WILLIAM PATERSON UNIVERSITY HISTORY

William Paterson University, one of nine New Jersey state colleges and universities, is named for the Revolutionary War patriot and early New Jersey statesman, William Paterson. It is a comprehensive public university offering courses at the undergraduate and graduate levels. The University's five colleges offer 30 baccalaureate and 19 master's degree programs, as well as teacher certification programs at the undergraduate and graduate levels.

Founded in 1855 as a teacher-training institution in the City of Paterson, the University relocated to its present campus, now 370 acres, in Wayne Township in 1951. The campus was the former family estate of Garrett A. Hobart, 24th Vice-President of the United States under William McKinley.

On June 27, 1997, William Paterson was granted University status. This change in status and the Future Search Conference in 1997 were departure points for developing a new mission statement, which was approved by the Board of Trustees on February 21, 1998. Subsequently, the following new degree programs were added: Latin American Studies (B.A.), Applied Clinical Psychology (M.A.), Educational Leadership (M.Ed.), Fine Arts (M.F.A.), History (M.A.), Music (M.M.), Sociology (M.A.), and Public Policy (M.A.). In 2001, the University's accreditation was reaffirmed by the Middle States Commission on Higher Education. The University also received the largest donation in its history, from Christos Cotsakos, '73, chairman of E*TRADE; Tami Cotsakos, '71; and E*TRADE in 2001. In September 2002, the University opened a new 150,000 square foot academic building at 1600 Valley Road in Wayne, increasing its academic and academic support facilities by 25 percent. In December 2002, the late Russ Berrie, founder, chairman, and chief executive officer of Russ Berrie and Company, Inc., pledged to invest up to \$5 million over five years to establish the Russ Berrie Institute for Professional Selling at the University.




















WILLIAM PATERSON UNIVERSITY ALUMNI RESIDING IN THE U.S. BY STATE OF RESIDENCE



Starting in Fall 1994, full-time undergraduate students were charged a flat rate per semester, including fees. Full-time is defined as 12 or more credits. In-state undergraduates with fewer than 12 credits are charged \$205 per credit (including fees), and out-of-state undergraduates are charged \$330 per credit (including fees) for the 2002-03 academic year. Graduate students continue to be charged tuition and fees on a per credit basis.

The 2002-03 undergraduate tuition and fee charge for full-time undergraduates who are New Jersey residents is \$6,400. For non-resident undergraduates, it is \$10,200.

As of Fall 2002, there are 2,299 undergraduate and graduate resident hall spaces available on campus.

GSS is Garden State Scholar; GD is Garden State Distinguished Scholar; US is Urban Scholar; and PTB is a free public tuition benefit program for students attending a state college who are children of firemen or police officers slain in the line of duty; OSRP is Outstanding Scholars Recruitment Program.

WP-TAG grants are offered by the University to TAG recipients to offset tuition increases above the FY96 Appropriations Act maximum from which the neediest TAG students must be held harmless.

WP-OSG grants were a one-time offering by the University to Fall 1995 enrolled out-of-state students (including those who entered in Fall 1995) to defray tuition increases. Awards are renewable until graduation, provided the student continues uninterrupted full-time attendance.

ACADEMIC INDEX COMPUTATION


The Academic Index (AI) is used as one of the criteria for admission. It is calculated by using the following formula:

Academic Index = SAT (Verbal+Math)/10 + Converted HS Rank (listed below). If a student's best SAT scores are 450 & 500 and she is in the 68th percentile of her high school class her Academic Index is 203: 450 + 500 = 950/10 = 95 + 108 (the converted rank) = 203.

HOW TO REACH WILLIAM PATERSON UNIVERSITY

•FROM ROUTE 23:

Take Alps Road exit (Wayne). (From Route 23 North: exit directly onto Alps Road. From Route 23 South: proceed to stop sign; make a right onto Alps Road.) Proceed approximately 2 miles to the traffic light at intersection of Alps and Ratzer Roads. Turn extreme right onto Ratzer and proceed approximately 2 miles to the traffic light at the intersection of Ratzer Road and Hamburg Turnpike. After crossing intersection, Ratzer becomes Pompton Road. Proceed about 200 yards. University entry gates 4 through 1 are on left along Pompton Road.

•FROM NORTHERN NEW JERSEY VIA GARDEN STATE PARKWAY:

Take the Garden State Parkway South to exit 159, Route 80 West. Proceed to Route 23 North. *See directions from Route 23.

•FROM NEW YORK CITY VIA GEORGE WASHINGTON BRIDGE OR LINCOLN TUNNEL, OR FROM EASTERN NEW JERSEY:

Take either Route 46 West, 80 West or 3 West. Proceed to Route 23 North. *See directions from Route 23.



•FROM SOUTHERN AND CENTRAL NEW JERSEY VIA GARDEN STATE PARKWAY:

Take Garden State Parkway North to Exit 153B (on left), marked Route 3 and 46, West Paterson. Take Route 3 to Route 46 West. Proceed to Route 23 North. *See directions from Route 23.

•FROM WESTERN NEW JERSEY:

Take Route 46 East to Route 23 North. Or, take Route 80 East to Exit 54 (Minnisink Road). Turn right to access Route 46 West. Proceed to Route 23 North. *See directions from Route 23.

•FROM ROUTE 208:

Take Ewing Ave./Franklin Lakes exit. (From 208 North: proceed to stop sign, make a left onto Ewing. From 208 South: proceed to stop sign, make a right onto Ewing.) Proceed to end of Ewing Avenue. Turn left onto High Mountain Road. Continue approximately one mile to fork. Take right fork onto Belmont Avenue and proceed approximately two miles to second traffic light. Turn right onto Pompton Road. Proceed up hill approximately one-half mile. University entry gates I through 4 are on right along Pompton Road.

•PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION:

Public transportation to the University is available from surrounding areas. NJ Transit buses 746 and 744 run directly to the University. For further information on bus service, call I-800-626-7433.
