Opposite the White House in Washington ,D.C., is Lafayette Square -- a park cornered by monuments. On its south side are a row of buildings, old and new, along Northwest Madison Place. Included in this row is the large U.S.O. Building, and up from it, at No. 23, four buildings from the corner of NW H.St., is an old mansion, very much run down and in considerable disrepair. Its beautiful iron grill balcony and ornate architecture mark it as early Century. On its brick foundation is a dirty, unkept bronze marker before which is a little courtyard hemmed around by a rusting, dilapidated wrought iron fence. This three-story mansion, omee a lady of resolute dignity that played hostess for a nation and the world in the days of giants, is still known today as "Little White House", but mostly only to the bronze marker, the placque, once polished and gleaming. To most of those who pass it daily, it is but an old, run down house with some branches of federal offices occupying occasionally a few of its vast, empty rooms, filled with ghests.

But the bronze placque, like a silent sentinel the past protesting the the streets --its present, protectingly perserveres amid/Twentieth Century/footsteps and carbon monoxide-- that once here eyes centered:
