Dungan Speaks at President's Forum

managed to appear before a body of students, faculty, and administrators on Wednesday, January 14. The meeting was saited to present the role of the State Department of Higher Education in college governance.

Chancellor Dungan opened the meeting with an apology for his scheduled appearances, which had been cancelled. He then outlined briefly the governance of education in New Jersey.

According to the Chancellor. State-wide planning of public addesition in New Jersey is relatively new. He added that New Jersey is coming into higher ediscution in a big way because it has entered a "third generation coordination system." He feels that governance of this and other mathutions of education is by and large the responsibility of the Administration, the board of Trustees, the faculty, and the students. The State Board generally does not govern, but coordinates and sets standards.

Dungan asked if he would

of Higher Education student on the Board of Trustees. Chancellor Dungan replied that he would, but added that the vacancy must be filled by a woman who is not a resident of freigen or Passaic county. He estimated that the average annual income of each member of the Paterson State Board of Trustees is ten to fifteen thousand dollars. The Chancellor found nothing objectionable with the present PSC Board of Trustees.

Once student asked what Chastellor Dungan does. The Chancellor replied that lie (a) appears before many meetings and that (b) his official position is to represent the interests of the State Board of Higher Education.

On the subject of unifying the Student Government Associations throughout the State, the Chancellor said he favored the idea, and said the idea had been discussed with the SGAs of various colleges.

I don't care if Bette Davis and Ethel Barrymore did play in it. They may be forgiven for being associated with this travesty, but they will, hopefully not be remembered for it. The sector is old and outdated. I'm not merely condemning it because of its age but because it shows its age so blatantly, Flamlet, Faustus, and Anagone were all written long pefore Com is Green, yet they me not as old as Corn is Green. Repession: Black Panthers

The Black Panther Party is the vanguard of the movement of black people who are relusing to submit to genocide. The Panthers have demanded what their people need - land, bread, housing, education, clothing, justice, and peace. But the power sturcture and its government will never grant this. The Black Pantber Party is therefore organizing the black colony in this country for these ends, for self-defense, and for political power.

The past two years have seen an unparalleled wave of repression directed against the Panthers. The tools being used to suppress the Panthers by that gooveling pig Nixon and his running dogs, Hog Hoover and Oink Mitchell, are identical to those measures which ushcred in the first stages of the Fascist state in Nazi Germany murder, imprisonment, and exile.

Most people know that many Panthers have been murdered in the last two years, and that many more have been imprisoned. The list reads like the Black Panther All-Star team. Huey P. Newton, co-founder of the Party and Minister of Defense, is currently serving a prison term of up to fifteen years. Bobby Seals, co-founder and Chairman of the Party, is serving a four year term on 16 charges of contempt of court growing out of the Conspiracy trial in Chicago. Edridge Cicaver, Minister of Information is in exile in Algeria. David Hilliard, Panther Chief-of-Staff, was jailed for suggesting, last month, that Pig R. Nixon be killed - not a bad piece of advice.

Fred Hampton, Chairman of the Illinois Black Panther Party was facing a prison term for allegedly stealing ice cream bars and giving them to neighborhood children. The ice cream man who testified against Chairman Fred swore that Hampton simultaneously stomped on his chest and tried to choke him, a physical impossibility. Hampton was found guilty (what else?) and was sentenced to a minimum of two years. Last week, Hampton was assassinated in his sleep by Duley's Gestapo, Martin Sostre, a New York freedom fighter, after spending 13 months confined to a 6-by 8 foot cell, now faces an additional 41 years in jail on a framed-up dope charge. Ahmend Evans, from Cleveland, has been sentenced to die in the electric chair, even though the D.A. admitted to the all-white jury that There is no direct evidence that Evens killed anybody. The list of other Panthers murdered on imprisoned goes on. All told, at least 28 Panthers have been murdered since January 1968: dozens more have been imprisoned, many others have been harassed by the pigs; at least one is in exile.

While all this goes on, the so-called "liberal" white politicians who claim to advocate equal rights for all black people have never once had the courage to stand up and assail Fascist AmeriKKKa and its geneeidal assaults against the black race in this country - and particularly against the Black Panther Party

Pig Nixon (no doubt, one of my critics will reply to this article by pointing out that he knows for a fact that Nixon's parents had human features so how couls they possibly have a son who's a pig) and the other rooting and snorting oinkers in Washington would have an orgasm of delight if the Panthers could be entirely wiped out. Although the dozens of murders and imprisonments have, undeniably, hurt the Panthers, the government is dead wrong (it died

According to the committee. one of the reasons for the change was the criticism emanating from the Middle State Association their evaluation team requirements was present.

