




## Choose Ossi, Trinks, Nickells, Pitea To Organize Intra-Frat Council

### Wilson Confesses

The text of Mr. Wilson's lecture is entitled "Confessions of a Columnist." It will consist of anecdotes, stories . . . dreams of them . . . about the problems of a Broadway columnist in gathering the news that the public likes to read . . . the difficulties of carrying on a conversation with Groucho Marx . . . interviewing Gabor in a revolving door . . . covering a convention of radioads . . . and many other interesting and amusing experiences.

### Newspaperman

Earl Wilson has been a newspaperman for almost a quarter of a century. A native of Rockford, Ohio, educated at Heidelberg College and Ohio State University, he started out on the *Plain Dealer* as a sports columnist and moved next to the *Alaska Beacon-Journal*, where he covered state politics. He then distinguished himself on the *Washington Post* by seeking an interview with Geronimo, which almost cost him his job. In 1925 he made the big jump to the *New York Post*, where for seven years he wrote features and worked on the re-write desk. In 1942 he became editor of the amusement section and began his career as a night-line columnist which has since earned him an international reputation and an award from the Headliners Club.

era. The former team was one of the best college teams in this area and the new team will be trying its best to uphold this tradition.
