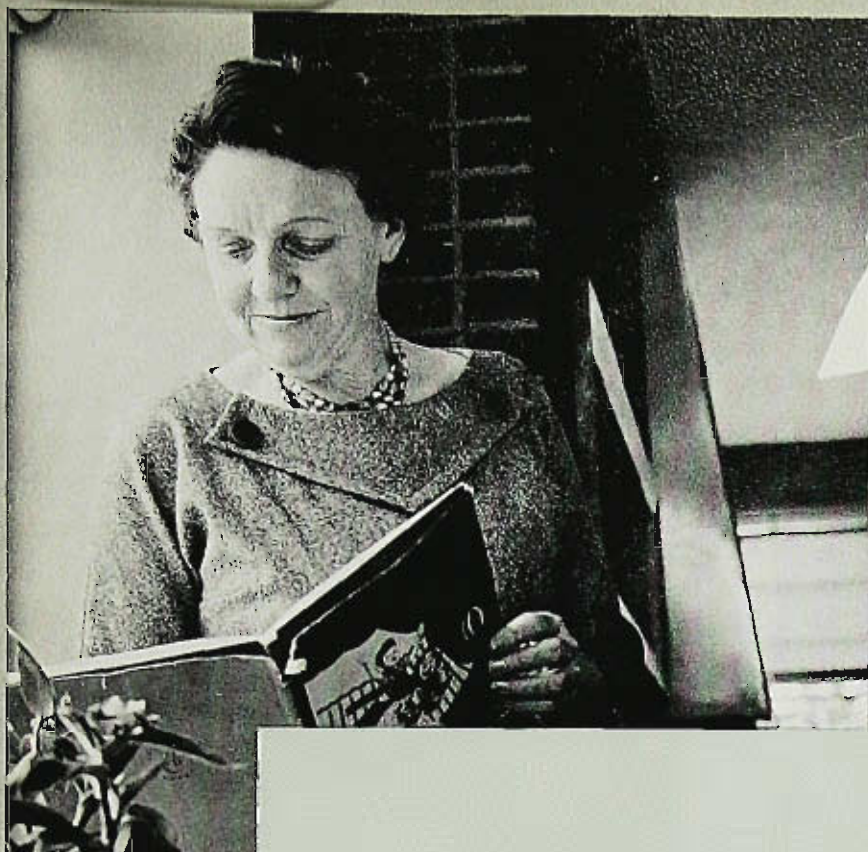
# Dedication

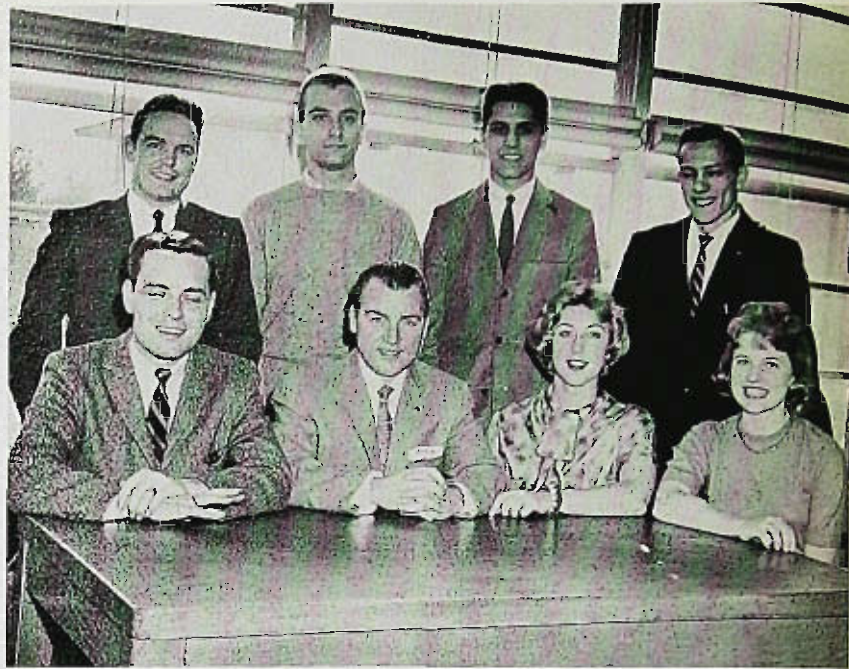


# STUDENT GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION

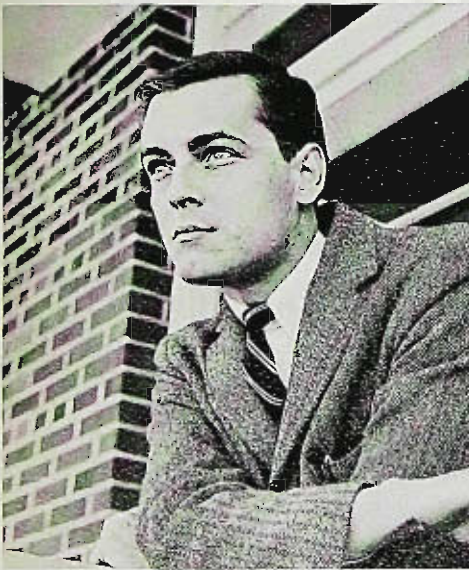

