Mr. Zanfino has in his new capacity, expertly reported to the Board of Trustees all important issues and their surrounding situations so as to enable the Board to make as reasonable decisions as is humanly possible. A tremendous amount of gratitude is due Mr. Zanfino from the Board of Trustees on down to the student body whose education relies upon the efficient operation of this College.

Specialized Service at W.P.C. Administration

A man quite new within the Administration has been Mr. Bart Scudieri, the Director of Security. Many changes have taken place on campus since Mr. Scudieri's arrival for the purpose of protection. We hope that through his continued direction, Mr. Scudieri will make this campus security one of the finest systems in the state.

Mr. Robert Ruocco, as Head Clerk, is ever on the move, personally checking into situations surrounding projects and programs. He has his eye on every little detail, for he knows through experience that it isn't always the obvious that contains the problem.

Requests for print-out sheets is by far the largest work producer for Mr. Charles Jury. The Director of Computer Services supplies to all campus offices, the current student roster in any particular form needed, and also handles student grades. Mr. Jury cooperates with the computer courses offered by the Math Department by sharing the computer.



Mr. Dominic Lauricella, as Director of Field and Laboratory Experiences, attempts to coordinate the annual problem of Student Teaching and Practicum. Placing several hundred students each year in school systems that will meet the needs of the student teachers with reference to their own ideas of education is not the easiest job in the world. Mr. Lauricella's office is never slow due to the fact that once the college year is over, plans for the next year must be formulated and while the students are out in the schools there is a constant flow of problems and conflicts that find their way to his office.

At the end of every year the Placement Office takes on the assumed name of the Unemployment Office, as each semester the job market for teachers in this area becomes scarcer. For Mr. Joseph Gorab, the Director of Placement, the job of finding Kubla Kahn may have been a bit easier than attempting to find openings that don't exist. Assisting Mr. Gorab, but in a different area, is Ms. Lorraine Mika who handles non-teaching job employment. It is not too easy for Ms. Mika to sell our students to employers who have no idea of their capabilities, for this is a new area of William Paterson since its move towards a multi-purpose institution.

Once our students have graduated from this college, the administration attempts to keep its graduates informed of bappenings hack on campus. The correlation of this information is the responsibility of the Office of Alumni Affairs, directed by Mrs. Virginia Randall. Other aspects of her job entail Graduation, the Outstanding Senior Awards, and class reunions.

According to the feeling of most students on campus, the General Council is the closest structure to a democratic form of government at W.P.C. The Council is composed of the Executive Boards of the S.G.A. and the four classes, a representative of each chartered organization, and any student representative hy petition. What may appear to be equitable representation on paper is, in reality, a confusion. In order to have a meeting, a quorum must be met. Meetings that have not been cancelled due to a shortage of members, usually resulted in verbal outbursts of opinions, stifled expressions, and long arguments.

The major focus of the Council this year has been to revise the Constitution, a thirteen year-old document, so as to provide the student body with relevant guidelines and solutions to campus issues.

Some of the topics raised in the Council have been the search for a Co-Treasurer, chartering organizations, the shuttlebus service from the freshman parking lot, the legality of the previous S.G.A. election, and the financial matters of the Association. The Council's activities, this year, were topped off with the acceptance of the 1973-74 Budget, the S.G.A. elections, and the installation of the new officers.


















Varsity Squad Fielded


Fencers Win 15
