Nila Magidofr, who captivated P.S.C. students last semester with her sparkling wit and an account of her many exciting exper iences, will again speak here on Tuesday, January 12 in the Memorial Gymnasium. She will recount more of her fascinating adventures a that time.

Mrs. Magidoff, heroine of the best seller Nila, is the wife of former NRC correspondent. Robert Magidoff, whose broadcasts from Moscow all America clung to during the war years. She came to America alone at the outbreak of World War II, did a magnificent job speaking at War Bond rallies from Madison Square Garden to the Rose Bowl, and is now one of our most enthusiastic and patriotic citizens.

During her years in Russia, Mrs. Magidoff led many lives. her schooling she went to Moscow where she designed clothes, worked in factories, explored the wilds of Central Asis, traveled around Europe as a Merchant Marine Sailor Third Class, and became an author and a noted Moscow newspaper woman. The amazing thing out Mrs. Magidoff is that in spite of her life of poverty, hard work, even exile, she retained her energy, vivacity, and, above all, her irrepressible sense of humar.

After Mrs. Magidoff was married she received nermission to come to the United States. Here became a citizen and then went back to Moscow and rejoined war correspondent husband In 1948 they left Russia when Mr. Magidoff was excelled on trumped up charges of spying on behalf of the U.S.A. Mrs. Magidori revisited Russiz in the fall of 1958 to compare the living conditions there now with what they were ten years ago. Her friend and travelling companion Willie Snow Eth ridge is writing a book on their experiences; it will be entitled Russian Duet.

NILA MAGIDOFF TO RETURN; APPROVED EXPANSION PROGRAM **BEGINS AT PATERS ON STATE**

Dr. Cleve O. Westby, Co-ordinator of State College Construction representing the New Jersey De partment of Education, met with Paterson State College heads recently to discuss and plan the priority of servicements for the building program voted in the College Bond Issue of November 3

Attending the planning session were Dr. Marion F. Shea, the deans, and department chairmen. A preliminary meeting of the college heads and representatives of the State Board of Education and other State officials was held in Trenton prior to this meeting. All buildings authorized by the voter approval earlier this month will not be started at the same time. The current series of meetings has as its purpose the developing of priority requirements to fit the needs of the existing and proposed programs of the Colleges

LOANS HELP STUDENTS Pioneer Players

Thirty student loans amounting a total of \$10,325 have been awarded this semester to Paterson State College students under the National Defense Education Act -Sindents Loan Program. An additional \$10,075 has been committed by the college to 28 students. It is anticipated that before the end of the scademic year, 1959-1960, a total of 75 students will be made by Paterson State College, amount-Assembly Singing ing to approximately \$26,000.

The National Defense Student Loan Program established W25 under Title II of Public Lew 85-884, designated as the "National and a fee of twenty-live cents for The Chansonettes Defense Education Act of 1958." Paterson State College is one of more than 1.500 institutions Shaw higher education participating in Chorus this program.

The purpose of the student loan program is to help institution of higher education to make "lowinterest loans to students of need to pursue their courses of

study. . . The law requires that each borrower be a full-time undergraduate or graduate student, that he be in need of the amount of his loan to pursue his courses of study, and that he be, in the opinion of his institution, capable of maintaining Handel good standing in his choses courses Combined Groups of study. Under State law the Director of the Decision of Purchase Property is responsible for the se lection of architects, approval of plans, the awarding of contracts, her relation of construction and the acceptance of the buildings for the State. His authority in these respects is qualified in that the Department of Education must indicate its approval of plans, award of contract and the work performed.

uresent library on the Haladon-Wayne campus dates approximately 50,000 books. The standards for college collections of the American Library Association call for 50,000 volumes as the rack-bottom for a college of 600 strients. The Association recommends 10,000 more volumes for each additional 200 students. Assistant Director - Toni Kowai Paterson State new has 1,880 students and plans to expand to 2,000 by 1965. The addition to the library is planned to bring the facility close to the recommended size for anticipated enrollment.