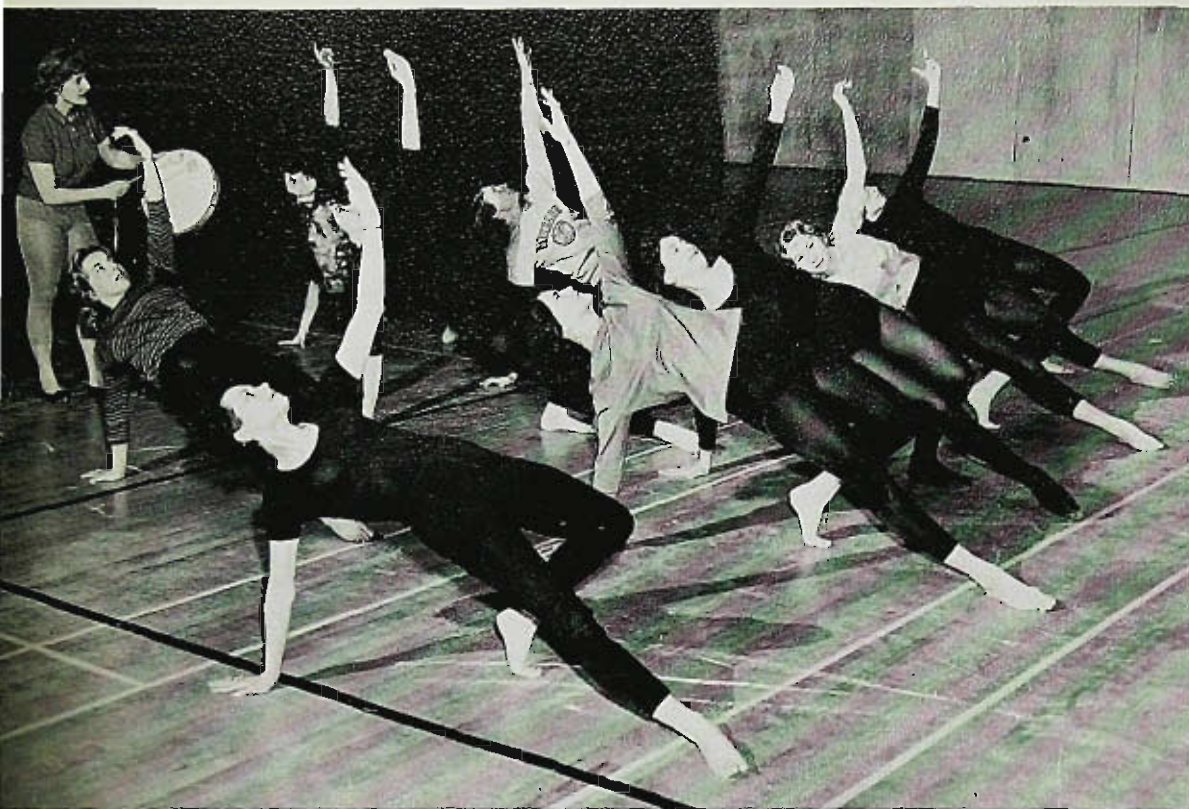

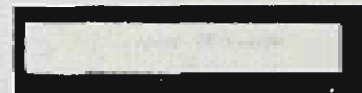


# The Senior Show

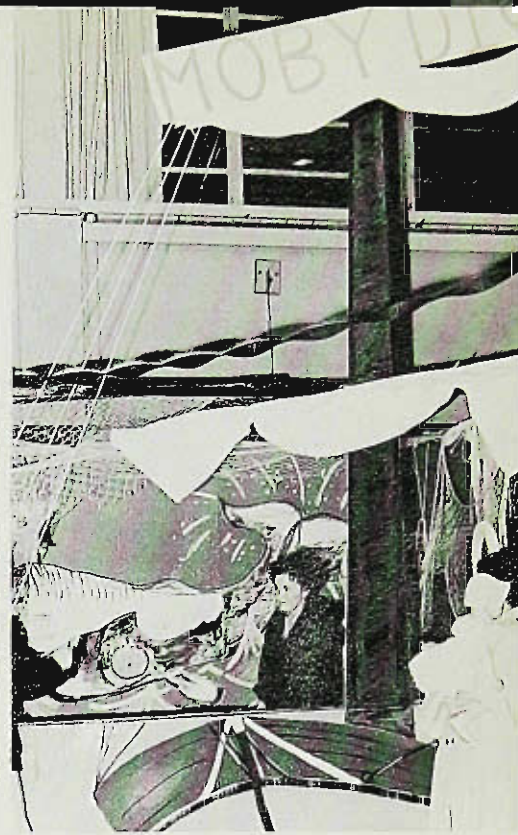

## STUDENT TEACHING

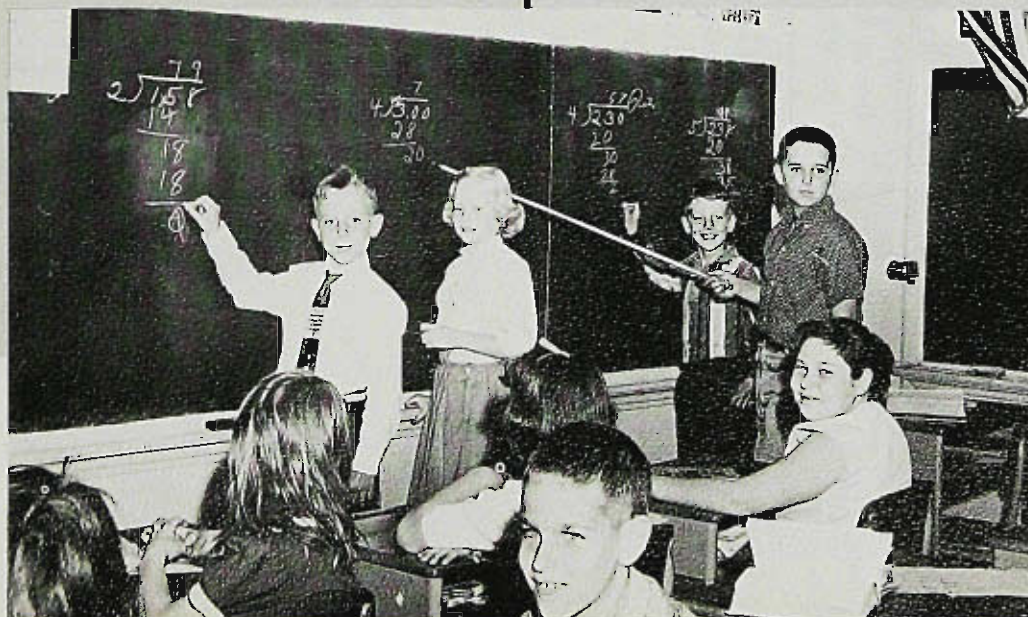
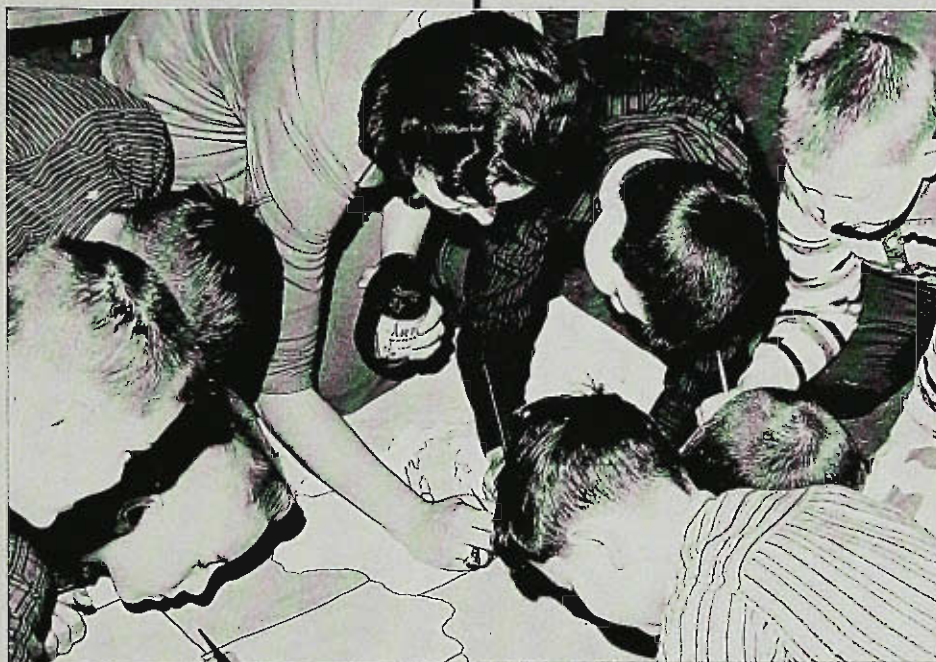

