WPC GRAD NAMED DIRECTOR OF ALUMNI

Ms. Nancy H. Thompson has been named Acting Director of Development and Alumni Affairs at William Paterson College. Confirmation of her appointment is expected at the February meeting of the WPC Board of Trustees.

Her duties will include directing all alumni efforts and alumni-sponsored activities, and overseeing all alumni publications. She will also act as a liaison between the alumni association and the college administration.

A 1974 graduate of William Paterson College, Ms. Thompson has served since February of 1975 as the college's Assistant Director of Career Counseling and Placement. She received her master's of education from WPC in 1975.

Ms. Thompson said one of her first priorities in the new position will be to develop an alumni counseling and placement service to assist all WPC graduates.

"We want to strengthen the ties between the college and all our former students", Ms. Thompson said. "We intend to let our alumni know we can work for them as much as they can work to help us," Thompson said.

"We also plan on establishing alumni rates for all college sporting and entertainment events to show we're willing to work collectively to continue their involvement in college life at WPC".

While attending WPC, Ms. Thompson was senior class president and given the college's Outstanding Senior Award presented annually by the Alumni Association. She was also named Senior of the Year by her classmates, and selected to "Who's Who In American Colleges and Universities".

Ms. Thompson is a member of several professional organizations including: the American College Personnel Association, the National Vocational Guidance Association and the American Personnel and Guidance Association. She lives in Montvale.

CLASS 1964 SURVEYED

A follow up survey of the Class of 1964 was conducted by Narda R. Kearney, Director of the Career Counseling and Placement Office at William Paterson College. Of the 508 questionnaires mailed out to alumni, 303 (59.6%) were returned.

The primary objective was to elicit responses as to whether or not William Paterson College graduates were willing to help fellow graduates in finding employment. The response was disappointing in that it did not support the "old school tie" concept of alumni paving the way for future graduates. Only 43.3% of those responding to the survey were willing to be supportive.

Some 41% of the respondents are attending or had attended graduate or professional schools since 1964. This is a decrease from 69% of the Class of 1963 reporting further educational training.

The survey of the employment activity of the Class of 1964 presented a more favorable employment outlook than was anticipated. Some additional responses of interest are as follows:

HALEDON HALL NAMED STATE HISTORIC SITE

A 19th century William Paterson College building has been recognized as a state historic site by the Department of Environmental Protection's State Review Committee for Historic Sites.

Haledon Hall, the 100-year old campus building, was once the hub of social and political functions in Paterson during the early 1900's, when occupied by the family of the 24th Vice President of the United States, Garret Hobart.

In conjunction with the college's ongoing bicentennial activities, the WPC Bicentennial Historic Site Committee, chaired by Mr. Ron McArthur, researched the historical significance of Haledon Hall, formerly known as Hobart Manor House.

Having escaped destruction and the massive renovations that other such buildings have undergone, the campus structure stands as one of the best remaining "Victorian castles" in the Paterson area. Buildings of this style were once popular in northern New Jersey.

Haledon Hall now houses the college's registration, admission, academic advisement and alumni offices among others. The interior still reflects its past grandeur with numerous structural evidences of a 19th century upper class home.

Most of WPC's campus grounds were once part of the Hobart family's estate, Alisa Farms, which was purchased by the state in 1948 for \$200,000.

Haledon Hall is now being considered for recognition as a national historic site by the National Park Service in Washington, D.C.

The college Bicentennial Committee has asked the state for funding to restore some of the refurbished parts of the building to their former appearance.
