
On Saturday, October 6, the WPC Pioneers celebrated their annual Homecoming with a victory over Upsala 35-7.

Tau Kappa Epsilon, Delta Phi Epsilon and the Student Art Association were all winners in the float competition.













#### Edward Koch


















#### Charles Kuralt

Charles Kuralt, the award-winning CBS News correspondent, has been described by Time magazine as "the laureate of the common man," has covered world news, major United States events and the "little" stories of America's small towns and back roads during his more than 30 years as correspondent for CBS News. Kuralt is currently in his 12th season as anchor of the CBS News Program "Sunday Morning," and is also co-hosting, with Lesley Stahl, a new CBS News late-night venture, "America Tonight." Named "Broadcaster of the Year" in 1983 by the International Radio and Television Society, Kuralt has anchored numerous CBS documentaries and public affairs specials. He is the author of five books, including "On the Road with Charles Kuralt."



#### Robert H. Bork

Former federal appeals court judge Robert H. Bork delivered a lecture entitled "George Bush, Politics and the Constitution." A respected jurist, educator, and public servant, Bork has provided counsel to government, individuals and institutions for more than 35 years. In 1982, Bork was nominated by Ronald Regan to the position of Associate Justice of the Supreme Court. His nomination was denied confirmation after a highly publicized political debate. Bork is currently John Olin Scholar in Legal Studies at the American Enterprise Institute for Public Policy.



#### Joyce Carol Oates

Award-winning author Joyce Carol Oates, one of the country's most versatile serious writers, presented a selection of readings and reflections on her work. Oates is the author of more than 20 novels, 16 short story collections, nine volumes of poetry, four books of literary criticism, and three essay collections. Her most recent novel, Because It Is Bitter and Because It Is My Heart, was nominated for the National Book Award.
















### Holiday Party 1990

### Draft regulations differ from those of Vietnam era

20-year-olds to be first priority if draft instituted

As the war in the Persian Gulf enters its third week, the question many people, especially those within the college community, are asking is, "What about the draft?"

According to Public Law

"The president (with the approval of Congress) is authorized from time to time, whether or not a state of war exists, to select and induct into the Armed Forces of the United States for training and service in the manner provided in this law (including but not limited to selection and induction age groups) such manner

of persons as may be required to provide and maintain the strength of the Armed Forces."

While the amount of troops stationed in the sands of Saudi Arabia closes in on the half-million mark, many congressmen remain unwilling to discuss the issue of manpower.

"There were talks scheduled for February in Congress concerning whether or not the amount of troops in the gulf were sufficient. However, the talks were cancelled when it appeared that the topic was too hot to handle," said Bill Jones, a reporter for The New Federalist, a Washington newspaper.

The Selective Service System, which is responsible for

supplying manpower through the induction process (draft), already has established guidelines in the event of a draft.

According to a January 1990 document which outlined mobilization procedures, the induction process would be as follows:

"The first step in the resumption of inductions would be to hold a lottery drawing, based on dates of birth, to determine the order in which men would be called for induction. A man is in first priority for a possible draft during the calendar year of his 20th birthday. The next year he drops into the second priority category and men born the year after he was born move into the first priority group. Each succeed-

ing year he drops into a lower priority group until he has his 26th birthday, at which time generally he is over the age of liability for the draft."

Some, however, caution that although these regulations are fairly recent and updated they may change if and when the draft is enacted.

"There are some regulations now and some that would be put into place," said Jim Lafferty, a New York lawyer specializing in draft law.

Included in the draft regulations set forth by the Selective Service System are a number of deferrals, postponements, and exemptions under which a man of draftable age may fall. Two situations include conscientious SEE DRAFT, PAGE 3





Madonna, America's premier material girl, was red hot with hit after hit on the charts. Her albums, costumes and movies combined to keep her front and center in the public's attention.
