Approximately 400 students attended the ceremonies which terminated with a band performance by the maintenance men's band in the new snack bar. The annual Christmas tree lighting ceremony on the lawn opened the afternoon's program.

The main entrance to the new building was decorated as a Christmas gift with green paper and silver ribbon. A 5 by 12 foot seasonal greetings card and Christmas

Miss Greenaway will be interred at Rosedale Cemetery, Orange at 3:30 p.m. this afternoon. Friends among faculty and students wishing to attend the funeral should make arrangements with instructors.


Campus Musical Groups Slate Christmas Program

Members of the Student Education Association of Paterson State including Pauline Flynn, Faith Schlosser, Mina Demarest, Madeline Ernest, Carol Sisco, Ellen Bowles, Carol Ann Mulrooney and Marie Entwistle along with Mrs. Ruth Evans Fern, advisor to the group, attended the conference.

The keynote address was delivered by Mr. Richard W. Carrigan, director of Student NEA. In discussing his topic, "The Challenge of Change," Mr. Carrigan said, "If things are to move forward, someone must be ready to take the first step." He also emphasized that teaching is a "big business" and an important business.

Mrs. Fern acted as consultant for the group on the Code of Professional Ethics. Pauline Flynn was chairman of the group which explored the Role of Student NEA in our professional preparation.

Dr. George J. Turner of Seton Hall delivered the closing address on "The Teacher As A Counselor." Dr. Turner stated, "Teachers must love to learn, love to communicate, and love those who receive the communication."

Representatives of fifteen colleges in New Jersey, which have active SEA chapters, participated in five discussion groups.

ON THE BOWL GAMES

Although Rutgers University did not entertain a major bid, the bowl games will survive. But whether or not they should survive is another story.

Some people criticize Ohio State's faculty for refusing a bid to the Rose Bowl, but in athletic policies the line must be drawn somewhere. There was a time when the Rose Bowl, the most glamorous of the post-season attractions, was the only bowl game played. But along came the Cotton, Sugar, and Orange Bowls. This I feel is where the line should have been drawn. We cannot blame Ohio State's faculty for the refusal, nor can we blame the administrations of Notre Dame or Rutgers. I feel the bowl game situations have gotten far out of hand, and I am waiting with anxious anticipation for the arrival of the Cereals and Salad Bowls.

Don't get me wrong, I have just as much enthusiasm regarding the football frays as the next guy. But I do not think the post-season bowl game situation is a healthy one. In addition to the January 1 classics previously mentioned, we have the Bluebonnet, Sun, Gator, Liberty, Gotham, and National Trophy bowls, played on either December 30 or December 16.

A bowl game has a certain amount of glamour attached to it, but the appearance of too many of them, I feel, detracts from this glamour and lends a not-too-special attitude toward the classics. A run down on the top four with predictions are:

Indians Top Pioneer In Season Opener

Paterson State's basketball team made an unsuccessful debut last Friday night as it dropped an 83-72 game to Montclair State before a capacity crowd of more than 800 in Municipal Gymnasium. This ended Paterson's three-game winning streak over Montclair.

The Pioneers jumped off to a 7-2 lead in the first period and lead most of the first half on the strength of Don Duin's fine play under the boards and Jack Padalino's timely baskets. However, in

the closing minutes of the half, the Indians ran off straight points and sent the Pioneers to their half-time break a seven point deficit.

When the second half opened, Pete Capitano, Montclair's guard was the take-charge leader leading the Indians to victory. Down seven points at the half, Pioneers could come no closer than 53-52 in the third period, at which time Montclair ran off six straight points, holding the lead for the remainder of the game. Capitano led the scoring parade with impressive 34-point total, while Richie Trexler kept the Pioneers in contention with 18 points.

Undoubtedly, the difference in the game rested on the fact that while Montclair converted 40 of 47 attempts, Paterson made only 19 of 37. Certainly, the star performer in the contest was Capitano. The transfer student from Boston College, scored most half his points from the line and the other half on fine lay-ups. The inability on part of Paterson State's defense to check-out after shots were also aided the Montclair cause - Paterson State's junior varsity team dropped their opener, Montclair by a 63-50 score.

Flying Bolsheviks Crush Maoists

CHICAGO, ILL. (UPS) - Cheered on by throngs of placard-waving politicians, the Flying Bolsheviks of the University of Chicago crushed Wisconsin's Maoist Maulers 34-0.

Rival cheerleaders evoked the shades of Kautsky, Luxemborn, Trotsky and Stalin as they spurred their teams on to ever greater efforts. A grey-haired woman spectator wearing tennis shoes commented, "It's nice that the younger generation of campus radicals has such a feel for tradition."

The Bolshevik quarterback was confident before the game began. He pointed out that the opposition was "really demoralized about the desecration of Stalin's tomb." Bolshevik cheerleaders contributed their bit by chanting, "We shall disintegrate you."

The Maoist rooting section responded with cries of "Six hundred million can't be wrong," and "Crush the Khrushchevites."

At half-time, an attempt was made to form a united front, and the two teams joined in singing "The People's Flag." However, the inevitable factionalism broke through the thin veneer of working class solidarity.

Discussing his team's success, a member of the Bolsheviks commented, "With their buccolic bourgeois government up there they were expectedly weaker. Coming from a strong proletarian atmosphere, we had a natural advantage which we never lost. If our environments were reversed, we would still have won, however, because we cheat."

After the game ended, the two teams did manage to display an unusual solidarity as they joined in two renditions of the "Internationale." The first was sung to the tune of the "Marine Hymn," the second to the conventional melody, "The Maroon."

A Capella Choir To Perform At All-State Festival

The A Capella Choir of Paterson State under the direction of Mrs. Elizabeth Shine, will participate in the All-State College Music Festival on Sunday, March 25, at the Montclair State campus. During the first half of the program, which is the first of its kind in the state, the PSC choir will render several selections. The choir will participate in the second half in unison with the combined choruses of the other six state college groups.

Dr. Harvey Wilson, chairman of the department of music at Montclair, will direct the combined singing groups. The program is expected to begin at 8:00 p.m.

A. Resis Named President Of AAUP Chapter