The current liberal studies program, revised in 1968, is based on the premise that a teacher training candidate needs certain areas of knowledge to become a "well rounded teacher," curriculum committee felt that since PSC is no tonger a teacher training institution, the requirements must be changed.

The semester hour requirement in the new liberal studies program is 36 semester hours the six additional hours would come from three hours each in English Composition and physical education (two semesters at 1 Visemester hours per semester) This would also permit greater concentration in the area of a student's major areas.

Speaking of errors... Dr. Montgomery came out of his womb-like office last week like an innocent babe from a warm crib, and returned like a beleagured boxer after a graelling bout.

The Dean stopped at Pioneer Hall Tuesday in his first open contact with the student body since his political purge of the student personnel department. What Montgomery encountered was a mass of angry students demanding, aside from his resignation, explanations of his conduct which many thought was professionally unethical, morally unfounded, and totally devoid of the integrity a Deanship demands.

What the Dean did is to demonstrate once again not only his ignorance, but his total disconcern for the students and their problems. He is so horribly Inscriptive, so dishearteningly disinterested in the students, one ean hardly find any parallels between the former Dean of Students, Grace Scully, and Dr. Montromery. I suppose the most obvious difference is the fact Dr. South was trusted and liked by most students. Dr. Scully will be the topic of a later column, so we'll return to Pioneer flall.

Montgomery was warned several times, the dormitories are highly volatile; and the potential an explosion after Mrs. Cordon, the present domi director, leaves on February 15. The tensions in Pioneer Hall have never been slight, both between the races and between the sexes. Dr. Montgomery exhibited a gross, inexcusable ignorance of the situation. Perhaps if he had called monthly departmental meetings as ordered by the Faculty Senate last year, Dean of Students would have some idea how students felt and what students wanted. Rather, he fired his eyes and ears. That leaves few prominent parts of the body for Montgomery to play. Questions were raised regarding the method by which Dr. Montgomery was appointed. As the questions continued, a conspiratorial plot sounced to unfold including Montgomery, Olsen, and the Board of Trustees. The fact Dr. Scully was fired on a Thursday, and the Board, not known for its swiftness, approved of Montgomery on Monday leads one to believe the students have been duped. There is no reason to believe the lies, the the ctroum ventions, transgressions, the deceptions have ceased. Montgomery was originally brought in only as a consultant for President Olsen on student personnel matters - and ended up staying on as the Dean. The fact there was no student consultation, no consultation with the other members of the student personnel department, no gudants on campus, no union We proper able harm in the people available, seems to fit into

Montgomery's misrepresentation to the student personnel department, or the Board approved Olsen's appointment too hastily. In any event, the wrong man was undeniably chosen. It should be noted however, Mrs. Gordon stood up for the rights of students. At that Monday night meeting of the Board, she demanded students be consulted first before Montgomery appointed.

The mistrust, the low esteem the SGA and the student body in general has for Montgomery is common knowledge. It would be a strange contradition indeed to expect a student to trust someone who has transgressed so omnipotently within their purview

To top everything else, Dr Montgomery Wednesday night advised students in Heritage Hall to consciously violate the laws of the State of New Jersey! For this shameful act alone, the man should resign and apologize. But Montgomery has not the scruples for that either. The question arose concerning the legalization of alcoholie beverages in the dormitories. Liquor present in any domitory at any college. Its suppression is impossible. Responding to a student's request that he look into amending the law making liquor illegal on college property, Montgomery said it would be easier and less complex merely to break the law! The audacity, the gall, the disconcern of the man as reflected through this act is inexcusable! Any educator who could conciously advise students to break the law is a traitor to the students, a disgrace to his profession, and a shame to this college. To The People of the Doms:

Ouestions Answered

How long will a qualified man actually be exposed to the draft now?

