
life Vincent Lombardi, a major folk hero of our culture, exemplified this pursuit and articulated it in his own style: "Winning isn't everything - it's the only thing."






Leadership Lab








Contemporary Dance Club



This was the 4th annual Miss WPC sponsored by the Student Government, a direct preliminary to the Miss New Jersey pageant in July.





It offers students who have proved their ability in high school or who give evidence of good potential a chance to select their own courses without following the generally required curriculum and to participate in the Honors seminars for six credits each semester of their Freshman and Sophomore year. Working in small self-guided groups or in independent study, these students frequently may begin work early in their major area or may experiment in a number of widely different fields in order to discover future studies that might be of interest.



Faculty in The Honors Program are chosen in consultation with students. Besides being outstanding in their own fields, they have wide interests that extend to all areas of intellectual concern. They are considered exciting and stimulating teachers and sincere and involved human beings. Their rapport with their students is one of the main contributing factors in their dialogue in the seminar. Some of the disciplines presently represented on the Honors faculty are Art, English, History, Chemistry, Education, Philosophy, Black Studies, Political Science, Geography, and Psychology.






CROSS COUNTRY


Varsity Basketball


Golf


















COMMENCEMENT