# Off Campus Activities



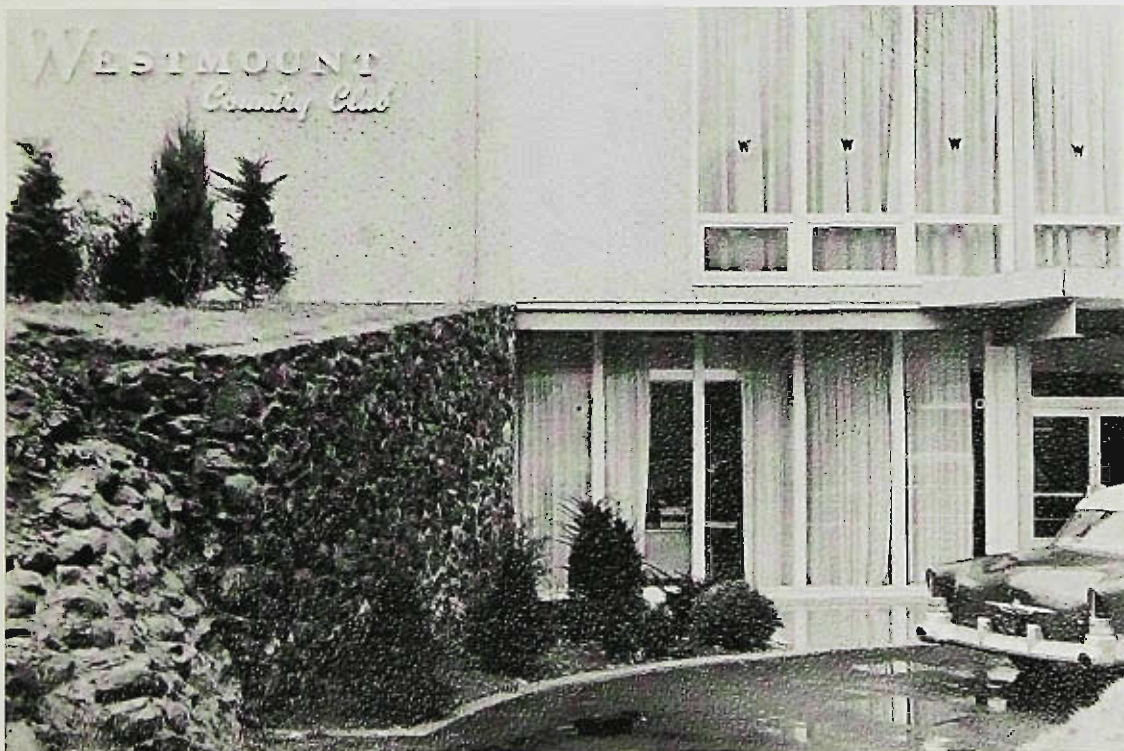




Students at Paterson State engage in a variety of off campus activities. Shaeffer Play Day provides the students with a boat ride to recreation centers at the end of the school year.

Other off campus activities dealing with social life are held in country clubs and halls in the nearby areas. A little less glamour is afforded the students through dinners and snack bars within the vicinity.