For one year; that is, 1970. But not necessarily for a full 12 months, if he becomes draft-eligible sometime during the year. Anyone who is I-A at the end of 1970 - when all of the priority numbers for the year have been called - will be home free if his number has not come up, even though he entered the draft pool in April, or July, or even as late as December. If a student's deferment runs out when he graduates in June, he will stay vulnerable to the draft only until December 31, 1970. Then if 1-A and not drafted, he has completed his expessere and can forget about the draft, except in case of national einergency.

is a graduate student with an early priority number likely to be called now?

Probably not before next June, at the earliest. Local draft boards are being advised to call up most graduate students in the order set by their lottery number, but to postpone actual induction until the end of the academic year next June, in most cases. Only medical, dental, and other students in health-related courses stal got graduate deforments, and they are subject to special draft ratis later.

This present law expires in mid-1971. Drastic changes, such as the end of college deferments. will be ambated next year.

Loans Available for Students

Paterson State College has reached a level of Financial aid comparable to other state colleges according to Dominic Bacollo, Coordinator of Financial Aid. It is felt by many that this college has lagged behind in this area in the past. Several sources have pointed out that government spending on the war has lessened the availability of funds.

It is estimated that Paterson State College students receive a total of nearly one million dollars financial aid from eight different programs. The administrators and staff of the college determine which people receive the \$375,000.00 that PSC has sole control over,

It is stressed by the Financial aid Staff that everyone with a genuine need can obtain a loan. All qualified applicants will receive as much aid as is possible.

Students who do not live at home and support themselves should not file a Parent's Confidential Statement, Instead they must file a student confidential statement and apply directly to the Financial Aid Office. In some cases a student may not receive enough money to pay for tuition and deferment of payments can be arranged.

From the President's Desk

The College has been informed by the Committee on Institutions of Higher Education of the Middle States Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools that Middle States has voted to defer action on the reaffirmation of the accreditation of the College until the fall of 1971. Since the accreditation of Patersion State is a subject of concern for the entire campus community, I am presenting the test of the letter as follows:

Pollowing its review of the report prepared by its Evaluation Committee, the Commission voted to defer action on the reaffirmation of the accorditation of Paterson State College until the fall of 1971.

As a follow up, the Commission would like you to submit a general progress report by October 1, 1971. It is the intention of the Commission to schedule a visit following this report.

The Commission, its Chairman and its Executive Secretary stand ready to assist Paterson State in any appropriate way at any time.

In the Middle States team report, it was stated that the primary concern of Paterson State for the next two years should be to develop the principles and practices of professionally responsible self-government and self-evaluation and a master plan for the college. In effect, Middle States was taking note of the period of transition in which the College now finds itself. We are working with a Board of Trustees and a Faculty Senate, both in relative infancy in their development. Both of these hodies are in the process of constant said evaluation and reflection as to their precise roles and functions.

Moreover, the student body now finds itself with a greatly expanded voice in the general governance of the college as a result of decisions by both faculty and administration and the Board, which were discussed here last

We have begun work on the master plan, through the functioning of the College Master Planning Council.

The objectives recommended by Middle States call for a codification of the policies and procedures of the institution in the form of a constitution or charter, with bylaws or statutes.

Fulfilling these aims will require dedication and enthusiasm from all segments of the campus population, and I look forward to the campus-wide cooperation that will be vital between now and 1971.

At the present time, two PSC students are involved with the program they compile data in choperation with minumity groups and the Inner City Committee for Action, and they attend the meetings of the various community groups involved in the Model Cities Program. Funds for their research are provided through the college work-study program.

A plan similar to the proposed Model Cities program is currently

program, Spanish speaking high school students act as part-time classroom aides and interpreters in the lower grades. The students are paid \$1.50 an hour for this work, and in addition to providing pocket money, the students gain self-respect and are encouraged to continue their own education

Currently the PSC model cities program is in the planning stage, and no definite program or calendar of events has yet been established. One program being considered by the various community groups is a tutorial program from the first to the third grade. This would hopefully involve PSC students with a knowledge of Spanish, and would cut down on the number of future

dropouts, Another program would involve the construction of a bi-lingual center for the intorna of high-school dropouts.

Dr. Ward described the trustration of Spanish speaking children in English speaking classes: "They don't understand going on; instead of learning first grade materials they are put in the second grade." When this happens, it is often impossible for the child to catch up. According to Dr. Ward, this feeling of inadequacy is what causes a student to mark time until he is old enough to drop out.






