

#### es E. Berson, Profes Li. Breithaupi Tells of Sea Duty

3 November 1945

3 November 1945 Dear Miss Trainor, The "flashlight" and your wel-The 'flashlight' and your wel-come letter arrived today some-where at sea in the middle of a Jap mine field. Was more than happy to receive both, for since leaving Okle in August our mail has been a bit fouled up. No one seems to bother about finding out where the ships are actually located before they hastily scrib ble a port on the sack ticket and send it off. We have been out at the general location of 31 North and 127 East for ten days. The first nine were spent in the spent check sweep. If all goes well, we shall be on our way home to Sasebo tomorrow night at this I'm hoping. The present time field is one which we worked on during August before the end of the war. Channels became number one priority when we returned to Okie which is the reason for the late recumption of work here. After this is over I don't know where we shall go. The Nips laid plenty of eggs in

these waters and our mine clearance program isn't supposed to officially end until the 31st of March next year. Of course some task force will be sent back before then, but don't know yet if the 240 will be among them. We hope for that also, since we have been going steadily for a year now without any rest or repairs. The old engines are due to drop into the bilges momentarily. The first seven momentarily. The first seven days out here were a pop off. The sea was very rough and you had your heart in your mouth for fear that you wouldn't see a floater before you came sallying over the top of a wave to meet it in the trough. These good old "DT's were with us again. However it smoothed off nicely and we have been going great gums making four passes across the line every day. Something new has been added in that we anchored at night. Most of the East China Sea is less than 1 fathom. The rough nights were bad on the sleep. The old bus would get down in the trough would have to sleep and -you spreadeagled between the bulk-

head and any handy brace. Homesick Because of Weather. The days are pleasantly cool just like good old football weather back home, which makes us all the more homesick. Need I say that we are all sick home now, and are quite burned up at having to sweep up for these little yellow so and The channel sweeps weren't had the channel sweeps weren't bed. We had to do that. The mines we laid are being done by the smeller sweeps with special so.r. Small as we are we're too big to go in after them. The ship is changing radically. Most of our high point men have gone back to the states for discharge including our former captain. With so many new faces the ship seems strange. All our plank owners are gone or nearly so God knows when we single fellows will ever get out. If you aren't married you don't stand a ghost of a chance. The army men with the same point system would still be in Europe I guess.

The 700-acre campus has modern brick class buildings and dormitories. Brig. Gen. Claude M. Thiele, commandant, has cut Army regulations to the minimum to permit students to conon studies while German prisoners perform most of the housekeeping duties.

The last few typhoons caused a great deal of ships to be beached and a great deal of salvage work is necessary to out them back in operation. At the end of this week I'm organizing basketball teams on the ship to play one another. The fellows

25 October, 1945

Dear Miss Tiffany,

This very minute I am sitting in the dining room of a very fine English home listening to Chopin on the radio while wait for Bessle, the maid to bring the soup which I don't want but will accept with my best smile. How I came to be here is a result of the Army's soldier training program in civilian agencies. You have probably read about it in the paper.

I was fortunate enough to be selected from my unit to attend the University of Sheffield in Sheffield, England. I will be here until Docember 17, if not longer. I am studying botany under a very congenial atmos-phere. After praising the French hospitality for a year, I will now start on the English. In the case of the English it is much more effective because I understand English better than I can French. You will note that I said I can understand English retter and that I did not say that I can speak English better. To be quite frank after hearing such good English spoken I don't exactly know what I speak.)

Since the Army does not have any camps near by, those of us who go to school live with civilians. I am very fortunate in that I live with one of the finest families in Sheffield, Their kindness and hospitality is over-whelming. They have all kinds of contacts and through them I am invited everywhere, I have to be quite firm in refusing invitations so as not to allow my studies to suffer. I'm really a guest of a cirv.