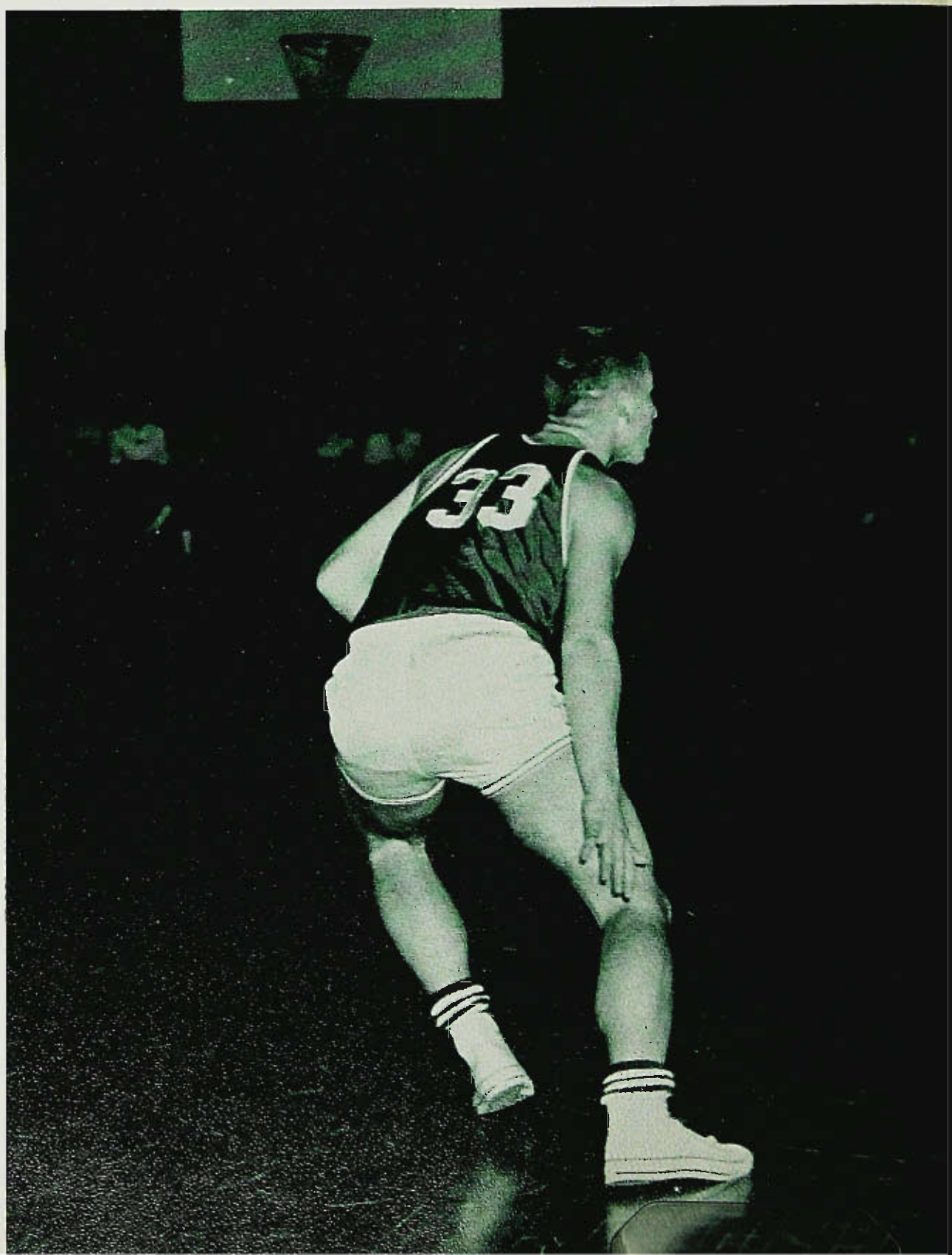

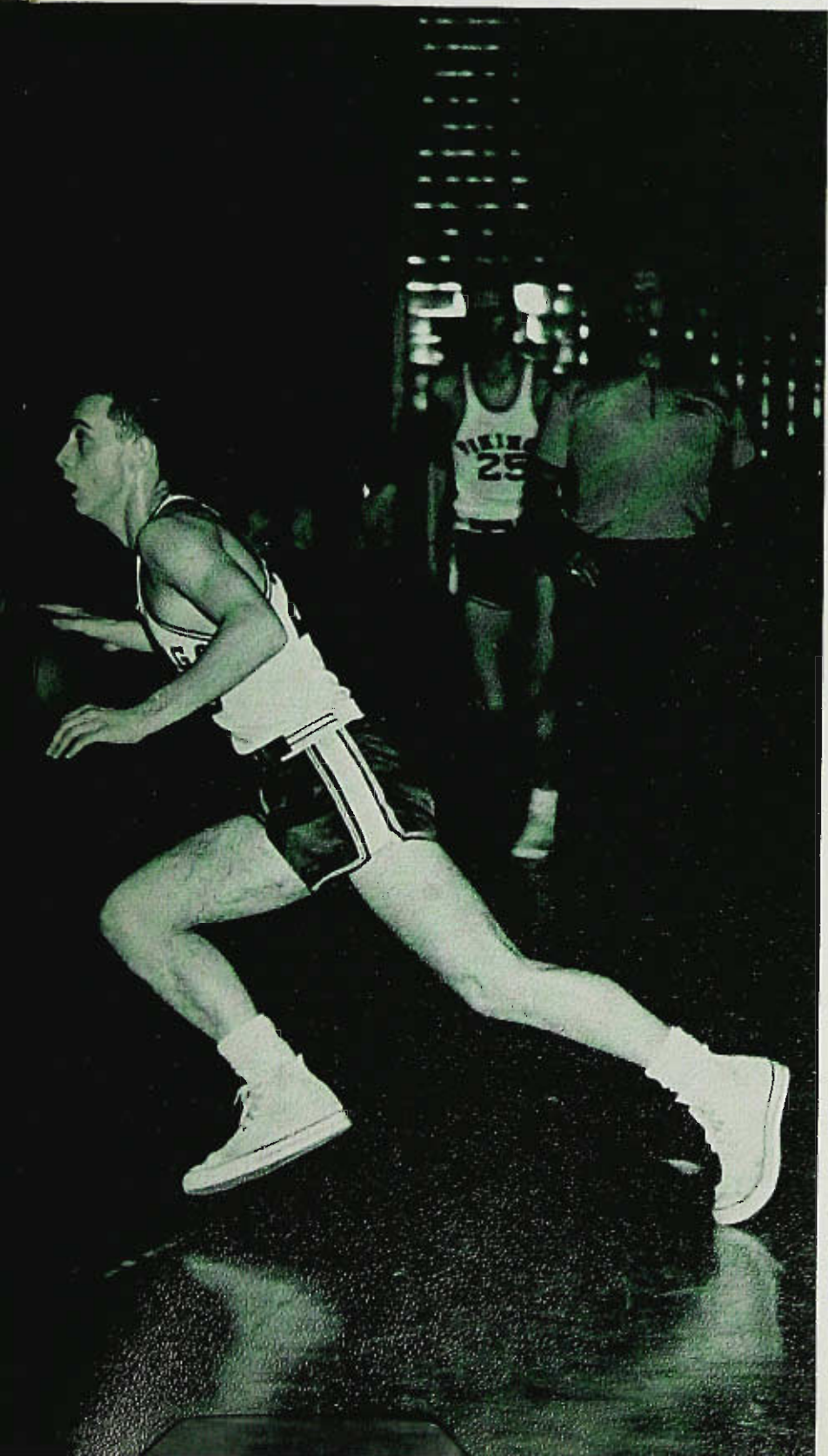

# BASEBALL

The 1959 baseball season was the most successful athletic season in the history of the college; the members of the team became the most publicized, most widely recognized athletes Paterson State has ever produced.

After losing the opening game, the Pioneers went on to capture the remaining eighteen games on their schedule. The highlight of the regular season was a 3 to 2 win over Montclair State that clinched the N.J.S.C.A.A. championship. However there were many other highspots as the club sought to maintain and increase its skein of victories.

With the closing of the regular schedule, Paterson was invited to represent District thirty-one in the N.A.I.A. Tournament held at Alpine, Texas. There, despite the rigors

of the long trip and a hostile climate, the team performed admirably but was eliminated in the round-robin playoff.

Much of the success of the club was attributable to three members of the Class of 1960, Richie Adubato, Don Devins, and Lou Diess, whose respective three year batting averages read .345, .325, and .375. Three freshmen made the starting nine—John Jacone, Ricky Mola, and Armand Palmisano, and sophomores Bob Paul and Bill Fleming rounded out the first line. Fred Henry turned in a good pitching effort winning eight games and losing only one. He was ably supported by Jake Keyser and Joe Klinger.

Glowing with the successes of the past season, the team is quite naturally anticipating another good year.

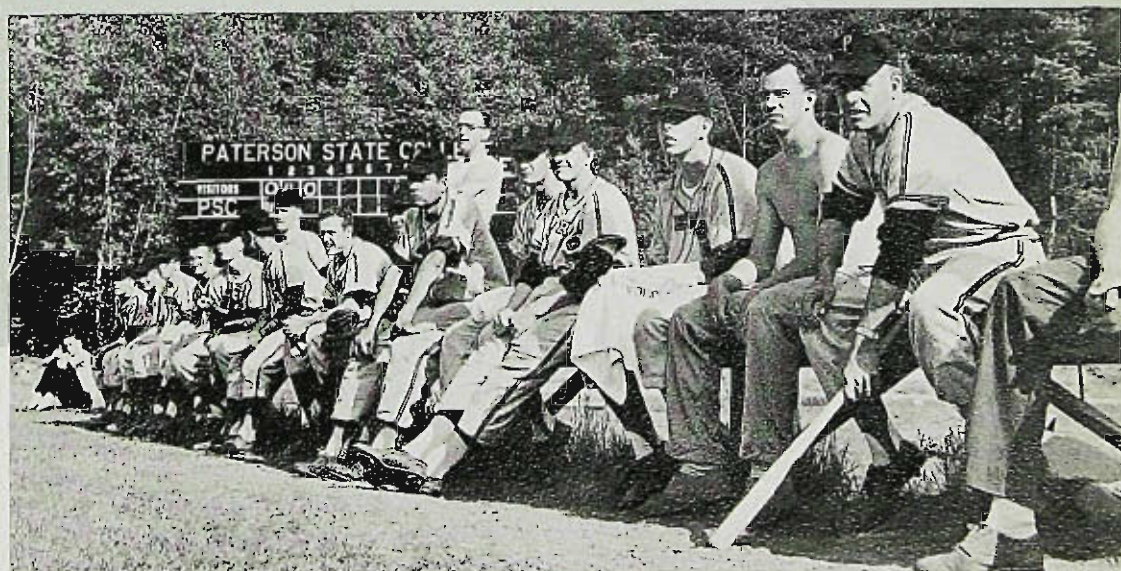

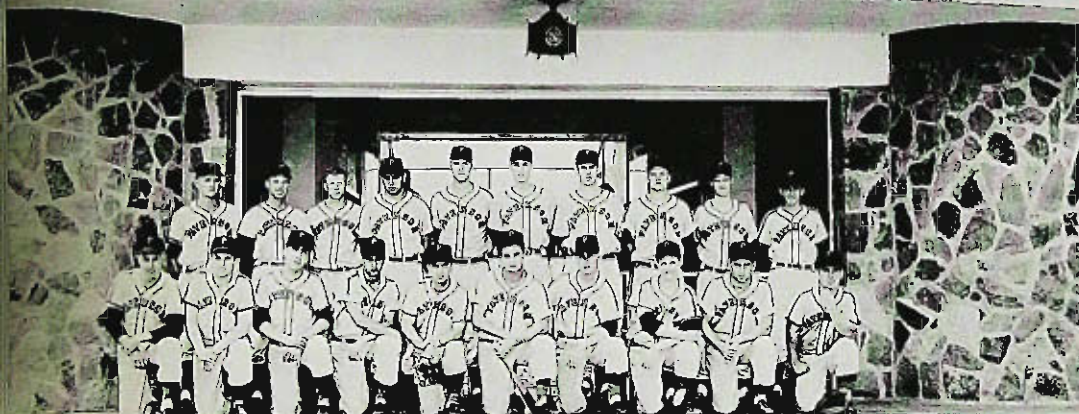

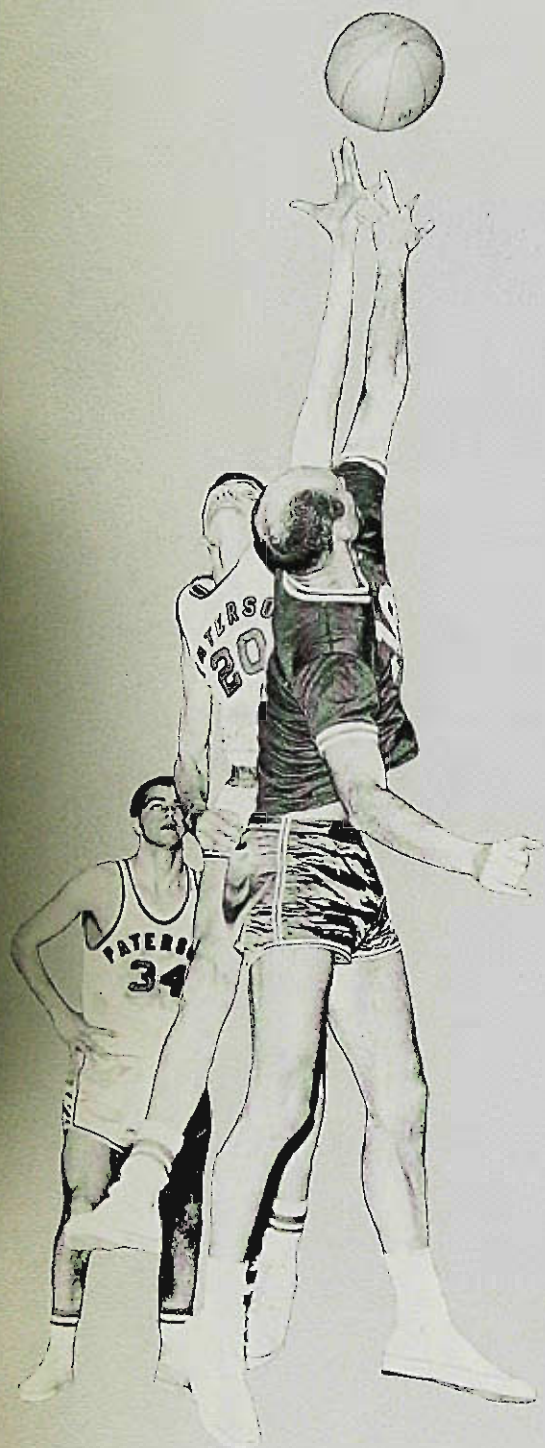
# VARSIY BASKETBALL

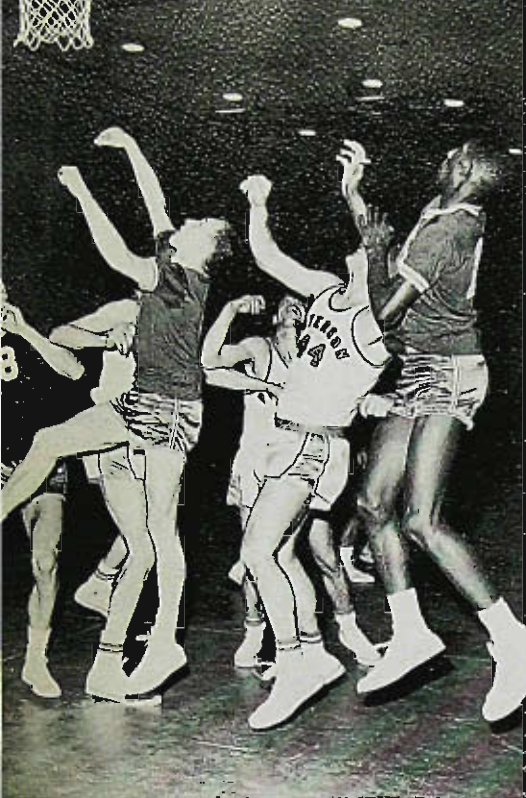

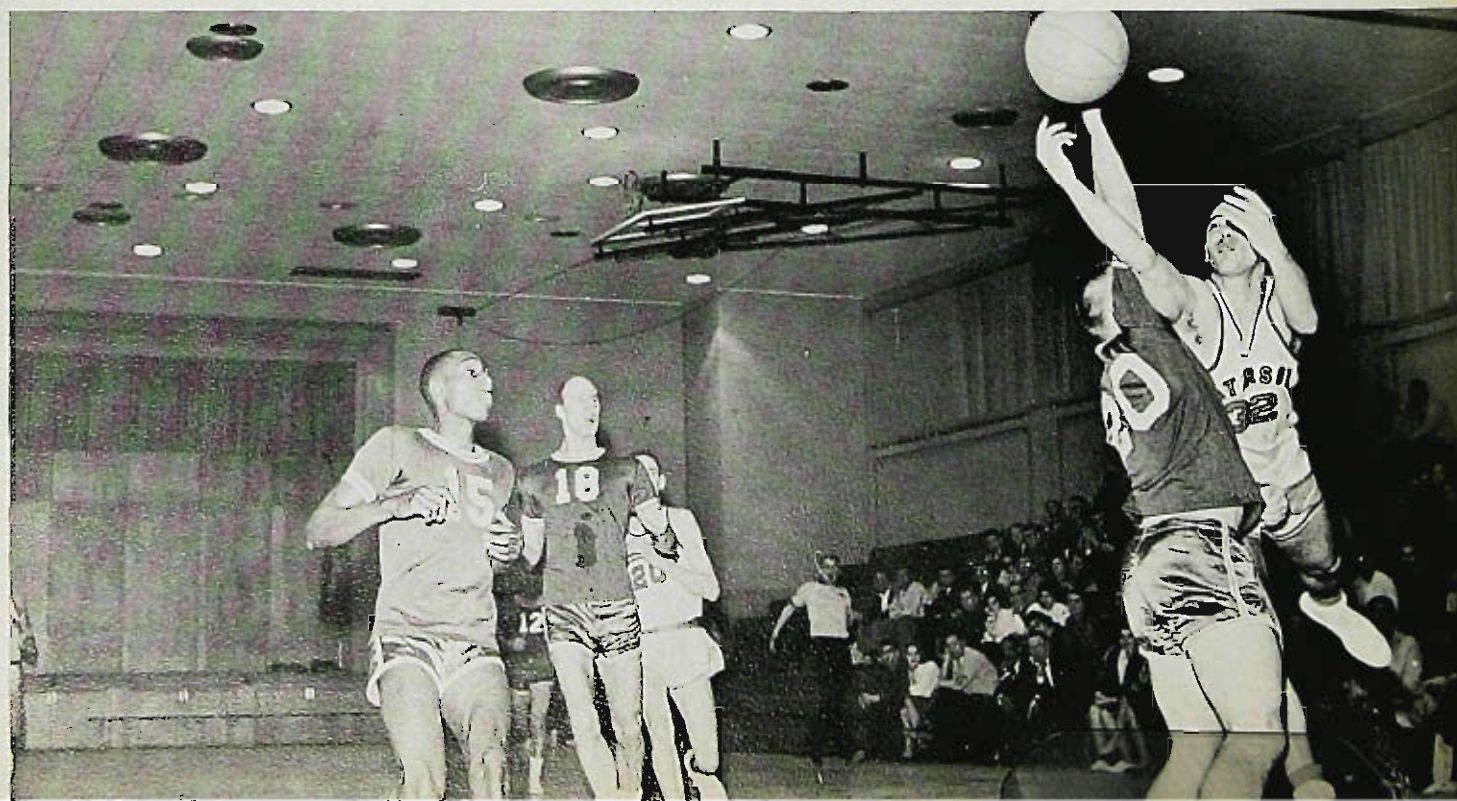

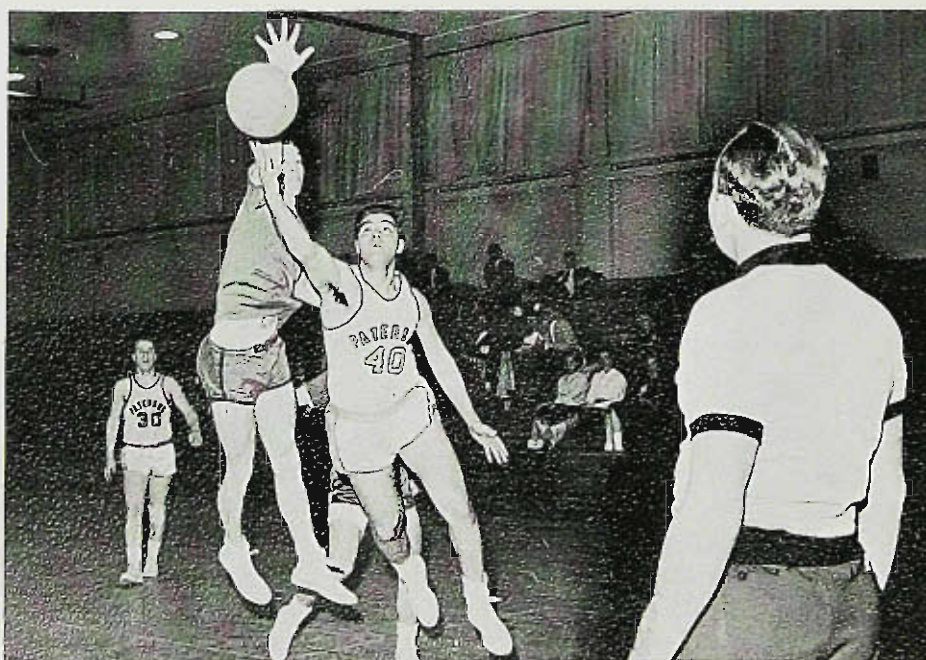

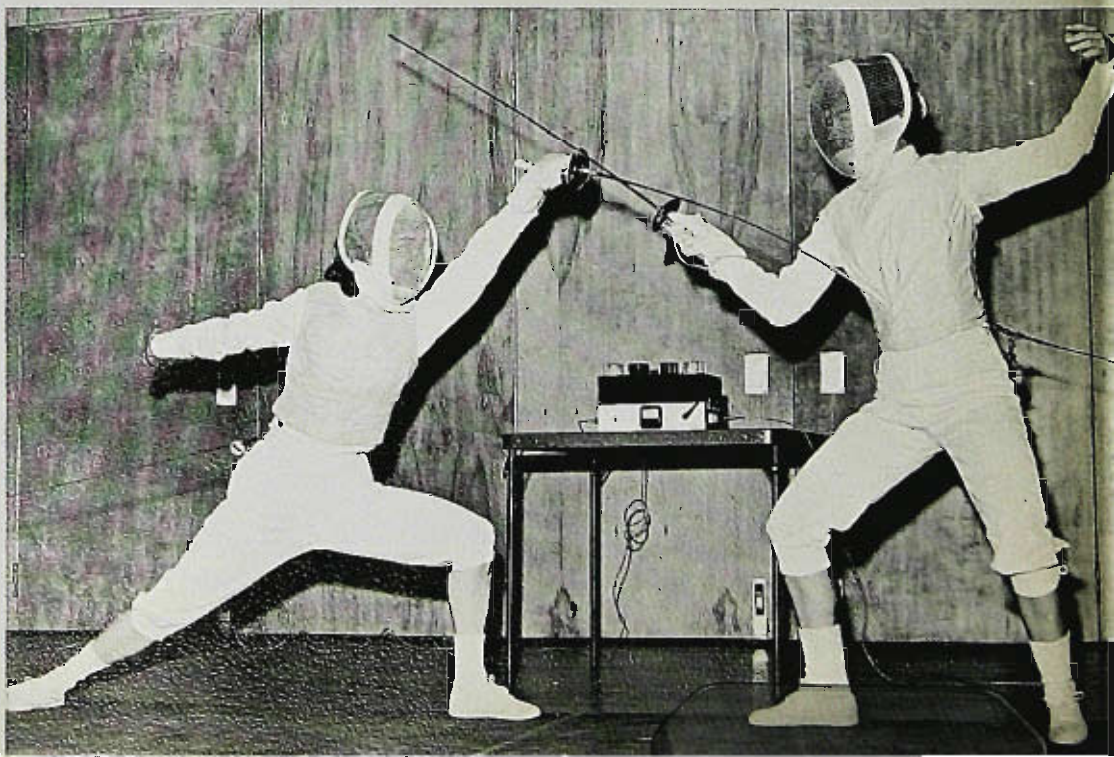
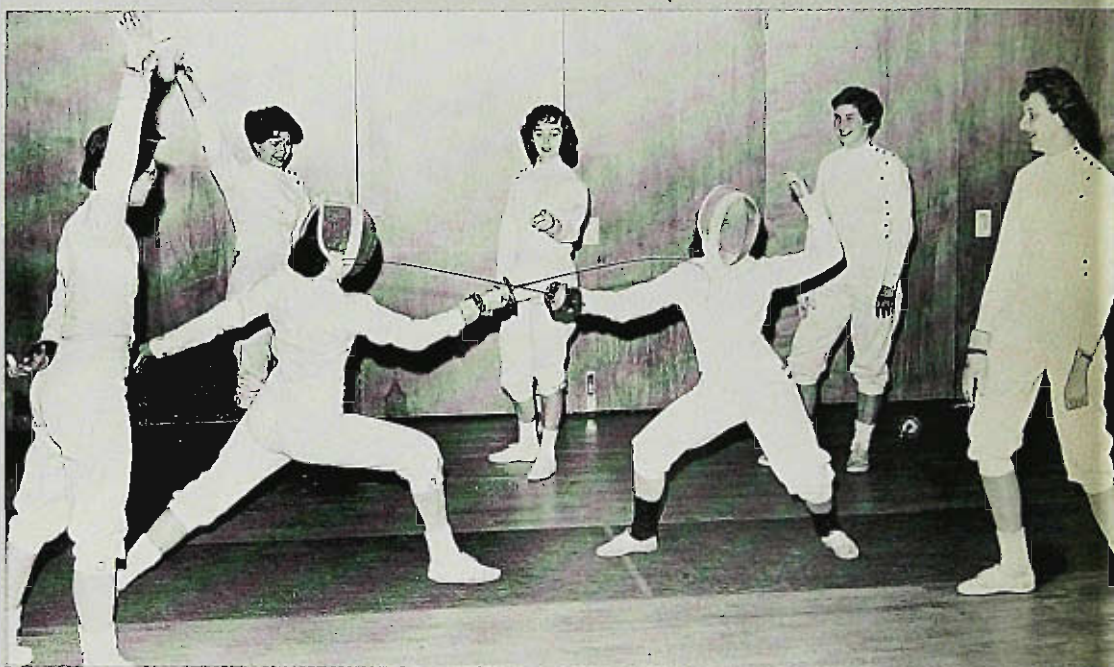
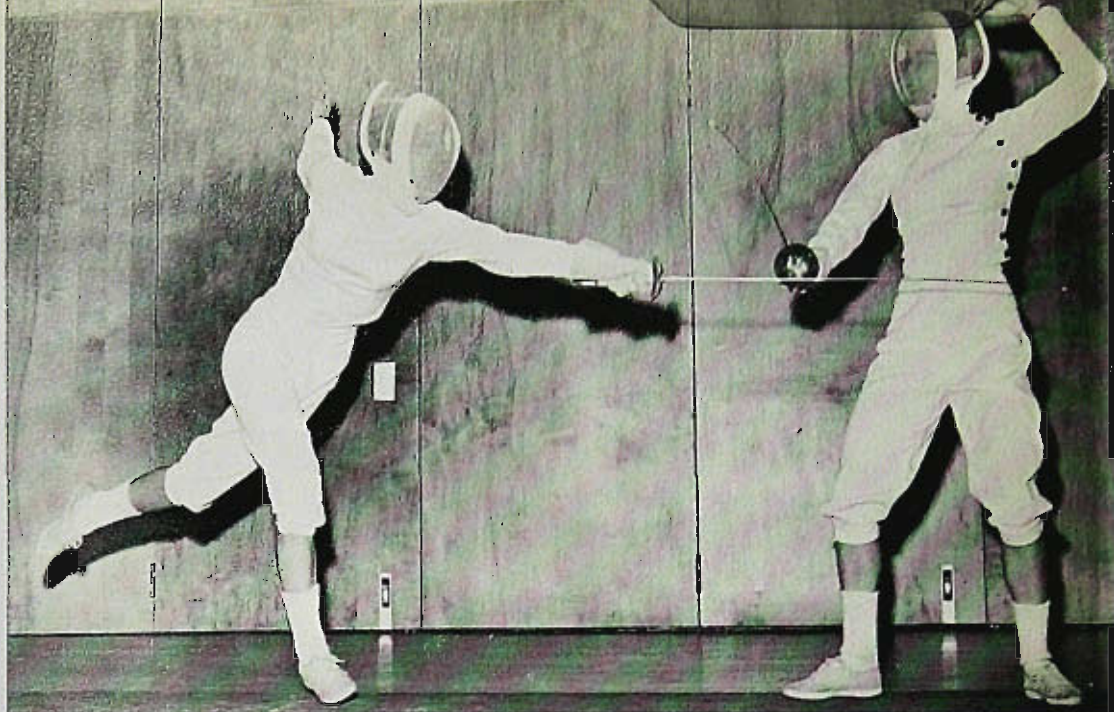
# FENCING

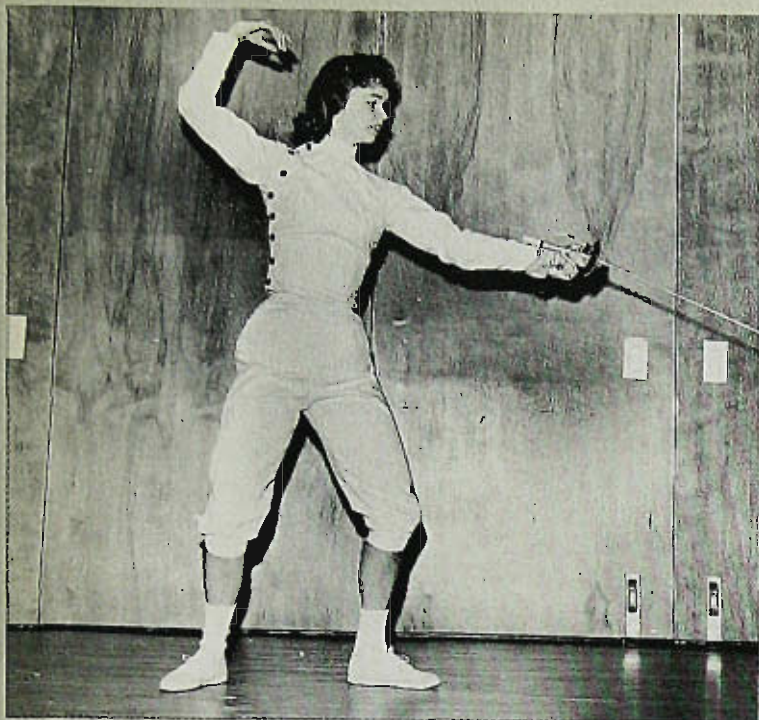

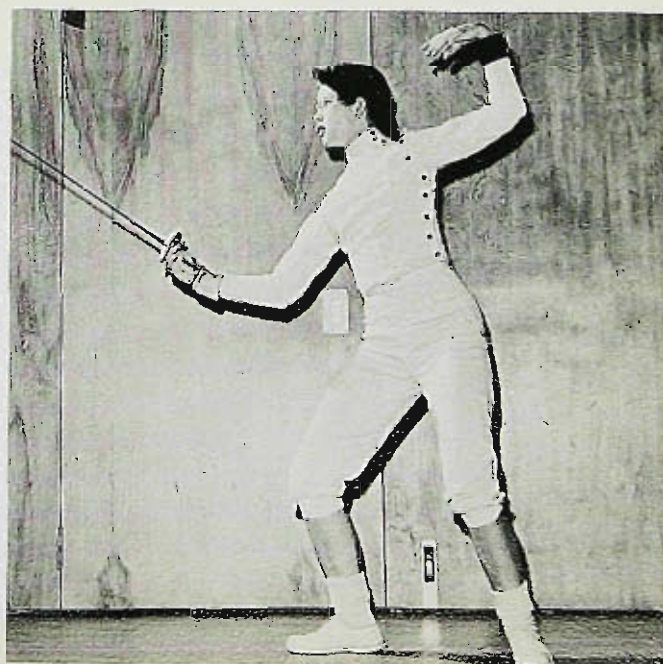

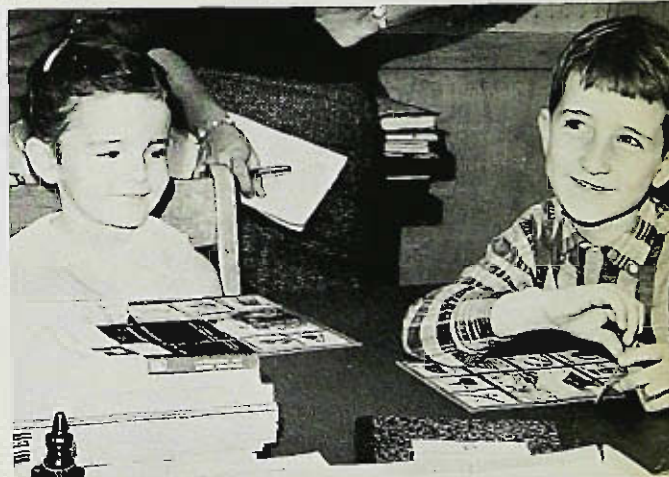




### "I Taught Them All"
